A REVIVAL

Student interest and participation in campus publications has been steadily on the wane in recent years at Michigan State. Undergraduate journalistic endeavors have been carried on with ballyhooed staffs in recent months and this has been reflected on occasions in the quality of the publication.

In all cases it has been the business staffs of the various publications which have suffered to the greatest extent. The ephemeral clamoring which some have associated with settling has led a greater number of students to try out for the respective editorial staffs while the seemingly dead details of the business organizations have faded to get the proper student interest.

The relatively small number of students who do try out for place on student publications fail to realize that as members of business staffs they will obtain the experience and contacts that will have a News

material value after graduation. A regrettable feature of campus publications is that so few business administration students try out for positions, or the opportunities to put in practice many of the theories learned in the classroom.

The all-college journalism banquet which is being sponsored next week is a constructive step by the student publications in the right direction. In interesting more students they are making a definite move to improve the quality of their individual publications. The banquet, if properly supported, should accomplish much in the revival of student participation.
