These racing families leave mark on track

When Bryce Osterbeck of Wisner peers through the tiny slit of his purple, fiberglass, laydown race car and sees the finish line 953 feet away, he can only think of one thing — winning.

Osterbeck, and thousands of other kids across the nation, hit the tracks each summer as part of a race organization called All-American Soap Box Derby.

While the Derby race is primarily open to boys and girls ages 9 through 16 the National Derby Rallies, an offshoot formed in 1977, allow race fanatics to begin when they're 8 and race until they are 21.

Osterbeck comes from a racing family. His brother Paul began in 1983 and now young Bryce shares the track with his step-niece and nephew Jennica and Kevin Collon of Unionville.

The children get strong encouragement from parents and grandparents Jan and Richard Osterbeck of Wisner. Jan is presently the vice

president of the Saginaw Soap Box Derby Commission, where both she and Richard are very active in the promotion of, and working at, the various events held throughout the summer months.

There are three racing divisions in most Derby competitions. Kevin Collon, age 11, has been racing for three years, and is in the Stock Class. In this class, entrants buy their cars in a kit form and follow a step-by-step layout to construct a basic lean forward style car.

His sister Jennica, age 12, who has raced for four years, is presently in the Kit Division. They also purchase their cars, but are allowed to expand their knowledge and build a more advanced model, including painting their cars.

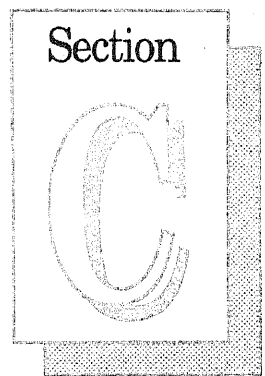
Bryce Osterbeck, age 14, has been racing for five years and is in the Masters Division. These entrants can purchase their cars from All American, but most, including Osterbeck, prefer to build their own.

Osterbeck's laydown model is constructed of fir strips overlaid, inside and out, with Fiberglass and took several hundred hours to complete.

Although never claiming a first place, Osterbeck has left his mark on Derby tracks throughout the midwest.

During his five years of racing he has won trophies ranging from second to eighth place, has raced in Ohio, Indiana and Michigan and plans to race in Pennsylvania and Virginia this year.

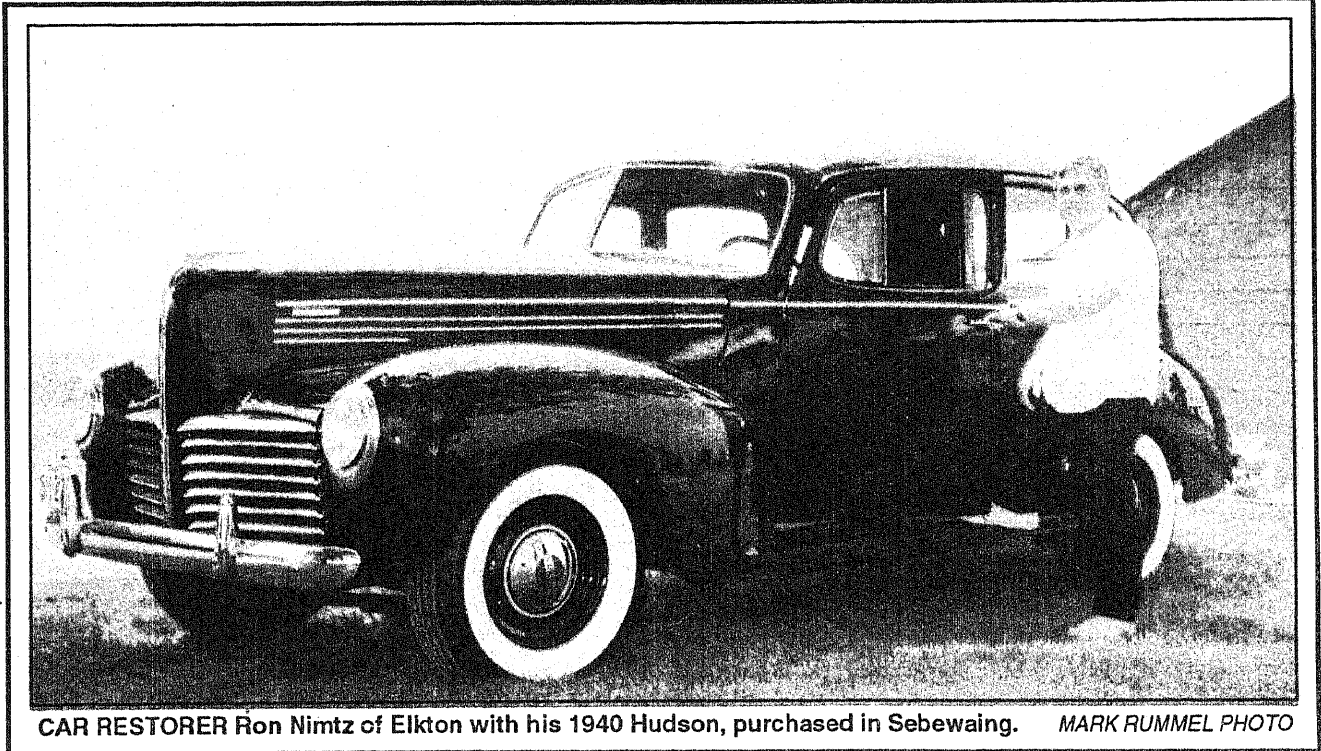


Ron Nimtz's car is 'labor of love'

Ron Nimtz of Elkton has spent nearly 15 years in a slow, deliberate and loving restoration project — refurbishing a unique 1940 Hudson Model 50 Traveler Deluxe.
And, the classic car happens to be the first real car I ever owned.
The four-door touring sedan has a 212-cu. inch engine and is Hudson's Harbor Blue in color — not bad for a six-cylinder beauty which traces its history back to Sebawaing... 55 years ago.
Former State Sen. Gottlieb Gettel probably bought the

car new, and drove it between Sebawaing and Lansing while in office.
His family members said he parked it in a garage on the family farm about 1953 — before Michigan's winter road salting programs began — and the '40 Hudson was never driven again, until it was sold at auction in 1968, after Gettel's death.
That's where I came into the picture, thanks to an assist from my Dad, Walt Rummel. With his help (and money) I as an 18-year-old Sebawaing High graduate

These youngsters love soap box racing

Last year he raced in the Nationals at Columbus, Ohio and won the 1994 Youth Achievement Award from the R.G. Canning Attractions which included a trip to Las Vegas as the prize. Osterbeck has set his sights on winning a first place this year. In a sport where winning and losing is separated by thousands of seconds, both the driver and the car are important.

"Everyone has a good car," Osterbeck says. "Driving is the most important thing."

In a Soap Box Derby race, contestants are not allowed to furnish their own wheels but rather draw lots and receive them from a wheel bank. Two cars meet head-to-head and then switch wheels with their competitor to run a second race. This procedure makes sure

no one receives a mechanical advantage in any race.

"Good drivers find the fastest line between the start and finish," Bryce's father, Richard Osterbeck says. "They also know all the dips in the track and use them to pick up a little speed here and there."

The Soap Box Derby got its beginning in 1934 when a Dayton, Ohio newsman was

sent out to cover a race of boy-built cars. He was so impressed he acquired a copyright of the idea and put the program on a national scale. In order to enter the All American Soap Box Derby, a boy/girl must build their own car and win a local race. Then they cannot race again until the big race in Akron, Ohio. Since this severely limits

the amount of competitors, The NDR, or National Derby Rallies, Inc. was formed. In this organization, racers compete all year to earn points and qualify for the National Championship Race which is considered to be the "Pro-Bowl" of Soap Box Derby where the "Best of the Best" compete.

This year, the NDR National Championships on Aug. 6-11, will be held at Derby Downs in Saginaw, visible from I-75 expressway near Holland Ave.

Other races in Buena Vista include the All American Rally held last weekend, the

NDR Firecracker 950 on July 8-9, the NDA Supernova July 28-30, and the NDR Saginaw 950, September 9-10.

The NDR promotes family involvement in all aspects of its program. It begins with the adult-child relationship in planning the car, traveling to the races, sharing in the competition through volunteering and finally the excitement of winning a championship.

The Osterbeck family is deeply involved in every aspect of Soap Box Derby racing, and, hopefully, this will be the year their son Bryce wins the "Big One."

A sweet treat!

BROWN SUGAR BROWNIES

1/2 c. butter
2 c. Pioneer dark brown sugar, firmly packed
2 eggs, well beaten
1 c. flour, sifted
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. vanilla extract
1 c. chopped pecans or walnuts
Pioneer confectioner's sugar

Cream softened butter, add sugar and eggs. Mix thoroughly. Using another bowl, sift flour, then measure; add baking powder and salt again. Add to the first mixture and blend. Add vanilla and nut meats.

Pour into a well greased square cake pan. Preheat over to 325 degrees and bake brownies for 40 minutes. Cool in pan. Cut in small squares and sprinkle with Pioneer confectioner's sugar.

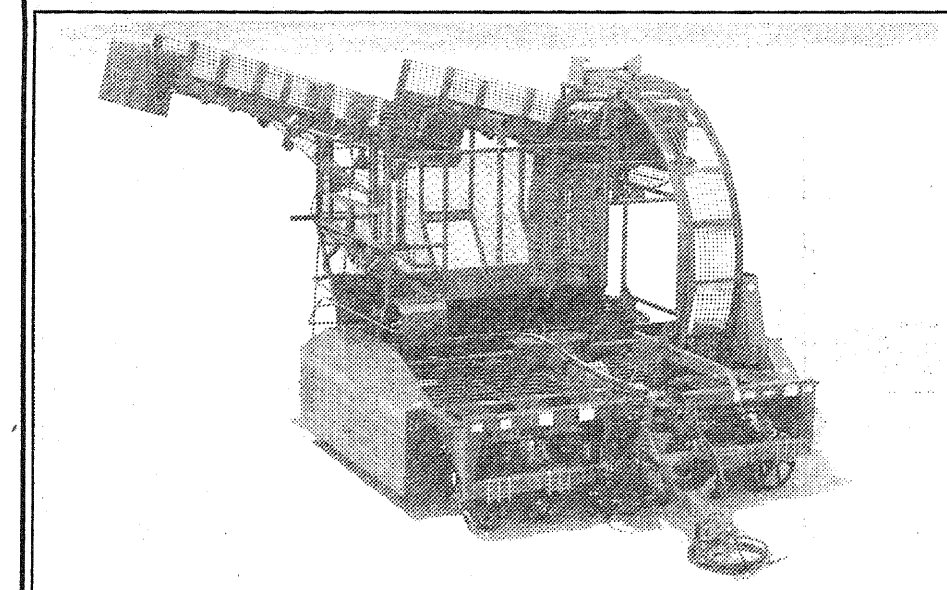

bought that car at auction for \$75 — with big dreams.

Unfortunately, I had (and still have) no restoration abilities, but my good buddy Dean Smith of Sebewaung was a mechanic — and he tried a teen-age version of restoration. The original engine had been taken apart sometime in the 1950s and was completely rusted through — so Smith replaced the engine with a mid-60s Chevy motor.

We drove that old car around Sebewaung one triumphant afternoon in early 1969, but it never again traveled the highways: college beckoned, and the car was parked in my Uncle Carl Rummel's garage.

He and my Dad decided to sell the Hudson about 1980 to free up storage space in the garage — and Ray Nimtz of Caseville was interested. He bought it for the princely sum of \$100 — which was \$25 more than we had paid — and his son Ron Nimtz had a real project on his hands.

Unlike the Rummel-Smith type of restoration, Nimtz got into intimate detail about the Hudson Motor Car Co. — named for Detroit department store founder J.L. Hudson — and began a restoration effort with all official parts.

He traveled throughout the Midwest in search of scarce

parts, and later joined the Hudson Car Club.

"I'm happy to have it this far. It's been such a long process, but fun," Nimtz said this week.

The restored car was dirty, many parts were missing, but the body had little rust, Nimtz says. It featured wide white-walls, chromed bumpers and was known for its smooth ride.

To find an original Hudson motor, he drove to Illinois — but the owner was so impressed with his plans he gave him the engine for free.

Since then, it's been a labor of love on weekends, nights and whenever he can get at it. When asked how many hours the restoration has taken, Nimtz just smiles. "I formerly kept track of my time and the money, but I stopped that."

His son Jeff has been very helpful, as have several friends and professional auto people. In mint condition, a 1940-era Hudson should be worth up to \$30,000 he says.

But he hasn't done this for the money, Nimtz says.

"Just through joining the car club, we've met people from California, Illinois and even New Zealand.

Some work still needs to be done, but Nimtz gave me a true thrill — he let me drive that beauty while meeting

with him for this story.

It's a far different ride than it was back in '69, with lovingly-restored brakes, smooth transmission, beautiful paint job and careful attention to detail.

Nimtz and his wife Mary Beth hope to drive it to the 1996 National Hudson Convention at Greenfield Village next year, but he'll drive a newer vehicle to this year's convention in July in New Jersey.

He first drove it to the Elkton AutumnFest Auto Show last September, and hopes to put on plenty more of the 71,206 miles shown on the odometer — 206 of which are his.

Nimtz says he's always enjoyed working on cars — "I like the challenge of making something run."

He admits this has been his biggest challenge ever, but admits he'd LOVE a Hudson pick-up truck. — if he could find one needing repairs...

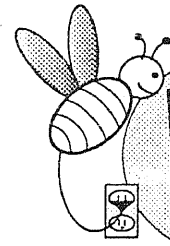

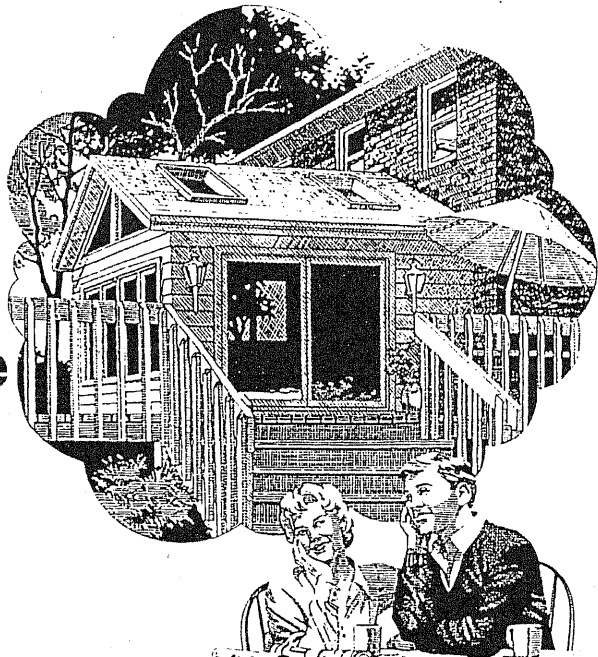

Glenn Miller Orchestra plays in Pigeon



THE GLENN MILLER ORCHESTRA was founded by world-famous bandleader Glenn Miller.

It's getting to be a tradition in Pigeon.

The Big Band Sound is so popular that the Pigeon Band Shell is pleased to present its fourth-year of Big Band entertainment — and this year's appearance of the Glenn Miller Orchestra this Wednesday, June 21 is the BIGGEST of them all!

The Glenn Miller Orchestra — consisting of Band Leader Larry O'Brien, five saxophone players, four trumpeters, four trombonists, three rhythm musicians and two vocalists — will be on stage in Pigeon at 7 p.m.

Tickets will be available at the gate, or season ticket holders may present their passes and enjoy a reduced fare. And children 12 and under may attend the concert for free, according to Band Shell Entertainment Chairman Neal Eichler.

"On the road" longer and more continuously than any other band in the world, the Glenn Miller Orchestra covers over 100,000 miles a year, working almost every night for 48 weeks out of every 52, playing nearly 300 dates which adds up to an audience of more than half a million people annually.

While they'll be arriving in Pigeon in their famous "in the mood" blue and white bus, they travel throughout the rest of the world by plane, having performed in Japan, South America, Europe, Australia, Alaska, Iceland and New Zealand. The orchestra's tour of Japan during March/April of this year marks the 28th consecutive annual tour of that country.

It has now been more than 50 years since Glenn Miller first succeeded with the Orchestra which still bears his name to this day. The theme back then of the Glenn Miller Orchestra was, and still is "Moonlight Serenade" — which today is considered a standard in the field of popular music.

Just as in Miller's day, the average of the band members is 23 and most of them have degrees in music from

some of the most illustrious music schools in the country — Berkley, North Texas State, Ohio State, Indiana University, University of Miami, UCLA, USC, New England Conservatory, Eastman and more.

Pigeon's Big Band tradition started out with an "out of the blue" phone call from a booking agent representing the Tommy Dorsey Orchestra in 1992 — who was looking for a place for the band to play while they were within driving distance from a performance in Cleveland.

She had heard about the Pigeon Band Shell and wondered if we had this particular date open. The Band Shell quickly made plans and were pleased when over 1500 Big Band fans came out to welcome them at their Pigeon appearance — completed with a pavilion all decked out for dancing under the stars.

The appearance of the famous Tommy Dorsey Orchestra in the small community of Pigeon made the headlines and the airwaves of a number of local media, who have followed with interest the "comings and goings" of a number of well-known performers at the Pigeon Band Shell — including The Che-

Caseville lowers millage...

Caseville Village residents will see a small decrease in their property tax bills this summer, after the Village Council voted last week to roll back its millage.

Village Controller Pam Damore said the new rate will be 12.6175 mills, down from 12.7218 levied in previous years. Council also set the Downtown Development Authority millage rate at 1.5257 mills.

But even though property tax bills may be a bit less, water rates will increase 10%, Damore said. "We're trying to save people some money with the rollback of millage rate, because the water rates are going up," she said.

Four offers were received for a village-owned parcel of property on Legion Drive, but those bids were tabled so that counteroffers could be sent by interested buyers to the selling agent, Real Estate One - Power Associates. Offers are due by July 1.

Council also approved the purchase of a street sweeper from Auto Wholesalers of Pennsylvania for \$19,925 plus \$650 in transportation costs. The old street sweeper will be sold as surplus equipment, along with a 1,000-gal. steel water tank, two steel trench boxes and a generator. There is a minimum bid of \$7,500 on the generator, and sealed bids on any of the surplus equipment must be in the Clerk's office by 4 p.m. July 10, Damore said.

In other business, Caseville Council: Approved a request from Bregetta May to use either the pavilion at the Downtown Village Park or on the boardwalk for her wedding to Todd Taylor on July 1. Agreed to seek bids on the abandonment, capping and sealing of well #7, the last well in the village to be abandoned.

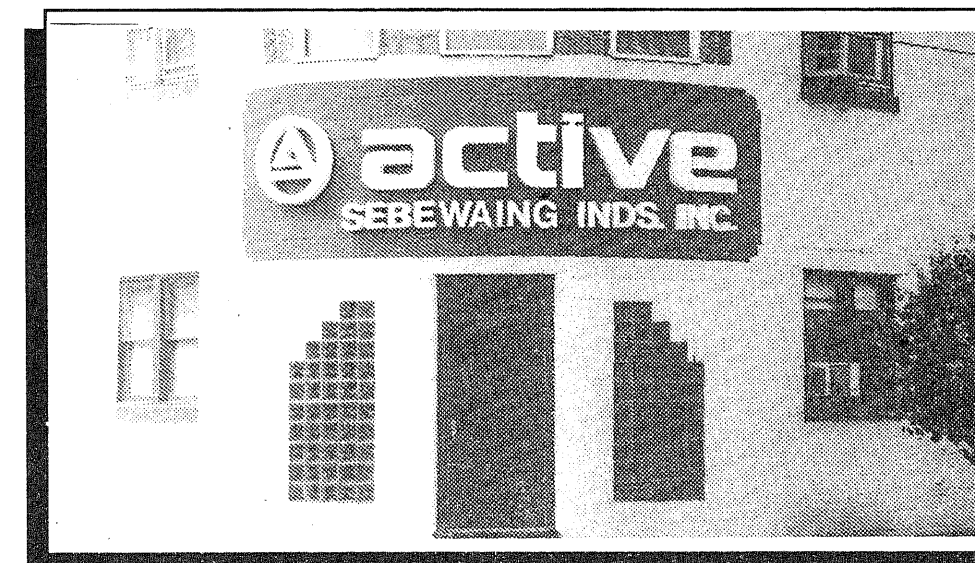

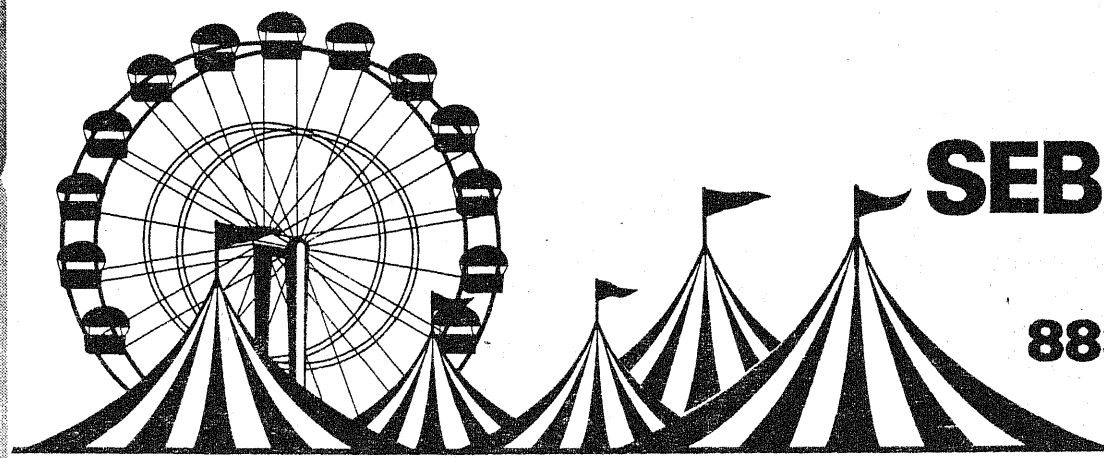

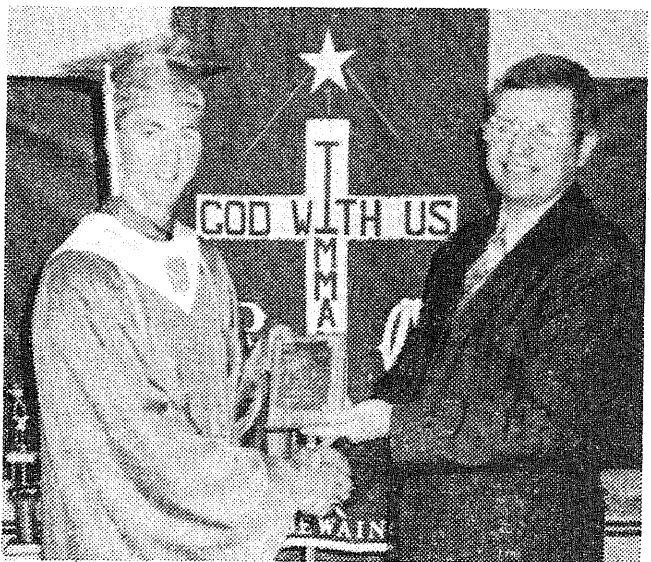

Because people enjoyed the day so much, Rep. Lad Stacey (R-Berrien Springs) responded to requests to make Log Cabin Day an annual

event, and a resolution for a second Log Cabin Day was passed.

On June 15, 1989, a bill was signed by Gov. James Blanchard which states "The last Sunday in June of each year shall be known as Log Cabin Day."

Michigan is the only state which has an annual log cabin festival. Of the more than 90 Michigan log cabins which have been on the Log Cabin Day parade since 1987, five were built before 1840.

The Log Cabin Society of Michigan was incorporated on Oct. 23, 1988 to sponsor this event and to discover, preserve and promote log

cabins in Michigan. An award of merit was received in 1991 from the Historical Society of Michigan.

61,000 lbs. fish are caught

Second prize of \$500 went to the Pigeon team of Jeremy Steinman and Troy Hartz, with 1,687 lbs. of fish brought in. Steinman also took the prize for landing the largest dogfish, which weighed in at 7.04 lbs.

The Thumb can boast the third prize-winning team of Ken Fletcher of Deckerville and Randy Smith of Sandusky. Together, they hauled in 1,523 lbs. of fish.

John Doctor of Marnie set a new tournament record with

his goldfish, which weighed 3.78 lbs. And Benny Wright won the largest carp contest, collecting \$299.20 for his







\$4.5MM in Laker fix-ups to existing elem. buildings

Renovations to the four Laker elementary school buildings could finally cost over \$4.5 million, according to final figures given to the Laker School Board of Education.

The firm of Toschach, Sobczak, Spence and Forsythe surveyed the buildings this spring to determine the repairs needed and their costs.

That figure would include new pitched roofs, new heating and air conditioning systems, new windows, plumbing renovations and exterior upgrades, Supt. Robert Drury said. In contrast, a new central elementary school would cost about \$6 million, they experts say.

The Laker Board will blanket the district this summer with a fact sheet about renovations and new construction, then this fall send out a formal survey based on the new information received, Drury said.

"The Board's decision will be based on those surveys," Drury said. "And I anticipate we'll have a bond issue vote in late October or early November. We don't have the funds to be able to put funds into new buildings and the funds from the state are not enough to do the repairs that are needed."

If any renovations are done, the buildings will have to comply with all state construction codes and the provisions of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

The Laker Board amended the 1994-95 fiscal year budget for the final time, showing \$6.9 million in revenue and just over \$7.09 million in expenditures. The \$182,000 deficit is due mainly to Gov. John Engler's decision to delay state aid payments to schools. That would cost the Laker District \$160,000, Drury said.

"If we do get that money, we'll have pretty close to a balanced budget," he said.

Preliminary figures for the 1995-96 school year expect revenues of \$7.02 million and expenditures of almost \$7.6 million. The \$568,488 deficit is due mainly to revenue reductions through Proposal A, Drury said.

"It's due to the failure of Proposal A to fully fund schools," Drury said. "I'm disgusted at the legislature. Proposal A was supposed to guarantee certain revenue to schools but instead, it's reduced funds to school districts."

"With this budget, I've painted the worst picture. It can only get better."

In other business, the Laker Board called back Annette Salsbury, who was pink-slipped in April. Kindergarten teacher Jeanne Swartzendruber decided to work half-time, opening up a slot for Salsbury, Drury said.

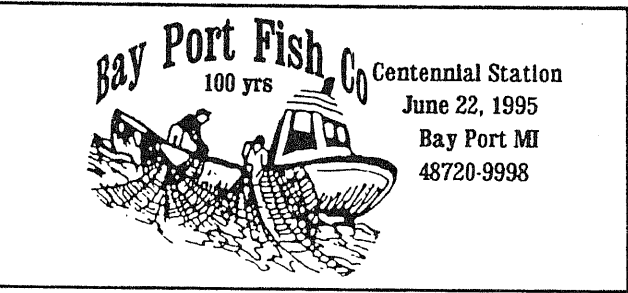
The one-inch line, under 200 pounds of pressure, ruptured and spread natural gas in the general vicinity, which could be seen in a cloud, witnesses said.

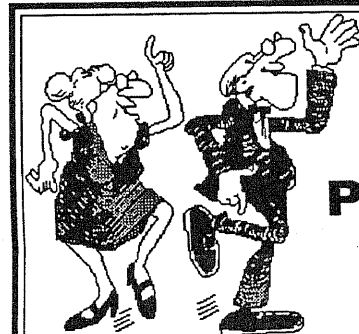

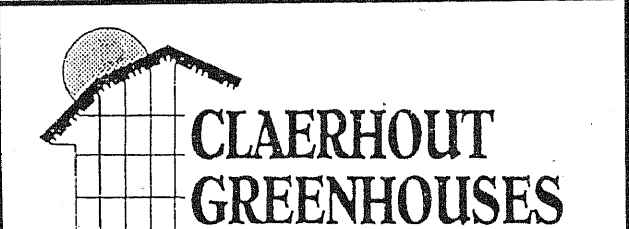
