## U. OF DETROIT GAME PROMISES LARGEST CROWD SINCE STADIUM DEDICATION FIVE YEARS AGO

Between 15,000 and 20,000 People Expected to View Contest To-  
morrow; Temporary Bleachers Put Up;  
Pep Meeting Tonight

With a ticket sell-out assured, the second largest crowd to

## Y' PRESIDENT IS FIRED BY BOARD

Kunkel-Brown Dispute Results in  
Resignation; Attempt to  
Cover Act Fails.

Upheaval in the administrative situation of the campus Y. M. C. A. was uncovered last night when the resignation of Paul Brown, Y' president elected at the all-college election last spring term, was made public following unsuccessful attempts of the local secretary, Rev. Norman Kunkel, student pastor, to keep the situation under wraps. Clapping the rights of the Student Council to fill vacancies in major campus offices, the Y' cabinet composed of eight men, and directed by Kunkel, unconstitutionally elected Jerry DeVore to fill Brown's place.

The resignation of Brown, well known on the campus, was the result of being summoned by Kunkel to appear before the faculty advisory board to answer charges of disinterest and indifference. Crowley, in his resignation, gave as his main reason for quitting the presidency the pressure of outside work, although admitting that there were serious grounds for disinterest between himself and Kunkel. In spite of Kunkel's denial that any such dis-  
agreement was present, it is quite possible that the resignation is the result of interference by Kunkel, who came to the campus about a year ago. When interviewed last night Kunkel dismissed the story with the remark that all the new men, despite the attempts of old men to bring the resignation to the attention of the student body which elected him last spring, Paul Brown's resignation was tendered and accepted October 31 yet it was not discovered until last night appears to have been the culmination of a dispute between Brown, daily elected president of the organization, and Kunkel, student pastor.
