was the first to feel his knife.

The battle was soon over, and eleven Indians were dead, all but two at the hands of Dale. Four more were wounded and several had escaped by swimming to shore.

This incident, in the hostilities with the Creek Indians (which was part of the War of 1812), ranks as the flercest hand-to-hand combat in American bor-

der history.

In the many stories of American frontier heroes that have attracted historians and writers, a few border scouts and wartiors have been ignored. Chief among these exceptions is

Sam Dale.

The man, who was to become one of several to whom the name "Uncle Sam" can be traced, was born in Virginia a few years before the American Revolution. He built a very profitable business by trading with the Indians and running wagon trains for the white settlers coming into the southeast.

After the trading business began to prosper, Dale's life revolved mostly among the Indians. The Creeks, Choctaws and Chickasaws knew him as "Big Sam," an honest trader, who never cheated them, as well as an excellent athlete and marksman.

At the outbreak of the War of 1812, the renowned Tecumsch came south intent upon gaining an alliance of the Creeks, Choctaws, and Chickasaws with the British in their war on the Americans. Tecumseh could not persuade the Choctaws and Chickasaws to
join the alliance. The Indian chief found a warm reception,
however, among the Creeks,
who were uneasy about the increasing numbers of white
settlers in their area.

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"Big Sam" knew the temper of the Creeks, and felt that Tecumseh's pleas were all that was needed to start a war. Dale urged colonial military leaders in the district to attempt concessions, but his plans went unheeded.

The Creeks struck with fierce massacres like the one at Fort Mims, when some 500 people

were killed.

The trader, "Big Sam," became Captain Dale of the Georgia militia. With a small, independent command, he roamed throughout the Creek territory, striking wherever the blow would be felt the most. The cance battle on the Alabama River was typical of the small, fierce engagements he fought.

Stories of Dale's exploits spread among American troops. They began to refer to him as "Uncle Sam" Dale. Although he was still a physical match for any man, Dale's relatively advanced age was

well known.

The war against the Creeks ended with Jackson's victory at the Battle of Fohopeka, and Dale returned to civilian status, considering himself too old to be part of the formal army that General Jackson was mustering to defend New Orleans.

"Uncle Sam" was at Milledgeville. Georgia, an December 31, 1814, when a special dispatch rider from the War Department arrived with messages for General Jackson, marked "urgent." The dispatch rider said that the rumor was that the dispatches concerned a possible end of the war. (It is now known that the war already had been ended with the Treaty of Ghent.) Sam Dale volunteered to take the messages the rest of the way.

Riding his bay horse "Paddy," he left Milledgeville New Year's Eve. At sunrise on January 7, he was across Lake Pontchartrain, a few miles outside of New Orleans. Riding the same horse all the way, he had come nearly 700 miles in a little over seven days.

As Dale rode into New Orleans, the first shots of the battle could be heard. He rushed to the scene, and arrived in time to see General Packenham leading British troops against Jackson's simple but formidable detenses. "Uncle Sam" joined the Mississippi Dragoons, borrowed a rifle, and began to pick off the advancing enemy with the deadly marksmanship acquired in Indian shooting matches.

It was midnight before Dale could present his now outdated dispatches to General Jackson, who was astonished at the phenomenal time in which Dale had crossed the near wilderness between Georgia and New Orleans. He gave Dale the prized job of taking the news of victory back to the rest of the country. Riding Paddy." the same great horse, he was on his way back before dawn. The return trip took a few hours longer because of three flooded rivers. American history shows few greater feats of man and horse together, than Dale's two rides.

The soldiers in the battle of New Orleans had further stories to tell of "Uncle Sam." It was said he had killed thirty-six Britishers in less than an hour, and that every one had been shot between the eyes.

As the years passed, "Uncle Sam" gradually lost his identity with Sam Dale, becoming more and more a mythical character, to whom all manner of exploits were attributed.

The New Orleans ride was the last feat of Sam Dale. He settled down in Mississippi and resumed his trading and


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
His home in Mississippi became the center of a little settlement known as Daleville, and that is where one of the men to whom the name "Uncle Sam" is attributed, was buried in 1841.


