VOTE OR KEEP SILENT

Several times a year the student council gives the students of Michigan State a chance to express their opinion via the ballot box at regular and special elections. At regular elections, campus officers are picked, and at special elections, vacancies are filled or timely issues decided.

The purpose of these elections is to give every Spartan the privilege of expressing his opinion on matters that vitally concern the welfare of the college and the student body. What usually happens when an election is called? A very small percentage of the total enrollment goes to the polls and casts their votes with the result that a few pale-spirited citizens control all the elections.

After an election is over many loud voices come from people who oppose the final verdict. They claim subtler, underhanded methods and down-right cheating was employed by the opposite party. Upon investigation it has been found that nearly every one of the post-election soberers failed to vote and when he should have been at the polls exercising his constitutional right, he was rolling around in his room kicking about something or other.

Wednesday's special election was a farce. About 380 votes were cast, which means that less than one-eighth of the student body took enough interest in the affairs of their college to drop in at the Union and cast their votes. The other seven-eighths who failed to vote will probably set up a terrific howl when they read the results of the election. But they should be quickly and surely squelched by any who hear them. If they did not have enough interest in the college to vote, they should have no right to sound off after everything's said and done.
