AUTUMN FLORAL DISPLAY OPENS

Prominent Florists From Other
Cities to Enter Exhibits
Show New Flowers.

The third annual Fall Flower Show opened today with the greatest display of floral exhibits ever offered in this vicinity. An unusually large number of exhibits arranged according to a new plan worked out for this year's event, combined with an elaborate scheme of decorations, indicates that the Michigan State Florists Association has not failed in its attempt to make the 1930 fair the biggest and best show ever staged on the campus.

Nearly similar in size, however, from the woodlands of southern Alabama is the keynote of the decorations theme. It is draped over and around the steel work in Demonstration hall to blend with the patterns of autumn leaves still clinging, crimsoned with sprays of various sizes, complete the background.

Ed Gross of Grand Rapids has created a center feature built up of pot-and-flower which ascend in a pyramid as they bend over a group of palms at the apex. Another prominent feature of the display is a water rock garden exhibited by Cottage Gardens of Lansing, while Jewel of Mason presents an unusual array of silk bows.

Retail booths ranged along the walls exhibiting a variety of treatments. One has a background of color suggesting a children's playground. Another is built against a rustic background with a rail fence and corn stalks as the chief features. In contrast to the rustic booth is one that has as its keynote classic statuary and modernistic silhouettes.

Nearly every florist in Lansing, East Lansing and nearby towns is entering one or more classes to set a new record in the number of exhibitors to participate in a flower show here. The Home Garden club of Lansing and East Lansing entered the class for table decorations for four. This class, which is open only to garden clubs, is sponsored by Mrs. Frances King, a well-known florist in the city.

THE DETROIT GAME
Student sentiment greatly favored the action taken by the Athletic Council and Faculty in ruling that the University of Detroit-Michigan State football game will be played in East Lansing on November 22 as originally scheduled. The Michigan State News is of the opinion that the faculty handled the entire proposal in a very commendable manner.

As for the matter of charity, the faculty as well as the entire student body realizes the value and need for work along this line but in the case that has come up this week it was found that neither the faculty nor the athletic council have authority to distribute college funds, thus no action was taken concerning the proposed donation to charity.

The protests registered by the Student Council and in the petitions sponsored by Blue Key were received and considered by the athletic council and faculty during the joint gathering yesterday. The strong sentiment on the campus in opposition to the change in scene and date plan was taken into account.

We believe that under the present circumstances that the University of Detroit-Michigan State grid game should be played as originally scheduled and that in upholding the contract made a year ago with the Titans, the faculty showed good judgement.



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Spartans Anxious to Win Over North Dakota

**GRIDDERS STILL FEEL STING
OF LOSS TO GEORGETOWN U.;
BISONS PRESENT STRONG TEAM**

**State Eleven Far From Demoralized, But Aims to Get Back Into
Winning Column This Week; Nordberg Out and
Eliowitz Start is Doubtful.**

DEFEATED ONCE, but far from being crushed in spirit or demoralized, Michigan State's fighting grid team will open football relations with North Dakota State tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock in an attempt to annihilate the Bisons on their first visit to the Spartan stadium. The Dakota team is anything but a set-up and the Spartans, still smarting from the Georgetown defeat, will be extended in turning back the big westerners. The Dakota team has plenty of weight and power and present a very formidable lineup.

The Bison line averages some where in the vicinity of 196 pounds per man while the backfield is not far behind with a 182 average. The invaders are captained by Leo May, a 185-pound halfback, who has proven a valuable cog in the Bison team this year. They have only been defeated once this season. Coach Casey Phelan's men having dropped one engagement this season and that to North Dakota university to the tune of 14 to 7.

Coach Jimmy Crowley and his assistants have been driving the Spartan griddiers all week so that Saturday should see a much more powerful team offensively and defensively than that which trotted out on the clay of Griffith park last Friday night. The Crowleymen seemed to lack the last, important punch on several occasions last week and the Spartan grid mentor has endeavored to remedy the trouble during the sessions this week.

It is very doubtful whether the stellar Spartan fullback, Abe Eliowitz, will be in the lineup at the opening whistle.

The hard hitting sophomore, who played an outstanding game last Friday is still having trouble with his ankles. Despite the fact that his peers were more or less wobbly in the George game, the general Detroit fullback proved to be Coach Crowley's best ground gainer. Eliowitz is on the bench. Bullet Joe Kowalewski will be Crowley's closer. The former Indiana star is always dependable and a terrible line crusher.


