Most Extensive Exhibit Ever Attempted; Figures Presented.

The show this year is without doubt the largest, most beautiful, and complete offering of floral exhibits that this college has ever presented to the public. Flowers of nearly all species are to be seen at the armory. The riding arena has been divided into small plots and beds of ground in which the floral exhibits appear to have grown. As the eye is arrested by the many different hues of the flowers, so is the sense of smell delighted by the pleasing fragrance of the bouquets of chrysanthemums, roses, sweet peas, asters, carnations, and many others.

Along the sides of the arena are displays of cut flowers as they are purchased at the dealers. Some of the florists having these displays are: The Lansing Floral, Smith Floral, the Flower Shop, Terrills Flowers, Baerle Floral, Bessinger Floral, and the College Flower Shop.

Other interesting exhibits include a decorated table set for eight people by the Flower Shop and the Smith Floral of Lansing, and two table decorations by the Collegiate Flower Shop. The Cottage Gardens have landscaped one corner of the arena demonstrating the effective use of shrubs, trees and plants.

Blue Jerseys Eager to Meet Opponents in Biggest Game of Year Tomorrow.

TILT SET FOR 10 O'CLOCK

Spartans Have Won One Game and Lost One During Season.

Michigan State's formidable football eleven will close its 1930 season Saturday morning when the Spartans yearling clash with the University of Detroit team. The game will be played at 10 a. m. in the Spartan stadium and will serve as a preliminary for the Michigan State U. of D. gridiron feature in the afternoon.

Coach John Kobs and his team have been working strenuously this week in preparation for the Titan invasion tomorrow. Featured with a hard scrimmage against Coach Crowley's varsity eleven, the yearlings have put in hard session in order to polish up the defects that showed up in the Grand Rapids game Monday.

The showing made in the Spartans' brilliant 31-7 victory over the Grand Rapids Junior college eleven on Armistice day gave proof of the strength of the first year men. The Kobsmen have developed an aggressive and smashing forward wall and a speedy and clever quartet of ball carriers. This outfit made 20 first downs to Grand Rapids in first 20 minutes.

The Spartan yearlings are exceptionally anxious to overwhelm the Titan frosh as the State team has won one and lost one this far this season. In the opening game the Kobsmen lost to the Ypsilanti frosh by a bad break in the final minutes of play, 19-15. Last week the State frosh whalloped Grand Rapids Junior in a well played game.

With a large field of candidates to pick from, Coach Kobs will be able to select a team that is well fortified at every post. The line will probably average around 183 pounds while Kobs has a backfield quartet averaging over 170 pounds.

In all probabilities Kobs will start the ball carrying combination that worked so well in the Grand Rapids game. Bud Meiers will call signals. Abbie Eliowitz and Bob Monnet will take care of the halfback posts. Joe Kewatch at fullback. Meiers directed the team in commendable show Monday and did part of the line planning. Monnet has proved to be a clever back that opponents find to be exceptionally elusive while Eliowitz is the backbone of the secondary defense and carried the ball on many of the off tackle smashes. Eliowitz also takes care of the punting and most of the passing duties. Joe Kewatch will do the punting.
