## SENIORS PLAN ACTIVITIES FOR THE SPRING TERM

### Water Carnival to Take Place Under Direction of Executive Committee.

### APPOINT COMMITTEES

A large portion of the senior class was present at the first class meeting of the term held at Olds Hall last Tuesday night. The chief purpose of the meeting was to start definite action on the plans for the water carnival which will be held this spring.

An entirely new plan has been formulated by which the water carnival will be conducted this spring. Last spring a variety of committees were responsible for the executive functions, while this year the class president, Arthur Curtis, has appointed an executive committee. This committee consists of seniors, who will be directly responsible for that part of the carnival to which they are assigned. It is thought that this system of organization will eliminate excessive responsibility being placed on any one individual, as well as provide an executive body to work out more completely the proposed plans for the various activities included in the carnival.

The executive committee, appointed by Arthur Curtis, is composed of the following seniors: Finance—Fred Pierce, Harry Stutz, and Walter H. Brown; Publicity—Frank Haven, Stutz, and Walter H. Brown; Entertainment—Carl DeWitt, programs and advertising—Walter H. Brown, and publicity and tickets—John K. These members of the executive committee are to report immediately to the class president.

As yet no date upon which the water carnival will be held has not been decided. The executive committee will meet soon to decide this date, as well as to select the theme for the carnival. These details will be announced by the committee at an early date.

A separate committee, composed of Ward Estes, Fred Pierce, Dorothy Robinson, and Eugene Harvey, has charge of senior parties and social activities other than the water carnival. As customary the seniors will hold two week parties each week during the first one having been held Wednesday night of this week.

As an announcement to all seniors who have not as yet been measured for the water carnival, the executive committee has arranged for a special measurement party to be held at the gymnasium on Friday night, April 27, at 8 o'clock. This party will be held in the gymnasium and will be open to all seniors.

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## MISSIONARY SOCIETIES CONDEMN TOBACCO ADS

### Oppose Nicotine Ads in College Papers; Fear Students Will Contract Habit.

Tobacco advertisements in college publications were condemned at a combined meeting of representatives of missionary societies of nearly all the churches of Lansing Tuesday evening. A resolution opposing the advertisements and urging the enforcement of anti-nicotine laws already on the statute books of the state was passed as follows: We, representing the missionary societies of the Women's Union of the First Baptist church of Lansing, with invited guests from the other churches and women's organizations of our city, believing that the use of tobacco is detrimental to health, and in many other ways a habit which tends to impair the mind and body, and to contract a habit which is so easily contracted, and that the use of tobacco in college papers and thus placing before the young people of today, in whom we have not only great pride but also great faith, the advertisement of anti-nicotine laws already on our statute books.

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## BOARD UPSETS ADMINISTRATION IN DRASTIC ACTION WEDNESDAY

### State Board Drops Phelan and Willard in Economy Move with Elimination of Other Offices; Ousted Men to Continue for Remainder of Term; New System to Be Instituted to Handle Work of Dean's Office.

With two of the chief executives of the administration, Dean of Deans John Phelan and John D. Willard, director of continuing education, dropped from the college payroll, and the leave of absence of President Kenyon L. Butterfield extended from May 1 to July 1 without his consent, the state board of agriculture at its meeting Wednesday took action which undoubtedly means the end of the present administrative regime. The office of Purchasing Agent W. N. Sweeney was also removed.

Elimination of the two entire departments of the dean's office and continuing education was made in order to cut down the payroll and aid somewhat in decreasing the present deficit of the college, according to members of the board.

## GENERAL MALONE TO REVIEW CORPS

### Will Speak at Convocation Tuesday Morning; Special Parade Held in Afternoon.

Brig. Gen. Paul Malone, commander of the Sixth Corps Area, will visit the campus next Tuesday, April 24, and will address the college convocation in the afternoon. Malone is also commander of the World War Veterans' Chapter, which will be present from 11 to 12 o'clock.

Brig. Gen. Malone, who is considered one of the best speakers in the army, will also address the Army and Navy club of Lansing at a banquet held in his honor Tuesday evening.

A special parade is to be held Tuesday afternoon by the state cadets in order that Gen. Malone may review the unit. The parade will be held at 3 o'clock and seats are to be provided for spectators. The regular Wednesday afternoon parade will be canceled.

Malone's visit to the college is in an official capacity and following his visit he will go to Ann Arbor where he will review the University corps.

### W. A. A. OFFERS VARIETY OF SPORTS THIS TERM

#### Class Tennis Tournament Plans Underway; Golf to Be New Sport This Year.

This spring term, W. A. A. offers to those interested in athletic work the various sports of interclass swimming, baseball, tennis, track, archery, golf, hiking and canoeing.

Swimming is open to any girl who can enter the water head first and swim two strokes. Practices started the week of April 9 and will continue until May 21, on which date the meet will be held. Anyone who has put in seven practices is eligible to be chosen for the chess team.

Judging by the number of girls who have come out, baseball seems to be foremost as the spring sport. In order to make a team, each girl must put in eight required practices, including four team practices, by May 21, when the tournament will be held. Each class seems desirous of hanging its name in the "Hall of Fame."

A tennis tournament will be held in each class. Names are placed on the ladder and a girl may challenge any one of the three girls above her. Four matches are required for team membership. A match is to be the best two of three sets. The class team will consist of the four highest on the ladder after May 19. The interclass tournament will be held May 21-28.

Eight practices in track and field events are required for team membership. Practices must be in by May 21, when the meet will be held.

A new sport this year is golf. In order to obtain points, five score cards (19 holes each) must be turned in by the week of May 21 when the final match will be played.

A pleasant method of earning points is canoeing. Twenty-five points will be given for eight hours of canoeing.

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# STATE MATMEN HOLD A.A.U. TITLE

## Michigan State Grapplers Out-score Michigan to Win Annual Tourney.

### WIN TWO CLASS TITLES

With only three letter men wrestling the Michigan State college wrestlers sprang a big surprise here Wednesday when they walked off with high honors in the Michigan A. A. U. wrestling tournament. The Spartans capped 18 points while the University of Michigan was forced to take second place with 15 points. The State triumph was unexpected because of the weakened condition of Coach Leonard's squad, only a few of the regulars being able to compete.

A large affair, held at the six hour program which lasted through the afternoon and evening on Wednesday. Much enthusiasm was exhibited during the contests owing to the fact that the winners and runners-up are eligible to go to Grand Rapids on July 1 to 9 and compete in the National Olympic try-outs which will be held in the Furniture City to determine the men who will represent the nation in the Olympic games in the fall.

Two state championships were awarded Michigan State wrestlers Wednesday. George Ferrari in the 191 lb. class came through with a win over List State Fresh wrestler to win the division championship. Ferrari was awarded third place. Schrader, a Michigan State Freshman grappler, won on points from Kirtling (U. of M.) for the championship. Harry Kirtling staged an upset when he defeated Gels of Grand Rapids in the semi-finals of the meet, but the Spartan grappler lost out in the championship round on points to Adamson (U. of M.). A. J. Kirtling's victory over the Grand Rapids wrestler was very unexpected owing to Gels rating as one of the best light heavyweights in the middle west. Before the meet Gels was hoped to make the Olympic team this year. Justin for State won his first match but lost the final match in the heavy weight division. Justin won by points over Ostropowicz of Grand Rapids in the semi-finals. Both were big men and as Justin had from the same city, probably a little personal touch was added to the match. Anyway, there was a mighty scramble during the match. During the fray they knocked down the ring and kept the crowd thrilled with excitement at all times.

George (unattached) won from Justin easily in the final, after Justin had injured his shoulder in the preliminary. Maynard Shultz, state varsity wrestler, lost out in the final to Doug govtio (unattached) in the final after gaining a fall over Beck (M. S. U. Fresh) in a preliminary. Several freshmen wrestlers and a few varsity wrestlers also turned in good accounts of themselves.

Norman Stoner, who wrestled for State last winter, was beaten for the first time in the season when Watson (Michigan) defeated the 134 lb. State man by points in the final. In the 140 lb. class, Win Haskins, who was a member of the State squad last year,

but who wrestled unattached in this meet, placed third.

It was rather remarkable that the Michigan State squad should come through so well in this meet with so many of the regular varsity men out of competition. Ben, Capt. Landberg, Martinkewicz, and Stephenson, who were favored to go well, could not compete for various reasons.

Coach Leonard's freshmen also showed up well, several of them winning third places while three or four placed higher than that. The result of the good showing which the Spartans made Wednesday will be realized better next July when the amateur wrestlers from all over the United States meet at Grand Rapids for the National Olympic try-outs. State will have six men eligible to enter: Justin, Ferrari, L. J. Schultz, Kirtling and Schrader. Stoner cannot take part in a State wrestler this winter will also be eligible.

Rinehart then connected with the Red Cedar and sent it sailing into the Red Cedar for his first homer of the season. Lefty Tolles was given a free passage to first and a moment later another ball was lost in the swirl of the Red Cedar when Hoisington connected for a circuit drive. Davis and Watkins then flitted out.

The fifth inning proved rather uninteresting in relation to the other innings, but State added another run while Kalamazoo was held scoreless. In the sixth, however, through the aid of a walk and two hits, the Cleary City team put two runs across the plate. Michigan State failed to score in their half as did the visitors in the seventh.

In all the Spartans drove out ten hits, among which were two home

runs, one three-base smash, and two doubles. The infield play was slightly erratic at times but was fairly good considering the weather conditions. Coach Kobs used Caruso behind the bat in all but the last inning when he substituted Hoisington on short. Rinehart evinced around in the left garden while Capt. Tolles took care of the central part of the outer defense. Davis played right field. In the final inning Suchs replaced Tolles. The final game on the Spartan schedule will be played on Saturday

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### ALDERMAN SHOWS FINE FORM IN I. A. C. COLORS

#### Freddie Has Stepped Out at Fast Pace Since Graduation; Has Chance for Olympics.

What has Fred Alderman been doing since he graduated last June? That some of his competitors have seen a great deal of his heels is quite evident. At the Central A. A. U. indoor meet he won from Gestrack in the 300-yard dash on a ten lap track in the first time of 31.8 seconds. He won from his old rival, Locke, at the K. of C. meet, Madison Square Gardens, New York. At the I. A. C. Handicap meet he won the 300-yard dash indoors. From Hermanson of Northwestern, who is one of the best in the western conference. When Charles Padlock broke his old record in the 140-yard dash at the Texas Relays, Alderman was at his elbow pushing him to his limit. The time was 1:4 seconds. The following day at the Rice Relays, Alderman again pushed Padlock to his limit. This time two tenths of a second was clipped from the record of the preceding day. It is quite evident that Alderman also broke Padlock's old record of 14 seconds for this event on both occasions. Alderman is considered to be a good possibility for the Olympic games to be held at Amsterdam this summer.
