The "Three C's" Gave State a Winner in Football

Michigan State College achieved signal recognition in football by beating Colgate University Saturday after waging an uphill battle for many years. Our athletes in other major sports have gained national fame, but last week was the first time that a college gridiron team from East Lansing has startled the nation's sport critics. Michigan State has provided track and cross-country stars who have ranked with the best in the country and Sportan basketball teams have swept aside some of the strongest opposition. Our baseball teams have been highly successful for the past few years, especially when we won the state collegiate championship last spring, and now we can boast of a powerful football combination which upset the giant Maroon team that previously led the nation's teams in scoring and was rated as one of the most feared elevens in the east.

State's last football victory over a major opponent was scored in 1918 when we defeated

State's last football victory over a major opponent was scored in 1918 when we defeated Notre Dame, 13 to 7. Our gridiron team was not outstandingly successful that year, as we

Notre Dame, 13 to 7. Our gridiron team was not outstandingly successful that year, as we bowed in defeat to three Western Conference teams. Although it is no disgrace, Michigan, Purdue and Wisconsin scored victories over our gridders that season.

It is necessary to go back into records for the 1915 season to discover a significantly important football victory. That was the year we swamped the University of Michigan eleven, 24 to 0. Captain Blake Miller, L. L. Frimodig, Del VanDervoort, "Brownie" Springer and Blacklock were some of the stars of this famous team. J. F. Macklin was the coach in 1915 and George F. Gauthier was his assistant.

State made a credible showing against Michigan, our most bitter athletic rivals, in 1925 and held the Wolverines to a 7 to 0 victory and in 1928 we limited the Michigan eleven to a 3 to 0 win.

We have been making rapid progress in football since engaging James H. (Sleepy) Crowley, one of Notre Dame's mythical "Four Horsemen," as head coach two years ago. Last year the Spartans made history by running over Mississippi A. & M. 33 to 19 to win their first game on a foreign field in many years. Coach Crowley was handicapped last season by not having the advantage of spring football Last year the S 19 to win their practice, but developed a team that was not soon forgotten by our op-

Coach Casteel must be given much credit for the complete way in which he scouted Colgate and taught the Spartans the most effective defense against the Marcon formations.

We have a football squad this year of which we can justly be proud. Every man who was given a chance to play against Colgate Saturday staged the best performance of his career and the gridders were heart and soul in their task. The men who were on the sidelines, particularly those who have opposed the varsity in practice, did much more toward the victory than the average fan believes. The two injured Spartans who
