STATE DEFEATS ALBION INVADERS WITH GAME SEWED UP FROM START

Michigan State's basketball team won another victory here Wednesday evening when the Albion men, 1927-28 A. A. champions, were defeated by a score of 52-20. State led throughout the contest and had little difficulty in winning the game after holding a 25-point lead at the end of the first half. The Spartans scored 12 points and goal by Freddie DenHerder Russo followed and Bill Feit dropped in two free throws. FEES

A special election will soon be held by the Student Council in an endeavor to ascertain student opinion on the new system of fees that is being inaugurated. The fees committee has made a number of recommendations and it is up to the student body to abide with their judgment or reject their proposals.

Three propositions have been passed on by the State Board of Agriculture and the Student Council and will be submitted to a student referendum next week. One proposal calls for the reduction of the artists' course fee from thirty four cents to twenty five cents per term and the addition of one dollar and fifty cents as a music fee.

With the proceeds of this music fee, prominent artists, singers, and musicians will be brought to East Lansing during the next year and State students will be given the opportunity of hearing those masters at a nominal cost.




