Speaking of the similarity of Fritz Mauthner's "Mrs. Socrates" to the American, John Erskine's, fictionalized biography of which we make common talk over the teacup, we might enlighten the shade of wonderment that perhaps has been running through your minds by reviewing one of Mr. Erskine's best things.

Of course we have heard that "Galadriel" is a wise, colorful story that is of especial interest to women, which incidentally makes it of intense interest to men. Erskine's Shavian wit and his immense erudition about women could do no less than make such knowledge known. It surprised the academic cloisters of Columbia with its factual frankness and obviously has done the same thing among we who are most interested.

"Galadriel" is a satisfying book from every standpoint. It is less a satire than "Private Life of Helen of Troy" and not a story yet is more the less entertaining. The character of Guinevere is far more complex than that of Helen. The world famous beauty in the minds of Mr. Erskine was passive, but Guinevere is active. She is reminiscent, sentimental. Before her mankind fades into oblivion again as destined for her uses. Aware at every turn of Freudian psychology Mr. Erskine never lets it crowd haphazard in his pages. His sneers at the ladies Guinevere are delicate. They are almost unnoticed until as the book goes on in its delightful way we become more and more conscious that Guinevere was just as well whatever you call your heroines when they are ladies, and more than that. King Arthur is thoroughly lovable although entirely too forgiving. Faustus becomes a passionate and a terrible soul and Galadriel, poor Galadriel, with all her beauty and her fine spirits, just another creation of Guinevere who like many older women who cannot possess a man, makes him a hopeless being so that he will never fall in love with another woman. The Erskine's story is a like person. She is the real woman. She would have made Faustus an excellent wife.

It seems that many of us are losing the opportunity of using that wonderful new institution, the People's church, otherwise we may have a natural tool against going to church; many students are slaves to the mistaken opinion that to really "college" one must forget all about these being such a thing as the church. However, be that as it is, the great inspirational talk that Mr. Metcalf gives ought not to be missed by a single student. No one can leave after such a service without having obtained better ability to meet his or her college difficulties. But no student need fear about the high cost of state students. It was found by actual count that twenty percent of the student body attends church.

Now here is the point. It seems that a special effort is being made by the students in the church to make Sunday evening services special state functions. It is aimed to get a good share

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## BUTLER NEXT ON SCHEDULE FOR GAMES AT HOME

**Team Goes on Road Saturday Night to Meet Notre Dame in First Clash.**

Not until Jan. 31 will Ben Van Alstyne's Michigan State College basketball team be seen in action again on the home floor. Saturday night the team goes on the road again when Notre Dame is met in the first of the two seasonal clashes at South Bend.

The Spartans returned home late Sunday after scoring an even break on the road. Lake Forest was defeated 39 to 30 in a hot contest in the Gold Coast city Friday night, while on Sunday Marquette avenged itself for an early season defeat here by soundly trouncing State, 24 to 12. Inability to work the ball through the Golden Ava launcher was the cause of the defeat.

Dickeson was the outstanding star of the road trip, making a 23 point total for the two games played. Coach Van Alstyne used a new combination most of the time. Hood was benched in place of Green, a lad who has shown to good advantage of late.

tests were made at M. S. C. This point showed the expense in sharpening and loss of efficiency to be large. The presence of iron oxides was thought to account for this discrepancy, but the Bureau of Standards found the oxygen present in abnormal steels to be .00005 per cent, while the oxygen found in many normal steels was .000025 per cent, thus dispelling the oxide. Microphotographs of the abnormal steel showed a segregation of the hard components of steel, namely cementite. The experiments are being done here by the mechanical engineering department show that armor and steel can be certain heat treatments can be made normal. In closing Mr. Seelig said that the reason for abnormal steel as is fully known at present but much research is being done.

Dr. C. S. Robinson in his paper brought out the necessity of the parathyroid glands and their secretions.

The first experiments were on dogs and it was found that the removal of

these glands caused death. The reason given for this was that these glands act as detoxifiers for the toxins created in the digestive passages. Upon removal of these glands and injecting parathyroid extract in various amounts at various intervals death due to complete removal of parathyroid glands and their secretions could be prevented.


The squad is in charge of Prof. Burhans, of the physical education division, and he reports an interested group of enthusiasts.
