Passes Biennial Appropriation as Recommended by Committee.

ATTEMPT NEW REDUCTION

College Given \$1,114,250 for New Buildings and Improvements to Grounds.

Refusing to allow further cuts in the college budget covering needs of the institution for the next two years, the house Thursday passed the appropriation recommended by the ways and means committee.

The amount granted the college was \$1,114,250. This includes items calling for necessary new buildings and improvements to the ground and old buildings.

Although the cut made by the committee amounted to \$1,000,000 several members of the house Wednesday afternoon indicated that the cut made by the committee was sufficient and a substitute bill offered in committee of the state by Rep. Walter F. Thomas of St. Joseph providing the college with only \$600,000 for the two years of buildings and improvements was accepted by various members with the result that it was withdrawn by Mr. Thomas.

The bill as introduced in the House originally asked to total of \$3,000,000 for the college for two years. The ways and means committee eliminated a number of items and added others.

In the result that the total reported amount was \$1,114,250, a cut of over \$300,000.

When the measure was considered in general orders Wednesday afternoon Representative Thomas offered a substitute bill which he claimed to be the same as first reported out by ways and means committee. He said the committee rejected the bill in the \$600,000 total and made additional so that the amount finally reported was over a million dollars.

lest we be misunderstood

In another column of the Michigan State News a letter which we received from the East Lansing ladies whose eyes are so doggedly set upon the prohibition of the Sunday theater in East Lansing is reprinted. Much as we expected, they fall utterly to visualize our point of view and have only to offer in retaliation a few reports which in no way alter our point. Three items of the situation interest us in the letter. The first, in reference to the student body being forced to go down town carries a slight tinge of sarcasm on the part of the well-meaning ladies, if our interpretive powers are active. Admittedly we are not breaking down under the strain of the three-mile trip to Lansing either physically or mentally. We make the trip and return smiling as the ladies contend. We made no attempt to assert that we were wasting away under the strain. But because it is the habit of the college student to accept in the best light that which is available for his use or amusement, that should be no barrier in the presentation of new comforts.

On the matter of the protection of the youngsters of the city as we have been protected, we offer this. If our memory serves us correctly, we recall no city ordinances regulating the theaters in the town from which we came. We are not ashamed of our training nor do we feel that it was heedlessly forsaken. We are satisfied, and we believe our parents are, in the fact that the regulation of our conduct in regard to theaters or any other entertainment in which we participated came from within our home. No civic ordinances were deemed necessary in our case and in our short stay here the East Lansing children have given us no indications that such control was essential to their welfare.

On the third issue, the censorship and control of the theaters, in which our statement that we understood that the East Lansing men connected with the project would care for the provision of suitable pictures, we were interpreted by the ladies as meaning that a clause was inserted in black and white to that effect. On this matter we will say that we are equally willing to trust the men connected with the project, whether a clause is provided in black and white or not, with the welfare of East Lansing as the well-meaning East Lansing ladies who are fostering this monstrous movement.

FRATERNITY MOTHERS

(Red and Black University of Georgia)

A system that is in vogue at many of the larger institutions and among a few of the fraternities at the University of Georgia, and one which the Red

and Black thinks would serve much good at the university, is that of having resident house mothers in all the fraternity houses in the university.

Such a scheme, if it could be worked out, would certainly meet with the approval of the majority of fraternity men in college. The choice of a house mother, if wisely made, would do much to improve the atmosphere of the average fraternity house; it would help to preserve the home training that a student has on entering the university and which is so easily forgotten in the average chapter house.

The ideal of the scheme is not to place a guardian or spy over the men living in the houses, but to add to their university home that indefinable feminine touch that no amount of masculine blundering could accomplish. These fraternities that have already tried out this scheme will quickly vouch for the success that it has been. They prove that it is a success by always keeping a house mother with them. Once this plan is tried, it is hard to do away with.

We believe that this scheme would be one of the most forward steps taken by the fraternities in recent years, and wish that the fraternities would at least give it enough thought to investigate and see what it has meant to other fraternities in other schools.

metropolis is quite a surprising point of view to us.

We feel that the Sabbath is a day which rightfully belongs not only to the People's church, but to every church everywhere. We number among the members of this movement people of every denomination, and some of no denomination at all, many attend the downtown churches, and are interested only incidentally in the community church here. We are interested in this question as citizens, because we do not wish to see the Sabbath turned into a Roman holiday, here in East Lansing. Since in some respects it is a religious question, as well as a civic question, members of every church have a peculiar interest in the matter from the religious point of view. Any one who is interested can find out, by asking the personal point of view of the individual members of the staff of the People's church, or of any other church. We have not yet been officially informed what public stand will be taken by the church as a whole.

As to local censorship of the proposed new theatre here, we are surprised to learn that such an agreement had been reached by the East Lansing business men to whom you refer. A few short weeks ago, an official of the East Lansing Development Co. assured us no such clause had been inserted, in black and white, in the contract. We were glad to learn of the change. We were told that the new theater would be under the same supervision, and provided with the same high class series of entertainments presented in

the four largest theatres in Lansing.

We are thinking of the future here in our city. What of the next theatre to come in? We are not at all sure that it will be under the same efficient and able censorship you assure us has been arranged for the theatre

already proposed. The simplest plan seems to be to register, once and for all, in votes, the will of the people of East Lansing concerning Sunday theatres here and those interested are taking the appropriate legal steps toward that end.

Lose Verdict to Michigan at Ann Arbor 6-4; Take Measure of West Virginia, 9-3.

The Michigan State College ball-tossers invaded an enemy lair and engaged another foe in their own stronghold during the week, netting a defeat on their outside invasion and winning an interesting engagement on the home appearance. University of Michigan took the measure of the Spartan nine at Ann Arbor Tuesday by a 6-4 count, while the University of West Virginia was disposed of in East Lansing yesterday afternoon to the tune of a 9-3 score.

A bad opening inning in which the Wolverine team found the offerings of "Lefty" Tolles, bespectacled twirler of the State diamond aggregation, for two triples, a double, and three singles, which counted for five runs and a substantial margin over the Spartans which were never overcome.
