CALL OUT THE HEARSE—

The Inter-fraternity council is dead. After a lingering illness of several weeks, the former symbol of strength has finally passed into the great beyond with but faint traces of the deliberative, spineless body remaining. And what will happen next is hard to predict.

Despite numerous efforts on the part of members and officers of the organization, the president of the council has neglected to even attempt the revival of the group. He seems to have given up all hopes, even though various fraternity representatives have declared their readiness to cooperate in gathering up the loose ends in an effort to reorganize.

The Student Council investigated the conditions of the Council last week and on the assurance that a reorganization meeting would be called immediately, action was deferred. Another week has passed and the time has arrived for definite action.

The News believes that if allowed to exist, the Inter-fraternity council should be reorganized at once. The over-due election of officers should be held, the by-laws of the organization which have been in the hands of a committee for several months should be presented and approved, and a serious effort should be put forth to reinstate the council to a prominent and powerful place in campus activities. Unless such action is taken, the Inter-fraternity council should be abolished!

WHERE ARE THE COMPOSERS?

For several years various organizations on the campus have been trying to secure some new Spartan songs, but to no avail. Excelsior, all-campus men's honorary, has taken up the battle again this year by sponsoring a song contest which closes on May 29.

With the increase in enrollment and interest in the Michigan State Institute of Music this year, the honorary heads thought that the entries for the contest would be numerous. As yet, however, no songs have been submitted to the committee in charge.

It has long been evident that the college needs some new songs and with the high interest in music here, there should be some students on the campus who are capable of composing some original compositions. A worthwhile prize is offered and the News believes that the student body should get behind the "new song movement." Only a little more than a week remains before the contest closes.

Halladay, secretary of the college, will leave on May 20 for Boulder, Colorado, to attend the annual meeting of the business officers and secretaries of the National Organization of Colleges and Universities. Representatives from all the advanced schools in the United States will be present. The meeting last year was held at Urbana, Ill., when Secretary Halladay represented this college.

Next Saturday, May 24, has been set for the annual Semi-Final Finals event to which are invited all students and members of the college staff who have some interest in botany. The destination this year is Mackinac Island, lying about four miles west of North Muskegon. Because of the distance of about 115 miles the cars will start at 5 a. m. from the Biology building, returning to East Lansing about 5 p. m.

B. L. Spencer, a representative of the United States Gypsum Co., Chicago, was at the chemistry department Friday, May 16, interviewing senior chemists for prospective positions with the company. The U. S. Gypsum Co. is one of the largest firms of its type in the United States and greatly employs many college graduates in chemistry.

Miss Jessie Fremont Clark, history of art instructor in the college department, delivered a lecture on Picturesque in the home of the Port Huron Country club, Friday, May 16. The talk was given to a group of 300 women of St. Clair county in the Home Economics extension work who have been studying home furnishings for the year.

Dr. A. LeClerc of the federal chemical department at Washington was a visitor on the campus Wednesday, May 14. He spent much time in going through the chemistry building and through the chemistry classes. He is very much interested in the work done by the respective chemistry classes. Dr. LeClerc is a cereal chemist.

The annual spring art exhibit which is staged yearly by the art department of the college, will open at 3 o'clock Sunday, May 25, and will remain open that day until 5. The exhibit will be made up entirely of students' work and will be shown in the corridors and drawing rooms on the fourth floor of Olds hall.

Hunt of the Zoology department had been selected as a member of the Eugenics Research Association of that society. Dr. Hunt was also made a member of the section committee for section 7 (Zoological Sciences). Both appointments extend over a period of one year. This society is one of the largest organizations of this type in the world.

Hawkes is at present located at Ludington, Mich., where he has found air currents favorable for glider experiments.

Mr. Markham has been in Lansing for the past two weeks where he has given two speeches at the Central Methodist Temple house. He is also writing a book on the "Social Vision of Jesus" in prose. He is also revising all of his poems in order to bring them out in their first complete edition in 1931.

He received perhaps the highest honor in his life on his birthday in 1929. He was elected to the American Academy of Arts and Letters. This is an academy which corresponds with the French Academy, a select body of artists, 40 in number, sometimes called the 40 immortals. In our case we have 50 members. Markham is also president of the Poetry Society of America.
