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# Hold State Intercollegiate Track Meet Here Tomorrow Afternoon

## STATE LOSES SECOND GAME TO JAPS WEDNESDAY; BEAT CENTRAL STATE THURSDAY

Encounter With Japanese Provides Founders' Day Spectators With Rare Display of Class; Wakabayashi and Gibbs Stage Pitching Spectacle.

Michigan State's baseball nine broke even in two games played on Wednesday and Thursday. Hosi university of Japan made it two in a row in the Founders' day feature, defeating the Spartans, 4-1. On Thursday the Kalsmen journeyed to Mt. Pleasant and trounced Central State Teachers college nine in a free hitting contest, 16-5.

The Hosi-Spartan game proved to be one of the best ever played on the East Lansing diamond. A rare pitching duel between Wakabayashi, Jap ace hurler, and Capt. Gibbs, coupled with brilliant work in the field for the visitors, provided a real game for the Founders' day visitors.

The speedy Japs jumped into the lead in the first frame when a triple, two walks, and a single counted for two tallies. No scoring was accomplished from this point until the seventh when Hosi, lunched a triple, a double, and a single for two additional tallies.

The Spartans hardly had a scoring chance until the ninth when Wakabayashi weakened momentarily and the Spartans scored their lone run after Capt. Gibbs opened the inning with a double to left. Barnard singled and then Gibbs scored on an infield out. Kircher singled a few moments later but the Jap hurler ended the game by striking out Fawcett, who was batting in place of Gafner.

Wakabayashi and his teammates set the Spartans down in 1-2-3 order for five straight innings previous to the ninth by brilliant fielding work. The State hitters were banging the ball hard all day but were playing in hard luck.

Capt. Gibbs, although losing control on a few occasions, pitched good ball and allowed the sure hitting Japs to six safeties. It was the State leader's first appearance in the box on the home schedule.

Spartans Win Easily Pounding out a total of 17 hits, Michigan State scored an easy triumph over Central State Thursday afternoon. The Spartans solved the delivery of three Central pitchers and crushed the game with a ten run spree in the seventh.

Central State picked up a two-run lead in the first inning but this advantage was short-lived when the Spartans took the lead in the third. From here on State clearly showed its superiority.

Berwyn Pemberton, sophomore southpaw proved effective throughout the contest for the Kalsmen. Although allowing ten safeties, the left hander lightened in the pitcher to set down the Mt. Pleasant aggregation.

Abbe Ellowitz, first baseman led the Spartans hitting with three long triples.

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## PRACTICE ENDS WITH GAME IN STATE STADIUM

Monett, McNutt, Jones Shine in Spring Football Game Tuesday.

Spring football practice came to an official close Tuesday afternoon with the practice game in the Spartan stadium. State's grid squad was divided into two camps for the same one team wearing blue jerseys, and the other donning the red colors. The Blues line-up consisted of the men Coach Jimmy Crowley expects to rely on next fall in the final molding of the 1931 grid team.

Led by Bob Monnett, star of last year's eleven, the Blues ran two over the Red. Monnett alone turned in half of the Blues scores. Monnett gave an outstanding exhibition and convinced the spectators that the winter vacation from the gridiron had not dimmed any of his ability. The Ohio boy scored three touchdowns and turned in other long gains during the afternoon.

Benard McNutt and Jerry Jones, two yearlings were the other scoring players. McNutt contributing two touchdowns and Jones one. The Red proved little opposition for the Blues who punctured their line at will and ran their end for long gains. Monnett galloped 60 yards on one occasion after taking the ball from center. Jones several times turned in 45 yard runs while McNutt central Allemand fullback proved mighty hard to stop on his line plunges. McNutt looks like one of the best fullback prospects seen here in many seasons and is sure to see some action next fall.

Coach Crowley changed his lineup frequently and used about his entire grid squad during the course of the game. Thus another freshman showed up well on the right side of the Blue line.

Other freshmen who showed up well were James Dekker, classmate center from Mackinac, who played on the Red. Hanson and Beachy also showed up to good advantage. The Blue line was vastly superior to the Red.
