OUR POSITION

When a new group takes over the management of an organization, it is natural that those who are partaking somewhat in the results and watching the progress should desire to know something of the attitude or general policy which will be maintained.

First, above all, the new staff of the Michigan State News will attempt to give unbiased and impartial information on events which transpire on this campus. With a comparatively small staff, it is oftentimes impossible to know of all things which may go on. Information as to news from those taking part in activities is always appreciated. Every effort will be made to obtain and publish all news.

In the course of the year, it is inevitable that delicate situations should arise in which pressure may be brought to bear to suppress or color some aspect of news. We believe that a college newspaper owes to its campus a certain moral obligation in dealing with news of this type. For the good of all, some should be suppressed and on the other hand, some should be published. Decisions concerning information of this kind must rest entirely upon the judgment and common sense of the staff. This is the second responsibility which must be carried and we consider it an important one.

During the course of the coming year there are a number of questions which will be brought into the editorial columns for discussion with the purpose of bringing about action which will be of benefit to the student body and the college as a whole.

Among those which will be taken up and which we desire to see carried through are included the abolishment of the present marking system; construction of a basketball floor in the gymnasium; a survey of the personnel of departments of the college with a view to strengthening through elimination and addition, those departments which are notably weak; elimination of rules governing coed smoking and the placing of coeds in this respect on the same basis with the men; elimination of many so-called honorary societies, thereby increasing the prestige of membership in worthwhile ones; and student government expansion.

Undoubtedly numerous questions which will be brought into these columns will perturb and bring objections from some. We feel, however, that if a subject is sufficiently important to be considered a problem by the students, it is pertinent that it should be taken up here.

DIPLOMAS TO SHOW HIGH SCHOLASTIC STANDING

Continuous A and B Work for Four Years Will Receive Recognition on Diplomas.

Recognition of scholastic standing will be made at commencement by printing the words "with high honor" upon the diplomas of graduating students this year for the first time in the history of the college. For graduating students who have made a continuous record for four years of no less than B the words "with high honor" will be inscribed on the diploma, and for those students who have made a three year record of no less than B the diplomas will bear the words "with honor."

Besides this change the diplomas are to be much smaller and less elaborate so that they will fold more easily and may be carried about.

NEW COURSES ANNOUNCED IN NEXT YEAR'S CATALOG

Completed at one of the earliest dates in several years, the college catalog for the year 1928-29 was issued and advance copies mailed out last week.

The first 1,000 copies published were sent out the first day to prospective students and others. Several thousand more are being printed for distribution.

The catalog contains announcement of several new courses, notably in the philosophy and English departments and a complete outline of the subjects required and elective in each department of the college. Medical biology is a four year course leading to the de-

gree of bachelor of science in medical biology is listed under a separate heading. A division is also devoted to the outline of public school music.

In addition to the listing of courses, the catalog includes a list of faculty members in the instruction, administration, extension and research divisions, and a description of campus buildings, traditions, customs and rules regarding attendance at classes. A list of scholarships and prizes open to the students also is given.

BASEBALL TEAM RETURNS FROM SOUTHERN TRIP WITH FEW VICTORIES

Squad Scores Two Victories and Loses Four Games in South.

TOLLES LEADS HITTING

Returning from the Southern Sunday night, Coach Kobs and the Spartan baseball squad began to make plans for the opening game with Virginia Tech. which occurs on Wednesday of tomorrow next week. The Kobs' men suffered four losses and won two in the spring training trip schedule.

On Saturday afternoon the Michigan State team met up with Cumberland University at Lebanon, Tennessee, which resulted in a victory for the State men. With Captain Lefty Tolles on the mound the Cumberlanders were beaten 5-3.

Monday the Spartans met with the first reverse of the trip. At Fort Benning, Georgia, the Michigan State lost to the Fort Benning officers. Lefty Tolles pitched a nice game but the Kobs' men only allowing five hits. The team's defeat was due to errors and the hit was lost.

The second game of the three game series at Fort Benning resulted in a second crushing which was administered to the Spartans. Fort Benning was up in the air. Tolles pitched and Davis was used in an emergency. The Spartans were shut out 2-0 in an eight inning game.

On Wednesday the Michigan State team participated in the Fort Benning nine and lost them 9-2. Capt. Tolles was again in the box for the State men and turned in a creditable victory, the second of the trip. The Spartans after a slow start, opened up matters in the seventh and in the eighth took the lead. In the ninth the officers threatened to overcome the green and white lead by a double play started by McClellan. State shortstop cut away the chance for two scores but the Spartans were able to score another run a few minutes later when Tolles weak-ened.

Leaving Fort Benning Georgia, the Spartan squad journeyed to Marietta, Georgia to play a game on Thursday and another one Friday. With Berne in the box Thursday's game turned out to be a loss for the Kobs' men. The line right handed allowed nine hits while his teammates failed to bunch their right bats to any advantage. The Marietta College line won 7-0. The Friday game was not played because of inclement weather.

The final game of the trip was with the Technical Institute school at Petersburg, Va. On Saturday afternoon Lefty Tolles started out on the mound for the Spartans but gave way to Tolles about mid-way.

Catch Kobs' took four men on the trip. They were Capt. Tolles, Bluffard, Smith, Davis, Wang, Carson, Davis, McClellan, Eggen, Hillman, Berne, Davis, Huntington, Craft. On these men Tolles set his starting on the trip. Lefty got one while still was named with two. Tolles won three with one.
