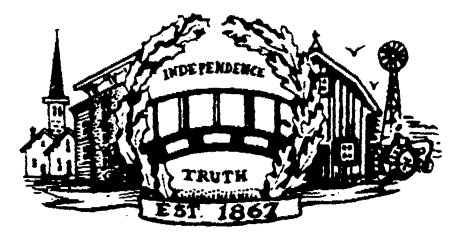

## FIRE DESTROYS FREEDOM TOWNSHIP HOME

At approximately two o'clock in the afternoon on Saturday, December 11, the home of Maryann and Alfred Bommer and their three children, Ashley -6, Jessica -4, and Samantha -2, at 7010 Schneider Road, was consumed by fire. The house was the family home of 40 years of Alfred's father, Alfred and Maryann had lived there for the past five years. Years of accumulations of possessions were lost.

The fire began in the electrical connections of the clothes dryer. Alfred and the children were all home at the time, and

fortunately all were evacuated safely from the house, including the family's cat and dog.

Since the house was a total loss, the family has nothing left. They are currently staying with Maryann's parents, but need a place to live while the house is being re-built.

Christmas gifts were already purchased, and need to be replaced. Clothes, appliances, furniture and any other household goods will be gratefully accepted. The Bethel Church annex is open for donations, and the church is coordinating the

collection efforts.

Ashley wears size 6-6x, Jessica size 4, and Samantha wears size 24 months clothing. Maryann wears size 10 women's clothes and Alfred size 32x31 pants and medium shirts.

In this Christmas season, Manchester once again has an opportunity to show our neighbors how much we care. A loss by fire is painful at any time, but at the holidays is particularly devastating.

Second Front Page: Repairing the Pickup Part 2

Several people on have stopped me on the street to relate horror stories about having their vehicles repaired. The majority of complaints seemed to center around the inconvenience of being without a vehicle or not being satisfied with the final repair's made. Some have related that their insurance rate went up significantly for the next three years.

One story related was that a four wheel drive pickup had an encounter with an old silo foundation in an open field. Total damages \$400 with a \$250 deductible, net insurance cost \$150. That person said his premium increased by \$700 over the next three years. "I should have kept my mouth shut and just fixed the truck, would have saved the difference three times over."

Progress report on my pickup. Front and rear bumpers have been removed as well as the grill and tail gate. Left front fender removed and replaced as well as the hood. Right rear fender removed and the new fender has been installed. Bob Koonse at Midwest Ford is doing the work. Gary Freeman at the Body Shop Manager is keeping me abreast of the costs involved.

Some of the items we are waiting for delivery of are: Front impact strip, left and right front bumper reinforcement, left and right front bumper mounting brackets as well as the grille panels, deflectors, headlamp assembly, radiator support panel, left wheel moulding, fender

nameplate, inner fender skirt, lower fender moulding, tailgate shell, tailgate hinge, tail lamp assembly, rear step bumper, left and right bumper supports both inner and outer, left and right rear impact strips.

W H E W ! That is just the list of parts yet to come, in not including nuts, bolts, washers, screws, doodads and doodads.

So far the parts costs are \$2,715.53, tax of \$108.62, estimated labor cost of \$1,591.40 subtotal to date of \$4,415.55 not including the towing bill, rental for the replacement vehicle, pickup cap repairs or anything else that may show up. Costly, Very Costly!

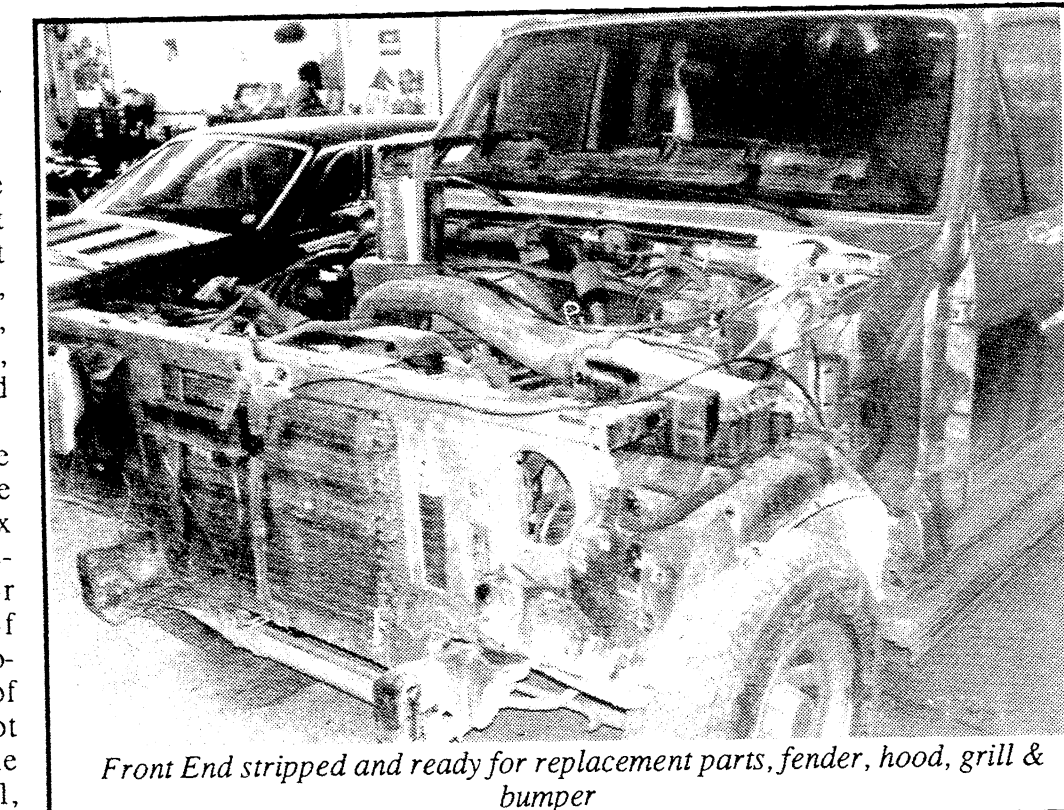

Well, Folks, This week I am going to discuss protecting your investment. By protecting your investment I am referring to such things as warranty, disability insurance, and life insurance.

These can be very important and helpful items for you, but many dealers abuse them and give you bad feelings.

Warranties are very important with today's repair bills and labor rates. There are various plans available running from 12 months/12,000 miles to 6 years/100,000 miles. There are power train, extra care and premium care warranties.

Power train covers engine, transmission and rear end in-

ternally lubricated parts. Extra care covers approximately 500 parts and premium care is pretty much bumper to bumper.

All warranties provide rental cars. No warranty will cover wear and tear items.

Also, I am telling you from experience to stick with Ford warranties. Many other aftermarket plans are available and usually cheaper, but they usually have loopholes such as not covering seals and gaskets. They are not readily accepted every place you go.

Vehicles are just machines and with all the computers, sensors, and modules on today's cars, things go wrong and at \$45 to \$50 per

hour, warranties are cheap investments. As a salesman, I feel good knowing that when my customers have a problem, they are covered, and probably entitled to a rental car.

Another way of protecting your vehicle is with life and disability insurance.

I know these add money to your payments, but many times my customers have thanked me for offering this to them, after they have used it. I say offer, because it is your choice; we do not force it on you. The only problem with life insurance is that you have to die to use it. But, it helps your family. It bypasses probate court and the car is paid for.

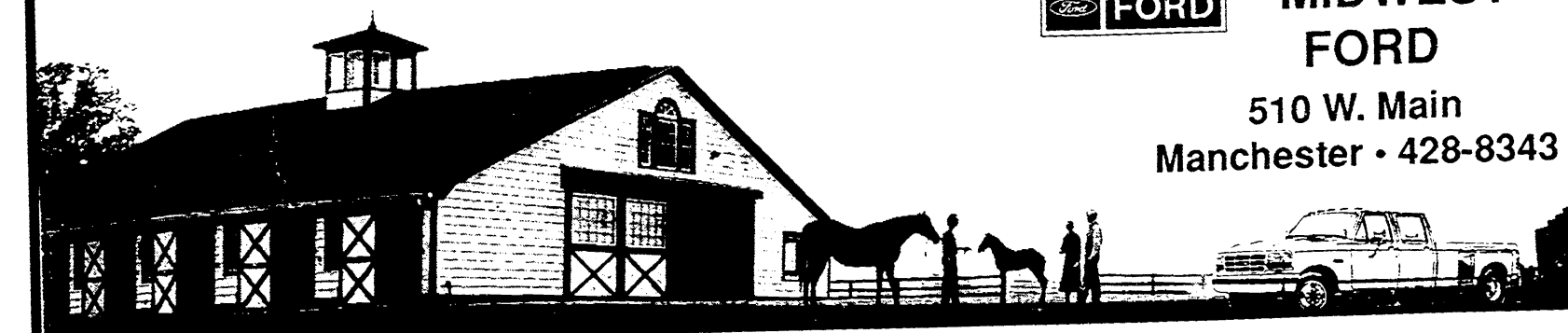

REGULAR BOARD MEETING, December 2, 1993

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 pm. by Supervisor John A. Savage. All other Board members were present along with the Zoning Officer, Planning Chairman, Attorney Bruce Laidlaw, and 4 township residents.

Minutes of the 11/4/93 meeting were read by the Clerk and approved by the Board.

The Supervisor changed the meeting format to accommodate Attorney Laidlaw since he travels here from Ann Arbor and appreciates the opportunity to address the Board as early into the meeting as possible.

The Board then discussed other zoning issues including Mobile Home Parks. Zoning Officer Blades reported two land use permits issued during November for a new home and a home addition.

Treasurer Burkhardt read the report of the treasury. Report was approved by the Board. Several letters were read by the Treasurer from recipients of fire and rescue service in regard to errors on fire reports and complaints about rescue service.

Trustee Blumenauer stated the road from Manchester Gravel access to M-52 is in use. Trustee Feldkamp noted that MTA Annual Convention will be held in Detroit in January and plans for those wishing to attend should be made soon.

Planning Chairman Ward reported on Seabury, Ross, and Morton land splits. Mr. Ward recommended the Township Board approve the Morton split which is necessary because of an easement. Motion made, supported and carried to this effect.

Supervisor Savage reported the following: (1) Two sets of recycling bags were picked up at Wacker's in November (2) Possibility of an injury claim For the most recent accident at M-52 and Pleasant Lake Roads which would be filed with State Highway Department. (3) Attorney James Datsko has resigned as our township attorney. He is taking a leave from law practice and will be flying commercial jet aircraft. Motion made, supported, and carried The Township Board retain Bruce Laidlaw, Ann Arbor, as our attorney.

(4) Several other informative letters were read not requiring board action. Motion made, supported, and carried the board retain Campbell, Kusterer, and Co., P.C. Certified Public Accountants, For the 1993-94 audit. Outstanding bills were presented. Motion made, supported, and carried all bills be paid. Meeting was then adjourned by the Supervisor.

Down Memory Lane



From "Dear Father, Mother, Sister" John Emory Irwin's Civil War correspondence with his family, compiled by his granddaughter, Maxine White (copyright 1971) and made available to us by his grandson, Donald Irwin of Sharon Township. John Emory Irwin and his brother James Leman Irwin were two Union soldiers who wrote from the field to their parents James and Sibyl, and their sister, Harriet Sibyl, Irwin. James Leman Irwin was fatally wounded June 18, 1864. Pictured above, the farmstead at 16880 Grass Lake Road.

Camp, 20th Mich., Battery No.9 December 21, 1864 and etceteras to keep me boring 'round all the spare moments I could find.

I haven't got through yet, but today there is less pressure than usual and I had planned to go over to the burying ground, but it rains so, I can't today. I don't know how far it is but I think it can't be more than three or four miles and before many days I mean to go!

The rebs desert and come over every night, most. Here now, last night, three or four came over between here and the river. One who came in to our Regt. wanted the pickets to let him stay on the line till a couple of his comrades came in and he did stay an hour or more, but no more Johnnies came in there and he was sent away. When they come over they are taken, generally, to Regt. Hdqrs., then Brigade, then Division, and so on, finally they are put in the Bull Pen at City Point and thence North, some into government service driving teams and one thing or another and some to Canada. Night before last, two or three came in, too.

Our pickets are on very friendly terms with the Johnnies Pickets, although no intercourse is allowed on either side. Often when ordered to fire they sing out

"Lie down Yanks" and then shoot; so do ours, but both parties take care to keep out of sight, though. We have shot away over 20,000 rounds of ammunition since we came here, just our Regt. alone, so you can judge that it costs our venerable Uncle something for projectiles; a great many of them are foolishly thrown away, too. It's really necessary for a great deal of random firing though, especially in the night for one night after we had been here about a week we tried the experiment and during the night they threw out half a mile of abater or "chevere de fire".

I believe is the scientific name for the particular kind they made. It was this fashion: They bored holes through about fifteen feet in length and stuck sticks through and made sheep racks and brought them out in sections and placed them in a row and wired them together making a long string of quite formidable looking fence. Since that we have special orders to fire on working parties when we can hear them and as the lines are so close together we most always can, but can't always stop them. I thought when we came round here that we would get so little wood we'd almost freeze but the Col. keeps the Brigade teams drawing steadily every day except Sunday and rainy days and we have a nice regimental wood pile but have to keep it guarded day and night. Every afternoon the Officer of the Day is charged with the duty of issuing to each company according to its needs and we have plenty by husbanding it.

Speaking of the Colonel—Cutcheon I mean - it is said he is promoted to a full Colonelcy and assigned to the 27th Mich. and I guess it's so and Captain Lounsbury is Brevet Major. It creates some jealousy in the Regt. among the line officers as it promotes him over the heads of Capt. VanCleve and Capt. Porter. There was reason for it though. I think Lounsbury is a fine fellow and more than that, a Christian man and gentleman. He has also been in 3 mos. service with Gen. Wilcox and spent several months in prison

with him, which is perhaps a secret of his promotion; a prisoner twice and wounded three times.

The mail has just come and brings another letter from under date of Dec. 15th. I've acknowledged receiving the socks twice already but I've got them all right and the Northwesters and the pins and tonight the postage stamps. Much obliged a thousand times. I get twenty-four dollars per month I thought I told you before. But we have tattoo and roll call and my candle has gone out and I can't write by firelight very well so I quit. Write to me often, as you do. We are not

consolidated that I know of, though there were some rumors to that effect. We have got a new stand of colors from Uncle Samuel, a splendid new National Flag, Red White and Blue. But I must stop. Good Night, once more. Write often.

He told them of "peace," with no fear or danger, For their wonderful Gift they would find in a manger.

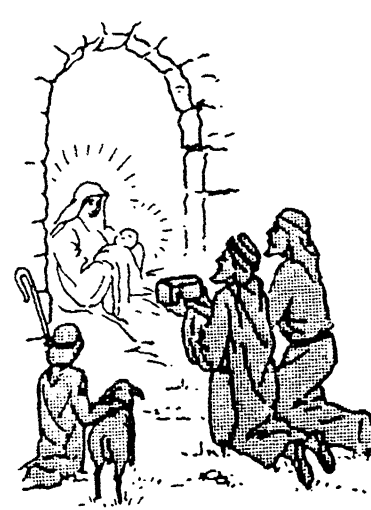
So leaving their sheep they went into town, To seek for this Gift; they would look all around.

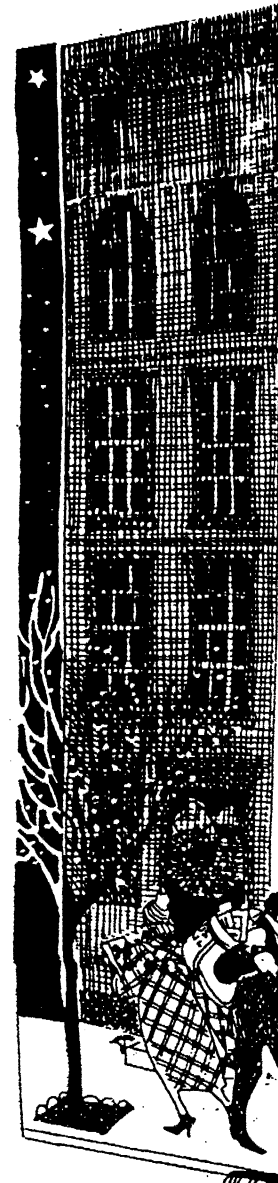

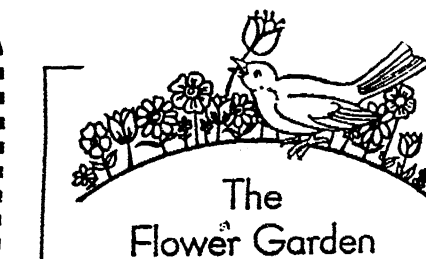

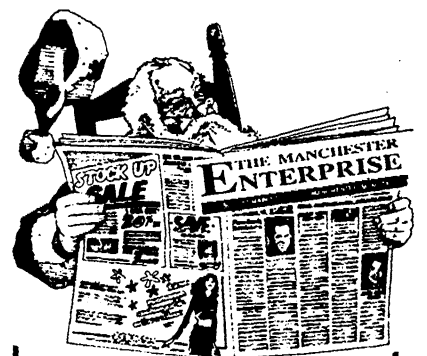

An electrical cord was overloaded and had begun to smoke. There was a real possibility a fire may have resulted had not Ed alerted the resident.

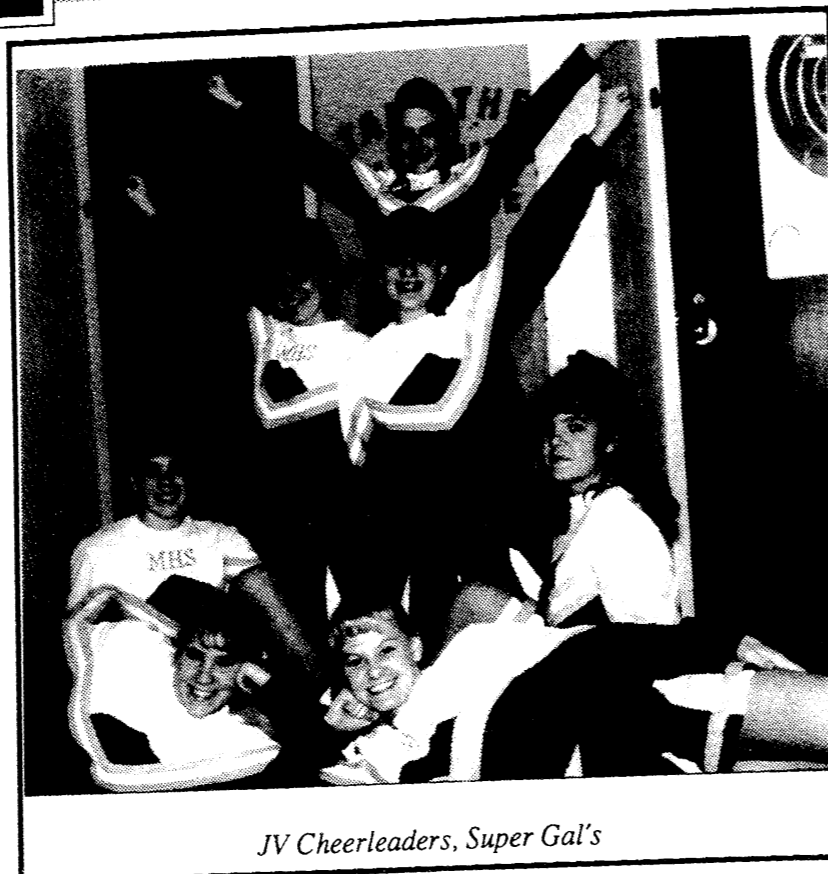
In his low key style, Ed said he lost a brother in a fire some 44 years ago and he never wants to see another. Our hat's off to you for a good job Ed!

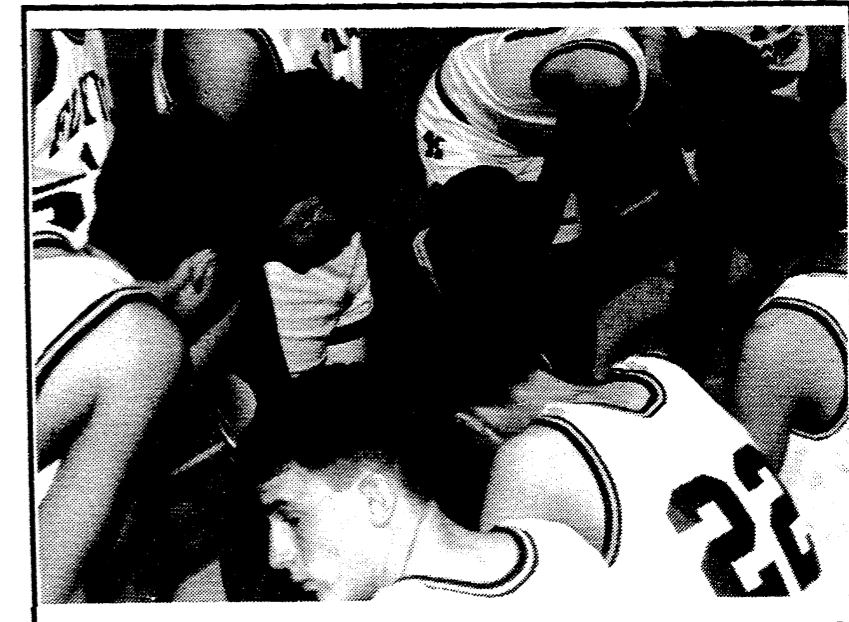

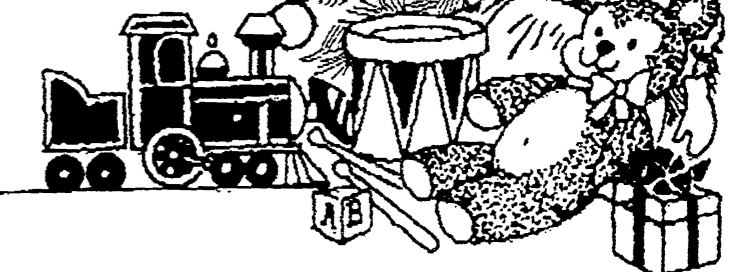

On Monday, December 6, Stan and Reno attended an orientation session in Atlanta, MI by the DNR. Stan was among the one in two hundred applicants drawn by lottery for an antlerless elk permit this year. On Tuesday the 7th, the two were joined by Floyd Parr, Stan's father. On the hunt on public land near Atlanta, they saw seven elk late in the day,

but it was too dark to shoot.

On Wednesday, December 8, they were joined by two friends from nearby Lewiston, and had no sightings that day.

Thursday, they hunted on the Canada Creek Ranch, which consists of 13,000 acres owned by 2,000 members. Many members of the club have homes on the ranch, which was established in 1934. Members come from many states, some as far away as California.

Elk are a problem to the ranch, as they destroy deer habitat and other wildlife cover; also reforestation goals and projects in process. The ranch furnishes each hunter with an expert guide.

Stan had to pass up three big bull elk, but finally, at 4:20 p.m., he made a great shot and bagged a young, antlerless bull calf, with great support from his guide, Chuck Koski.

The Michigan DNR manages and closely monitors the elk hunt. All harvested animals are checked by DNR personnel. Penalties for violations, however slight, are severe.

Stan demonstrated great sportsmanship and has some good memories and tales to tell as his reward.

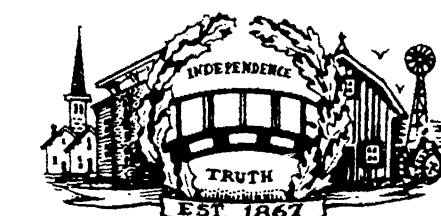

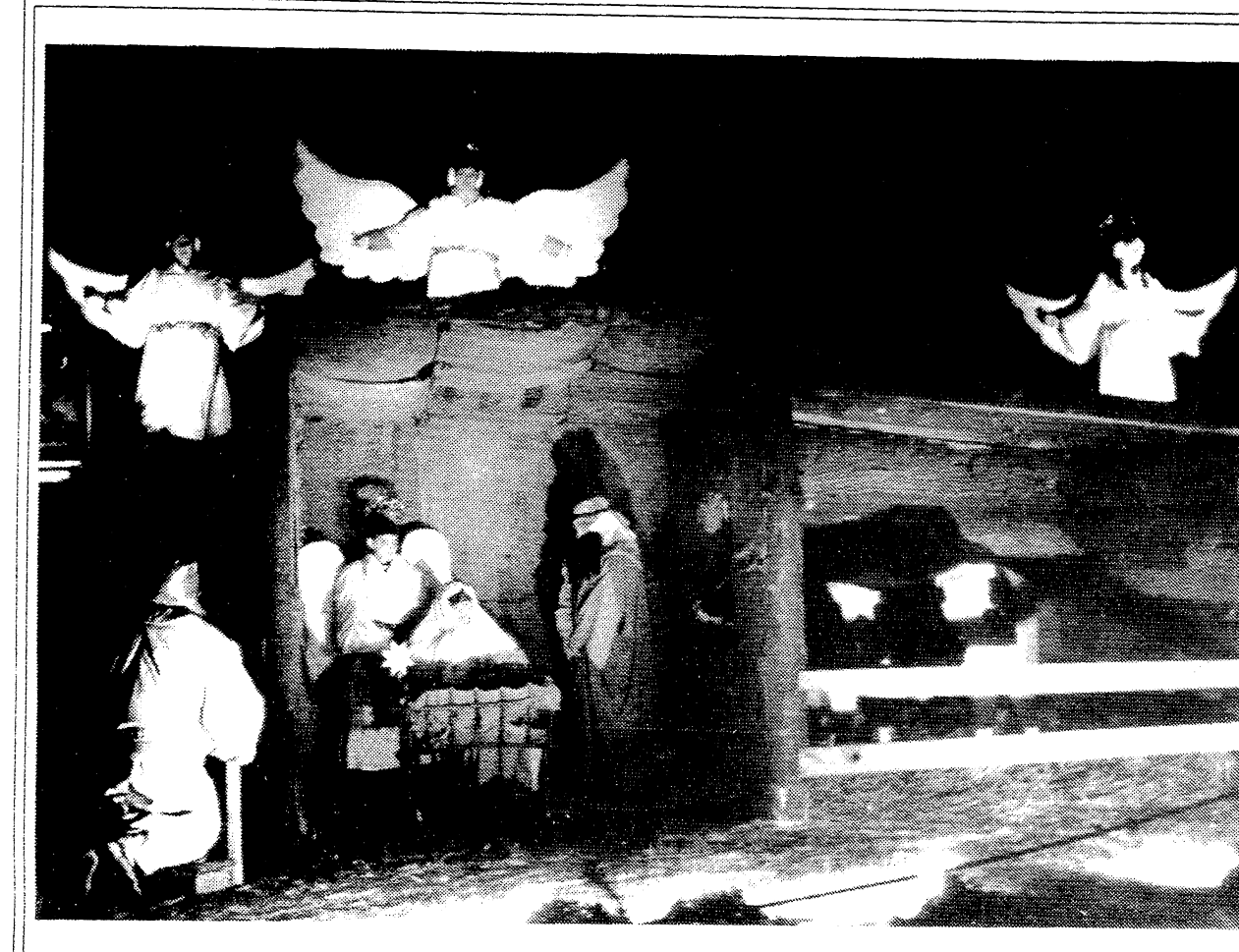
