OFFER PRIZES FOR BEST PLAY

Theta Alpha Phi Sponsors National Play Writing Contests for College Writers.

The exhibit of contemporary American artists has caused many a student to pause in anxious bewilderment in the halls of the college library. The majority seem to pass on, but a few linger to inspect the pictures more thoroughly. It is extremely difficult to approach these expressions of modernistic art with an unprejudiced mind. The modernists have rejected the principle of faithfully reproducing whatever happens within the field of vision; their aim is to create a mood or a vital impression of an object. If the artist somehow fails to arouse any response from the observer, one can only conclude that he had done his job very badly. The exhibit as a whole is decidedly below the average level of modern art achievement, but even so it is not wholly without value. The few pictures included from the Newhouse Galleries, the Morton Galleries, and the Ferargil Galleries show a pronounced discrimination in favor of the more worthwhile and incidentally more conservatist moderns.

Particularly noteworthy is a large oil painting by George Barr entitled "La Place." This picture, a scene at a railroad shipping yard, typifies the unrest and excitement of modern industry by the use of diagonal lines and strong color contrasts. The painter is well grounded in composition and has a keen sense of color values.

"Winter Scene," a watercolor of Birchfield, is one of the most popular pictures in the exhibit. A decided feeling of bleakness, cold, desolate winter pervades this picture and tends by the strength of mood to subdue a very evident emphasis towards design. An exquisite bit of work is "Decoartion" by McMorris. An archer upon a brown and white banner approaches the receding tide while brilliant flammes wing by. This design shows great attention concentrated upon infinite details such as little engraved curvatures upon each wave and yet there is strength and power in the proudly arched neck of the steed, and swiftness in the flight of the flammes. This work is loaned by the Ferargil Galleries which has also contributed two other particularly splendid drawings—Evening Calm, by Delbos, and Two Riders of Hunt Discreet.

Others worth mentioning are "Farm" by Jones, "Venetian Palace" by Ernest Fiene, "Watercolor" of Emil Holzhafer, "The Portrait" by Umberto Romano, "Self-Portrait" by Vincent Camade, and "Brick Buildings" of Jose Clemente Orozco.

Some of the best works in the exhibit are the prints in Room 410 of Old Hall Rockwell Kent is represented by two very fine prints, "The Flame and The Leaves," "Landscape" by Adolf Dehn, and a portrait, "O. K. Chesterton," by Walter Little both received prizes for student competition and in many respects are much superior to some of the pictures included in the regular exhibit.

Before a crowd of 600 people, including 18 debate teams from surrounding high schools, Michigan State's affirmative debate team lost its second meet of the year last night at Lansing Eastern auditorium when the strong team from Notre Dame university outargued them on the question, "Resolved, that the nations should adopt a plan of complete disarmament, except for such forces as are necessary for police purposes." By virtue of this victory Notre Dame kept its record of no defeats in the past seven years intact. M. J. Weiss of Albion was the judge.

KOBS' BALL TOSERS BATTLE FOR POSITIONS ON SOUTHERN TRIP TEAM; 35 CANDIDATES TRYOUT

Green and White Squad Leaves Last Week in March With 16 Men; Six Games Are Scheduled Against Strong Southern Aggregations.



The prospect of a southern baseball trip during spring vacation is offering plenty of incentive for 35 candidates working out daily under the watchful eye of Coach John Kobs, State diamond mentor. Sixteen men will make the trip by bus and will leave East Lansing either March 28 or 29 and engage six strong southern teams. No cut will be made in the squad until the training trip, Coach Kobs has announced.

Teams which will probably furnish opposition for the Spartan nine on the southern trip include Vanderbilt, St. Xavier, Miami college of Oxford, O., and Maryville college in Tennessee.

Others may be slated, as all of State's southern opponents have not yet been signed. Last year Cumberland and Dayton were on the early schedule, but it is not considered likely that they will be listed this year.

Indications are that State will have an unusually strong diamond aggregation this year. There are plenty of promising men trying out for nearly every position and competition is unusually keen for places on the first nine. Many veterans are among the candidates and much likely looking material has advanced from last year's freshman team coached by L. E. Frimodt.

Infield Promising

The first drill on the Spartan diamond was to be held Monday afternoon at which time Coach Kobs expected to stage a practice game to enable him to get a better line-up in the quality of his material.

The infield is rapidly rounding into shape. The first base position is causing the Spartan mentor the most worry at the present time. Breitwieser, a junior, is leading the candidates at the present time. However Max Crall, a veteran, is recovering from an operation for appendicitis and is expected to be ready to work out within a few days and will probably lead the race for the initial sack. Johnny Madonna, a sophomore, has been playing shortstop regularly in early drills and shows much promise. He is hitting well and works like a well-oiled machine while fielding. Madonna is expected to return to school spring term and will furnish serious competition for turn-off.

Freddy Danziger and Chum Cutters are waging a merry battle for the second base position. Danziger is a sophomore and seems to hold the edge in the race for the key slot position. Vincent Peay and R. K. Kuhnle appeared destined to fight it out for the third base job during most of the season. There is little to choose from in these candidates. Peay also has his eye on second and may be shifted from the hot corner.

Veteran Outfield

Coach Kobs will have a veteran outfield available. Outstanding among the candidates are Pop Warner, Captain Al Sachs, Gibbs, Van Patten, and Gross. The first three listed are letter men and are the likely choices to stay in the garden.

Three athletes are in the running for the catcher's position. James Barnard, who did most of the work behind the plate last season, holds a comfortable margin in this chase. However Keith Byrne and Jimmy Haynes, who spelled Jabbie last year, may see plenty of action.

Eight men are striving for places on the Spartan pitching staff. The most forceful were sadly depleted last year through the loss of Jerry Byrne through graduation. The former State hurling ace is now with the Chicago White Sox. Charley Griffin, sophomore sophomore, showing the most promise of any hurlers in early drills. He has had an abundance of hurling experience and counted upon to make a good start filling Byrne's shoes.

Hurlers Return

Jumbo Kobb, Pete Bullock, and John Langdon, the 1938 stars, are in the pitchers' ranks and should do plenty of manly work. Fred Weir, a sophomore, shared the deck with Griffin on the freshman team last fall and is being counted upon to help State this spring. Behnke and Hayes are so trying for places on the hurling staff as is Hutchins, the only senior left with exception of Griffin.
