"He Ought To

Real Heroism Is Recognized and Rewarded by the Carnegie Hero Fund

CAN'T get the women and children of that mine disaster out of my mind."

These fifteen words, written in lead pencil by Andrew Carnegie in 1904, were the beginning of the Carnegie Hero Fund.

A mine explosion had taken the lives of 178 men and boys. Andrew Carnegie had a private investigation made which revealed the full extent of the terrible tragedy. The result was a program through which constructive aid was given other members of the families affected, until they could replace the earning power of those who lost their lives.

The disaster brought into reality a plan which Mr. Carnegie had long been considering. Soon afterward . . . on April 15, 1904 . . . he set up a fund of \$5,000,000, for rewarding persons who perform deeds of heroism, but who would otherwise receive no appreciation beyond the thanks of the persons benefited and a possible paragraph in the daily paper. He appointed a Commission to investigate the cases and decide what should be done for each hero.

Mr. Carnegie felt that heroes and their families should be freed from financial worries, such as doctor bills, which result from their heroism. It was his purpose to place in somewhat better economic position than before, those who were in-

jured in heroic efforts to save human life, and, in the case of their death, to provide for their widows and children as long as the Commission thought such care necessary and wise. No money award, according to the rules laid down by Mr. Carnegie, can be

Carnegie, can be continued unless it is soberly and properly, used, and unless the person receiving it remains a sober, respectable, well-behaved member of the community

So since 1904 a real hero has received a medal . . . a medal of gold, silver, or bronze, as the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission believes fit. When financial aid is called for, he also receives a money reward of not more than \$1,000. Awards are made for all types of heroism . . . risking life to save someone from fire, from drowning, from falling, from being hit by a train and from other disasters.

Not long ago, for instance, Murl Porter, a sixteen-year-old Tipton, Oklahoma, schoolboy, received a bronze Carnegie medal and \$500. He had dashed into a flame five feet square, and almost as high, to turn off a gas valve which had caused a terrific explosion when he and his friend, Louis Morris,

seventeen, started to light a fire in a large boiler. Murl thought Louis was in the flames Both boys suffered severe burns, but recovered.

Howard B. Allard, Jr., of Chesapeake Beach, Virginia, another schoolboy the age of Murl and Louis, won a bronze medal and \$500, for saving two sisters who were struggling in water nine feet deep, 225 feet from shore. It is easy to understand why, after swimming to the young women, towing them both to shore, and reviving them, "Allard was winded and nervous," as the Commission reported the incident.

Another water rescue gave Carnegie recognition to tenyear-old Mary Austill of Spring Hill, Alabama. She saved a younger friend from drowning five feet from the bank of a swimming pool by grabbing her tightly and springing up and down from the bottom of the pool, working her way gradu-

In Ivy, Tennessee, a young school principal, Daniel M. Ivins, distinguished himself by trying to save nineteen-year-old Mary Grayce Jarvis from a thirty-foot fall, when she was swept in a fast-flowing stream forward to a waterfall. Principal Ivins had almost pulled her back to safety when both were drawn over the fall, down, down onto sharp, jagged rocks. Both were seriously hurt, but recovered. Daniel Ivins received a Carnegie bronze medal and \$1,000.

Railroad crossing watchman William M. Murray, of Dunkirk, New York, received a bronze medal and \$1,000 for rescuing a woman who was caught between fast-moving freight and passenger trains. In spite of doctors' warnings against overexertion because of serious heart trouble, Mr. Murray dashed across the track in front of a freight train.

The rescue of E. Mack Garland, a young farmer of Elys, Kentucky, was accompanied by tragedy. When Mack Gray, a young miner, tried to free Garland from a live electric wire with the aid of a broom, the wire sprang to Gray's wet shoulder and chest. Shocked, Gray too fell to the ground, still touching the live wire. Five minutes later the electric current was turned off, but

heroic Mack Gray could not be revived. Garland recovered. Gray's father was given a bronze medal for his son's fine act.

These are only a few stories from the records of the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission. They are multiplied many times. Every year about sixty heroes and heroines are considered worthy of the Carnegie award. More than 3,000 men and women, boys and girls . . . truck driver and civil engineer, brakeman and traveling salesman, oysterman and housewife, interior decorator and ranchhand . . . have won awards since the fund was established. More than \$5,760,000 has been given to these heroes and their families. They come from all parts of the United States, and Canada, and Newfoundland. In fifty-eight awards made not long ago, twenty-eight states were represented. And fifteen of the awards went to boys and

To be considered for the award, a description of the brave act must be sent to the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission within three years of the time it was performed. Every year many heroic deeds are presented which, on careful checking, cannot receive an award. Since April 1904 there have been more than 36,000 of these. But, of course, there are hundreds of similar acts the Commission never hears about.

So if you know someone who has performed a heroic act, write a full description of it to the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission, 2307 Oliver Building, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. Keep in mind the conditions on which awards are made. The deed must have been performed within the past three years. An award is made for an act in which there is evidence that a person voluntarily risked his life to an extraordinary degree in saving or attempting to save the life of a fellow being, or in voluntarily sacrificing himself in a heroic manner for the benefit of others. It is limited to persons whose regular duties do not require them to perform such acts. In other words, a member of the fire department who risks his life to save someone caught in a burning building cannot receive the Carnegie award. The rescue he makes is all in the day's work, for that's his business and he is trained for it. But when a schoolboy dashes into flames to save someone ... that's another story. Maybe you know such a story about someone who "ought to get a medal!"

























