LABOR OFFICIAL SEEKS MEETING

Calls State Board to Discuss Alleged Wage Scale Reductions.

Rep. Frank Wade of Flint, president of the Michigan Federation of Labor, has requested a special meeting of the board of agriculture to discuss the alleged cut in the scale of bricklayers in the construction of the girls dormitory at Michigan State college.

The bricklayers protested last week that the petition of Mu Eta Omicron, local honorary musical society, for Mu Phi Epsilon has been granted and that a chapter will be installed on the campus early in the new year. Student Council to Entertain the Detroit Leaders at Noon Tomorrow.

Spartan Day Planned to Honor Team

Nearly 19,000 Spectators to Witness Annual Fall Clash Tomorrow.

TROPHY TO BE OFFERED

Galaxy of Celebrities Come for Final Appearance of Crowleymen.

With the traditional gridiron clash between the University of Detroit and Michigan State looming on the horizon, thousands of alumni and Spartan followers are pouring into East Lansing in anticipation of the colorful game tomorrow. With a complete sellout of seats virtually assured, one of the largest crowds ever to witness a game in the Spartan stadium is expected to see State make her bid to settle an old score with the Detroit institution. A good proportion of the multitude will hail from the Michigan metropolis, many arriving on special trains which will be brought in on the college siding overlooking the followers but a few steps from the stadium.

Temporary seats were erected at the ends of the field early in the week but to the great demand for tickets, additional bleachers were necessitated. It is believed that 18,400 tickets will be sold by the time of the game, over 1000 having been dispensed at noon today.

Special arrangements are being made to handle the huge crowd in an efficient manner. The athletic department urges the student body and followers to enter the stadium not later than 1:30. At the last well-attended home game, hundreds of people missed practically all of the first quarter, due to the heavy traffic conditions around the stadium and campus.

The preliminary plans call for a giant parade set by the Michigan State Military band which will be held shortly before 1:30. The parade will end at the advertising reservation and will be followed by an all-college dance.

Administrative officials were permitted by the demand for the enormous last and close competition between Athletic and Student Councils, indicated in the plans for the recognition program to honor the athletic team and coaching staff.

A small committee consisting of Stanley Cessar, senior representative; Frank Conover, junior class president; and Richard Cook, intermediate class representative, are in charge of the details for the event.



STATE GIVEN CHANCE TO CLIMAX SEASON WITH WIN OVER HIGHLY TOUTED U. OF DETROIT ELEVEN

Best Green and White Football Team in Recent Years to Take Field Against Gus Dorais Invaders; Seat Sellout Is Certain.

This week has seen long and strenuous practices on the board for his men and when they trot out on the field tomorrow they are going to give the visitors plenty to worry about.

Every member of the line received plenty of exercise and the Spartan coach was not sparse with criticism if it was needed. Blocking was especially stressed and field were also given a chance at heaving the pigskin. Coach Crowley took special care in perfecting the Spartan defense against the Titan overhead attack. On several occasions the State mentor heaved the oval himself.

Crowley's exact lineup will not be known until his white-jerseyed warriors ramble on to the field tomorrow but there will be few exceptions from his regular lineup.

Jake Fase and Myron (Red) Vandeemer, two ace flankers from western Michigan are having a battle royal for the right end job. Both of them will probably be called on to play during the game, with the flaming-haired Grand Rapids star having the starting edge.

Cecil Fogg will be in shape to function at top form on the left end of the line. Harold Hagan, Fogg's relief man, was incapacitated this week and Long Handler or possibly Fase may be switched to left end if Fogg's old injury grows troublesome.

Don Ridder and Ralph Brumette will beat their respective tackles and should convince the down-timers that the Spartan line isn't easily pierced. Claude Stroh and Mill Creek will be at the guards with Buddie Mason at the center position.

The Spartan attack will be led by Bob Grimes. Spartan quarterback who will bark signals for the last time in a State uniform. Bob Monnett is without doubt far left half and will end a year of brilliant gridiron feats for his college tomorrow. The right half job in the doubtful position with Alvy Jerry Brown or Don Warren stated for duty. Brown has a slight edge but both may see service. Abe Gluskin will most likely resume his duties as official line-sniffer although Joe Kewchal is also sure to get a chance to turn in some of his hurtling paces at fullback.
