## CLASS RUSH TO SEE SOPH-FROSH CLASH SATURDAY

Annual Traditional Event to Be Held At 9 O'clock Tomorrow Morning.

### ENDS HOSTILITIES

Student Council to Supervise; Varsity Men to Act As Referees; List Five Events.

Saturday morning is the date of the annual traditional class rush between the freshmen and sophomores, in accordance with the announcement of the student council made several weeks ago.

This event will mark the official termination of hostilities between the two underclasses, as far as inter-class activity for the remainder of the term is concerned.

The student council members, George L. Dirks, Clyde Olin, Charles Hartsell, Ivan Collett, Arthur Carls and Max Goodwin will be the supervisors of the entire affair, while the actual handling of the underclassmen will rest with varsity football men as far as possible. These men will be the active officials, and everything will be in accord with student council rulings. George Maier, president of the junior class, will have charge of the assembling of the freshmen. He will meet this group in the vacant lot at the corner of M. A. C. and Abbott Avenues, prior to nine o'clock tomorrow morning. They will be given the final instructions as to the rules of the rush and the carrying on of the various events. Three juniors chosen by Maier will assist him as fresh leaders.

The events are as follows: team relay race, with eight men to a team, obstacle race, football rush, sack race, tug-of-war, and the goal counting to points, while each one put in the license some points, five points, tug-of-war, etc.

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## ANNOUNCE DATE OF 1927 FARMERS' WEEK

The date for the Annual Farmers' Week at Michigan State College, Jan. 21 to Feb. 4, has been decided upon and announced following the first preliminary meeting of the Farmers' Week committee. R. S. Shaw, Dean of the agricultural division of the college, is chairman of the committee.

It was decided upon at the meeting to invite a number of nationally famous men to appear as speakers on the program during the week.

Inasmuch as this year will mark the seventieth anniversary of the founding of the college, it is planned to make some special recognition of the anniversary year as a part of the program.

Friday, Feb. 4, has been designated as Farm Bureau Day at the request of this organization. Thirty agricultural organizations of the state met at the college last year during Farmers' Week and a greater number are expected to meet during the week this year.

The course is offered through a request of the Reo Company who wished to give a group of their men a practical course in automotive electricity. About \$350.00 has been appropriated for the course which will start the first week in November and continue 12 weeks. The class will meet two afternoons each week. Mr. E. E. Kinney will act as instructor.

The project is an entirely new idea and those in charge are hoping for paramount success in their endeavor.

## FROM THE PRESIDENT

"I desire through each student of the college who is fortunate enough to entertain his father or his mother or both on Parents' Day Saturday, to extend a word of welcome and greeting that I should like to present personally, if that were possible. It is the well trained, well uniformed files of Michigan State musicians. We quote a part of the editorial: 'Michigan State college has come and gone but Michigan students have left behind not only the memory of a plucky, sportsmanlike football team, but also the memory of a band. A better drilled, better playing, better appearing band than the Michigan State aggregation has not been seen in Ithaca for some time. The mid-westerners deserved to the last hand the tremendous applause that greeted their versatile efforts.' And then they say by way of 'spanning' their own band a bit, 'The Cornell band also played.'

We are proud of our band and believe it is the best college band in the country. The time and money expended on the game which appeared in the Cornell Daily Sun, student newspaper, witness the headlines of the football story "Lucky Breaks Give Cornell 24 to 14 Victory Over State". Smith's Pass Total a "Rapido intercepts during heavy from behind goal giving Cornell score." "Varsity's Power Plays Red and White line losses aggressiveness in last half as Michigan rallies." Visitors Near Victory. Green and White cuts lead to three points, aerial attack proves effective. And then the story of the game written in a manner as fair as any Michigan State follower might have written it. Dame nature smiled wanly at Cornell Saturday and gave them an undeserved advantage of several breaks in the game with Michigan State. After being held scoreless for the first half of the game State came back with a spirited and determined drive that netted them 14 points as match against Cornell's 24. At the start of the final period the Red and White were leading by the narrow margin of three points. A swift pass from Bushingher to Smith proved too difficult for the latter to handle and it slipped through hands. The accident prevented what looked like a sure touchdown for the Green and White as the visitors at the time were on Cornell's 18 yard mark after having obtained two first downs in succession."

The writer then continues by praising State directly when he says, "The State eleven played hard and gave all it possessed for a much desired victory, but an ill-timed pass from Smith as he was standing in the end zone was intercepted inches away from his own goal. State was playing to win and continually passed when deep in its own territory. Smith's defiance to the ethics of football saved and thrilled the spectators who had sprung to life when Cornell's downfall seemed apparent. Michigan played a defensive game for the most of the time, content to let Cornell tire itself out with persistent rushing and then took

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trip possible. To Secretary H. H. Halladay should go a large part of the credit for securing the funds to make the trip possible.

Another viewpoint on the game that is equally as interesting as the student newspaper accounts is a letter from E. B. Hill, assistant to the dean of agriculture, who is now at Cornell taking post graduate work. The following excerpt from Mr. Hill's letter give the angle of student opinion.

"Needless to say, Cornell now has a greater respect for Michigan State than it had formerly. I never before felt more proud of Michigan State and of the men who represent her than I do at the present time.

"The team and the band made a hit with the faculty and student body, as evidenced by the writeup about the game; the editorial in the Daily Sun and the student discussion in the fraternity house where I now stay. They are still talking about last Saturday and there is nothing but the highest of praise.

"The writeup of the game is a good one. There is a sidelight however which should interest you. In the Syracuse Army game, Syracuse was penalized a total of 125 yards. Following one of these penalties, the Syracuse quarterback got into a fist fight with the referee. State at Cornell was penalized a total of 212 yards yet without visible signs of unsportsmanlike protest. The comparison is obvious, especially since many felt that State was rather heavily penalized.

"They all wanted to know how we were able to maintain such a fine band. It is difficult for them to understand student interest and spirit at M. S. C.

"Cornell students commented alike on the fine fighting spirit of the team, band and rosters. In fact M. S. C. spirit and fight appeared to be contagious as Cornell itself showed more spirit last Saturday than is customary.

All in all it was a wonderful day for all concerned and the day will long be remembered by Cornellians."

What finer spirit of good sportsmanship could be imagined than that shown by Cornell. May other schools that have occasion to send athletic teams to other organizations and contests to Michigan State be able to say
