and educators in American colleges. More and more the college newspaper is becoming an important training ground for journalists. How to breed in this field the editorial independence and courage that is the hope of tomorrow's commercial journalism, and yet maintain the necessary control that institutional financial backing demands is an intricate problem. Too many college editors, faced with the need for financial support from his administrative superiors, finds himself formed into a training

faced with the need for financial support from his administrative superiors, finds himself forced into a tacit censorship that hampers materially his scope of influence. American educators should realize the importance of the journalistic training that is being obtained on their campuses, and the value of allowing their student publications leeway to act as organs of influence. Censorship of any sort is a cowardly method of control, especially when exercised through control of the "purse strings."

The collegiate press today is often charged with officious meddling in matters that supposedly do not concern them. That college editors should dare to criticise or condemn anyone outside their own student life is often regarded as sheer impertinence. In this attitude institutions fail to notice the absurdity of spending huge sums of money to educate American, youth, to make reputable citizens of them, and then prohibit any expressions of opinion on their part. Unless-American people can learn to differentiate between good and bad newspapers, journalism will remain a prostituted profession. prostituted profession.

Charges of sensationalism have been leveled at the Daily, due, the editors say, to the fact that three banner lines were recently displayed on their front page. Such charges have also been hurled at the Michigan State News, It is, again, a worful result of confusing technical styles of make-up with the spirit behind the brand of journalism. Screaming banners do not make yellow newspapers.

The college editor is, in the main, a level-headed fellow; and while usually liberal in viewpoint, nevertheless is cognizant of his importance and influence. Very seldom has one given cause for the stern disciplinary methods so often handed out by faculty supervisors. It is all a remnant of the antiquated educational idea that students must be parted into a common mold and become a blind, apathetic class of "yes-men."

If we have begun to create two separate fanguages the fault lies not with the talkers but with the writers.—Heywood Broun.
