

BASKETEERS TAKE EARLY LEAD CONQUERING OHIO NORTHERN

Display Improved Brand of Basketball Over Adrian Game.

VAN ZYLEN LEADS SCORING

Van Alstyne Uses Twelve Men in Fray, Substituting Entire Team.

By virtue of an early lead the Michigan State basketball five easily routed the Ohio Northern eagles in a game on the Spartan court Tuesday evening, State winning 39-25.

Displaying a vastly different brand of basketball than was shown in the opening game with Adrian, the Spartans piled up a lead of 25-11 in the first half. State led throughout the contest and with the exception of the first few minutes in the second half when the visitors staged a desperate rally, the Michigan State eagles were not pushed.

Coach Van Alstyne used 12 men during the fray. Starting with only two veterans in the lineup, Colvin at guard and Dickenson at forward, the State coach put a fast combination on the floor. VanZylen, a sophomore candidate, played the forward opposite Dickenson; DenHerder, also a sophomore, was at center, and Russo, who played a few games for State two years ago, held down the guard post opposite Colvin.

Near the end of the first half, after the starting lineup had gained a commanding lead, an entire new team was substituted which placed Eldred and Sheathel at the forward positions; Lang at center, and Felt at guard. The line-up played a careful game and the visitors failed to make any great headway against them. Totten was sent into the game in place of Felt while Hood took the place of Eldred just before the half was over.
