## HOLD ARMISTICE DAY PARADE IN EAST LANSING

**East Lansing and Surrounding Legion Posts to Join in Parade On Campus.**

### VANDEBERG IS SPEAKER

**Grand Rapids Newspaper Man To Give Address in Gymnasium Following Parade.**

All units of the college R. O. T. C. members of the East Lansing post of the American Legion, and all men of the campus who have seen service are to be present in front of the college Armory at 10 o'clock Thursday Nov. 11, for a parade through the streets of East Lansing.

Colonel Sherburne plans to merge these men with those from the surrounding small towns who may appear to form as striking a parade as attendance will permit. All men who have seen service or who have had military training are requested to be present. Special efforts are being made to encourage those members of the faculty who have worn khaki to take part in the event.

#### College Legion Cooperate

Due to lack of interest and cooperation by the downtown legion and city officials, East Lansing has the opportunity of viewing this year's military demonstration at its own doors. This is a unique departure from the procedure of former years when the troops from the school have marched in the streets of Lansing proper.

The parade itself is to be sponsored by the local American Legion post which is cooperating with Col. Sherburne to make the first event of this kind in its town a success.

Following the parade there is to be a meeting at the gym where A. H. Vandenberg, Grand Rapids newspaper man, will address the assembly. Mr. Vandenberg is a fluent speaker and military heads promise a lively and interesting talk.

According to the school catalogue the day will be a holiday in memory of the signing of the armistice in 1918. This is the first time that this day has been observed as a full holiday on the Michigan State campus.

TO TURN SOD FOR ADD NEW OFFICER ARMORY AT ONCE TO R. O. T. C. UNIT

Construction to Be Started This Week; Work to Be Speeded.

The first sod for the new armory will be turned sometime this week, it was announced by Colonel Sherburne yesterday. According to reports from the state department of construction work will be speeded on the new structure so as to have it in shape for dedication on Founder's Day, May 12, next spring. The new chemistry building will also be dedicated on that day.

The new building will be built of red brick similar to that used on the other college buildings. The style of architecture will be slightly different from that of the prevailing campus models. This style, known as Flemish Gothic, will give the building a very distinguished appearance and yet harmonize with the other campus structures.

In the center will be a large arched opening 100 feet wide and 200 feet long. There will also contain a good sized auditorium. Around the outside of the arms will be a track for use in one-half section, such as the indoor intercollegiate track meets.


