

Athletic Council Selects Officers and Committees for Coming Year.

## REPORT \$4,000 SURPLUS

At a recent meeting of the athletic council, an election of officers for the present college year was held and a report by the auditor of the college on the financial condition of the Athletic association disclosed that it finished the year with a surplus of over \$4,000.
