## Orchestra Leader Prominent Musician

Ossip Gabrilowitsch, conductor of the Detroit Symphony orchestra at its appearance here Nov. 21, is a musician who has attained his present renown through sheer ability and hard work. He is of Russian origin but has been in the United States for many years and is now an American citizen. First securing recognition for his work as a virtuoso, he achieved fame as a conductor. He has many compositions to his credit.

Last year Gabrilowitsch celebrated his twenty-fifth anniversary as a pianist in America with concerts in many cities. He was feted and many encores were given in his honor.

Ten years ago he accepted the leadership of the Detroit Symphony orchestra, one of the finest in the country, and has brought it to national fame when the orchestra appeared in New York recently; critics generally acclaimed it as the finest organization ever to come from the west.

His position as a leader does not interfere with his own career. At present he is considered to be one of the leading pianists of the world. He is also a man of rare cultural attainments being a great linguist.

**BANQUET STARTS LARGE Y DRIVE**

**Develop Program as Large Subscriptions Begin to Pour in.**

Steward, both classes had agreed to cooperate and earn all losses in the afternoon. Prizes are being given out for all the absences this afternoon. Mr. Steward expressed the opinion that if the afternoon classes were not well attended, the probability would be that the nucleus would be forthcoming in future years.




Where dependability is vital

In connection with a new pumping station at Milwaukee Wisconsin, additional feeder mains were required. It was necessary that one of these should carry an unusually large proportion of the water supply, and 54-inch pipe was decided upon. Although pipe of material other than cast iron had a lower first cost, Cast Iron Pipe was chosen because the possibility of interruption to service had to be reduced to a minimum.

## BUTLER UNIV. FURNISHES LAST HOME OPPONENT FOR SPARTANS

**Indianapolis Team Only Defeated by University of Illinois.**

### STATE IN SHAPE

**Lack of Casualties on Team Raises Hopes for Victory in Big Game.**

Michigan State's varsity will take the field Saturday against Butler, the last game in the Spartan Stadium this year. With a totally disastrous season as the result of the Green and White's lowered Saturday, the Spartans will be fighting with their backs to the wall in an attempt to subdue Butler and gain an even break in the schedule.

In seven games this year the Spartans have won three, lost four with Butler and North Carolina State yet to be faced. Wins over these two schools will alone be a success, for the reverses suffered in Johnson.

In seven games played, Butler has been somewhat better record than State. The invaders have scored 155 points in dowing Cornell 58-12, Valparaiso 58-0, DePauw 34 and Wabash last Saturday. The Illinois team paled over Butler 58-0. Lombard won in a hard-fought game 19-16. Franklin played a 7-7 tie with Butler. One hundred eight points have been scored against the Hoosiers this fall, this year, Illinois getting over half that total.

More enthusiasm has been shown on the Spartan practice field this week than prior to any previous game this season. With the exception of Pat Ross and Johnny Wilson, the team is in fine condition physically. The scrappy Spartan center is probably not seen action again because of a knee that is under the doctor's care. Wilson is out for the rest of the season with an injured shoulder.

The win over Allis has changed the mental attitude of not having a great deal and this should be apparent when State takes the field Saturday. It has been a mental blow to the Spartans as anything that has been the wrench in the Spartan machinery this season. With a victory on the line Saturday, there will be a confident but nervous effort on both sides.

Speed will probably be the key factor of the attack. The Spartans counted entirely for the speed factor, the Methodists and the Illinoisans will be resorted to.

The forward pass will receive a lot of attention, as will the State's defense, which has been mostly de-

## FOOTBALL ENDS FOR STATE FRESH

With the Green and White's meeting in a scoreless tie on the past Saturday, the football season for the class of 1927 has come to a close. This was the second consecutive year of State.
