However, there has been no trouble in placing those who had to live outside of dormitories. Miss Conrad states that 241 girls have been located in off-campus houses. This number excludes 71 who are earning their board and room in town houses and more than 75 who are living with relatives in Lansing and East Lansing.

In spite of the rush and excitement of freshman week members of the class of 1934 are reminded that they can not miss classes at will unless they are willing to suffer the penalty that the school imposes for such an offense. The penalty for failing to attend class is the imposition of one negative credit with the twelfth unexcused absence, and each six succeeding cuts will bring another negative credit.

A negative credit is an additional one which is added to the total number of credits that a student must earn to graduate. Unexcused absences or cuts are counted from one term to another, and each student is allowed eleven cuts per year without receiving a negative credit.

SLIGHT DROP REGISTERED OVER FIGURES OF LAST YEAR; EXPECT NO LOSS IN TOTAL ENROLL

Result of Wednesday Influx; Biginess Denomina Registrar Reports 900 Bona-fide Pred Not Expected to Seriously Lower Tetal.

FIGURES RECEIVED from the registra s office this nor show a slight decrease in freshmen enfollment over that of a year ago. According to the latest available statistics, Mist Elida Yakely, registrar, states that at 11 o'clock Thursday morning 958 new students had enrolled in Michigan State. Of these, there are 900 bona fide freshmen and 58 transfer students.

The drop in new students is not alarming, being less than 50 persons. At this same time last year there were 947 bona fide freshmen. However, it is conservatively estimated that by the end of the registration period there will be sufficient late enrollments to bring the figure up to last year's record. 


