Manchester Represented at White **House this Holiday** Season



It's An Antique World

One essential group in the world of antiques is that of furniture consisting of many different styles and time periods. Styles ranged from the ornate to the practical. Styles for everybody's individual taste and life style. Knowledge of styles and periods bring a satisfaction and pleasure especially in knowing how to

Major styles and time periods consist of the following: William & Mary 1688-1710 Queen Anne 1710-1750 Chippendale 1754-1780 Hepplewhite 1786-1800 Sheraton 1790-1810 Empire 1810-1830

Victorian 1830-1900 As a buyer or a collector of antiques, one must always purchase that which is good, taking into consideration line, proportion, color and shape. All of this being important factors in selecting an item.

Duncan Phyfe 1800-1840

There is a merging of time periods despite persistence of some styles. Satisfaction and pleasure come when one knows what they own and when and where it was made.

As one becomes familiar with the furniture styles and periods, one can avoid the pitfalls of the uninformed. By studying the old collections, such as found in historical buildings, museums and antique shops, one prepares to search out the old and the beautiful. One should set out with the idea that a prize piece of furniture or any other form of antique or collectible can be found at the most unexpected time or place. Remember, even under a coat of paint (which seemed to be a way of prolonging the usefulness of a piece of furniture) a prize piece of furniture can be found.

Don't become impatient when seeking out a particular style or time period. The wait can be very rewarding and a great investment for the future.

There have been many reproductions of these time periods since 1880 right up to the present. Always look for quality and craaftsmanship when making your selection. Personally, I would prefer are production piece from the 1880's (now considered an antique) for the same cost or sometimes less costly than a present day reproduction because of the craftsmanship and quality that went into the old reproduction. If you really look at the new and the old together, you can see a vast difference not to mention the character that an older item seems to possess. Looking for just that right piece is an exciting venture into the world of antiques.



From "Dear Father, Mother, Sister" John Emory Irwin's Civil Wai correspondence with his family, compiled by his granddaughter, Maxine White (copyright 1971) and made available to us by his grandson, Donald Irwin of Sharon Township.

John Emory Irwin and his brother James Leman Irwin were two Union soldiers who wrote from the field to their parents James and Sibyl, and their sister, Harriet Sibyl, Irwin. James Leman Irwin was fatally wounded June 18, 1864. Pictured above, the farmstead at 16880 Grass Lake Road.

Camp, 20th Mich., Battery No.9 December 21, 1864

Dear Mother -

December 21st, 1864 at Petersburg is decidedly a wet, nasty day and therefore we have to sit close in our houses and a bomb proof sheds water like a sieve, making it anything but pleasant in here. However if it keeps me at home and almost compels me to perform my duty by writing to you I don't know but it's a pretty

good thing after all. Perhaps you think I am getting negligent about writing and I'll have to plead guilty, I know, but there are some mitigating circumstances: Firstly, one day is pretty much like another and there is nothing of any consequence to write only I am well. That's a good deal, I know, but rather unsatisfactory after many repetitions unless connected with something else of interest. Secondly, I've been quite busy: quarterly returns, special reports, ordnance returns, camp and garrison equipage lists, clothing to draw, receipt rolls to make out and requisitions for clothing, camp and garrison equipage, and ordnance all had to be done within the last few days to say nothing of inspections, details,

and etceteras to keep me boring 'round all the spare moments could find.

I haven't got through yet, but today there is less pressure than usual and I had planned to go over to the burying ground, but it rains so, I can't today. I don't know how far it is but I think it can't be more than three or four miles and before many days I mean to go! The rebs desert and come over

every night, most. Here now, last night, three or four came over between here and the river. One who came in to our Regt. wanted the pickets to let him stay on the line till a couple of his comrades came in and he did stay an hour or more, but no more Johnnies came in there and he was sent away. When they come over they are taken, generally, to Regt. Hdqrs. then Brigade, then Division, and so on, finally they are put in the Bull Pen at City Point and thence North, some into government service driving teams and one thing or another and some to Canada. Night before last, two or three came in, too.

Our pickets are on very friendly terms with the Johnnies Pickets, although no intercourse is allowed on either side. Often when ordered to fire they sing out

care to keep out of sight, though. We have shot away over 20,000 rounds of ammunition since we came here, just our Regt. alone, so you can judge that it costs our venerable Uncle something for projectiles; a great many of them are foolishly thrown away, too.

It's really necessary for a great deal of random firing though, especially in the night for one night week we tried the experiment and de frire", I believe is the scientific name

for the particular kind they made.



He told them of "peace," with no fear or danger, For their wonderful Gift they would find in a manger.



On Wednesday, December 8, they were joined by two friends from nearby Lewiston, and had no sightings that day.



Elk are a problem to the ranch, as they destroy deer habitat and other wildlife cover; also reforestation goals and projects in process. The ranch urnishes each hunter with an expert guide.

The Michigan DNR manages and closely monitors the elkhunt. All harvested animals are checked by DNR personnel. Penalties for violations, however slight, are severe.
