We know that with all the bullshit out there, you can come to consider yourself on the mountain top. I may even consider myself one day on the mountain top. I may have already. But I know that in the valley there are people like Benny and there are people like me, people like Mickey White and people like Huey P. Newton and Bobby Seale. And that below the valley are people like Bobby Hutton, people like Eldridge Cleaver. We know that going into the valley is a dangerous thing. We know that when you go out to the valley you got to make a commitment.

A lot of people think the revolution is bullshit, but it's not. A lot of us think that when you get in the revolution you can talk your way out of things, but that's not true. Ask Bobby Hutton, ask Huey Newton, ask Eldridge Cleaver, Mickey White, and Dennis Morris. Ask these people whether it's a game. If you get yourself involved in a revolutionary struggle, then you've got to be serious.

It was a different trial when Duddy Sasse was tried. A trial that spoke clearly to the hearts of all Americans—one Black man equal to all Comptroller charges for arming a revolt in Negro towns. The trial's sole attempt to mollify the Black Timber Party, to justify violence—the leaders, to us the evil in the Black Liberators straight at us—while, And the range of Duddy's bullet, besides the trees wide open. When Woodrow Wilson had been plagued and shackled in his confusion, it was not only withdrawed out of the timberline in 1898, but unwilling as well out of the very consciousness of Black people here in Texas and throughout the country. The scene of Sasse to the courtroom was an intense trial against the whole history of American racism and Black resistance.

But now only the past is on trial in Chicago's Federal Building. While there are still some elements of the present within its dreary militancy, Africa's "revolutionaries" (Sasko), do little to mask off all an amazement—a morbid play out of the history of the middle West, when some of us still believed the State could be changed by words and signs and sacrifices—by another aware of the past. It is a trial of the innocence of the white power—moral—of innocence which died with the Detroit

riot, with Sasse, with Columbia, with the pair gas explosions of the conservative Convention Board.

One example in the courtroom—3½ feet tall with movement, exhibition, Chicago red squad plane, a tall Michigan—deafene admiral Lester Wohlman was getting in a corner to see White Ranger John Weston out of hell in hellfire on the trial. John is buried under a Michigan prison for possession of some arms. He'll be there for 4½ years. The "shameless" T. was trying to get them a couple of days off.


Mr. and Mrs. Johnson,
