PENDING LEGISLATION THREATENS R. O. T. C. POST

CLASS ELECTIONS TO BE MAIN ISSUE IN ANNUAL SPRING VOTE; NOMINATIONS SET FOR MONDAY

Candidates Will Be Named in Meetings of Freshmen, Sophomore and Junior Classes; Eliminators Scheduled for Wednesday at Union. Final Vote May 25.

With nominations for the officers of president, vice president, secretary and treasurer for next year coming off Monday afternoon in meetings of the freshman, sophomore and junior classes and eliminators scheduled for Wednesday, the annual election of campus political interest has already become very apparent and next week should see the inevitable student campaigning in full swing here.

Plans for this year's spring term elections were set by the Student Council at their meeting on April 19. At this time it was voted to hold nominations in classes held in the morning, sophomore and freshman classes on Monday, May 16. Eliminator meetings were set for Wednesday, May 18, and the final vote on Friday, May 25. In the Union building next Wednesday, all candidates for next year's offices are scheduled for a check-out meeting at 8 o'clock. The final vote will be in the physical building on Monday, May 25.

LOCAL CANOERS HAVE ACCIDENT

Red Cedar Scene of Mishap, No Serious Injuries Result

The Red Cedar river yesterday afternoon was the scene of what might have proved to be a tragedy had it not been for the presence of a man displayed in several persons concerned in a canoeing accident.

Having successfully navigated the rapid water which pours over the dam in the rear of the engineering building, three local canoeists, James Wilson, Robert Cooper, and Dan Dunston, were making a second attempt when Cooper, who was kneeling in the forward portion of the canoe, was struck by a log which had been floating in the water.

Wilson immediately plunged in after him while Dunston remained in the canoe to bring it into position to help the two in the water.

Wilson states that part of the log which struck the dam was full of holes and was so rotten that it was unable to support Cooper and Dunston. He remained under the surface for some time until rescued by two members of the forestry department, for he was brought to shore.

Cooper was not taken to the hospital and his condition today was reported as not at all serious.

Radio Makes Fake Fevers

Local Experts Design Set to Prevent Fever Germs.

After many months of extensive research and experimentation, Herbert E. Graham of the physics department and Dr. F. W. Fabian of the bacteriology department, have developed and constructed a very complex short wave radio designed for the production of artificial fevers.

Since the value of heat as a means of alleviating and curing disease has become generally accepted, various well-known physicians and scientists have gradually developed a modern, portable machine for fevers, commonly known as a Therapeutic Heater.

Dr. Fabian and Mr. Herbert have been working along similar lines and have successfully built a power by continual experimentation with microwaves, ammonia, ether, fever producing short radio waves. The radio waves create a certain heat condition in the body that is similar to that of a fever. The counter program did not regulate the length of the waves, frequency, 20 meters fixed and the passage of radio heat waves from two brass plates, bacteria and inner disease growth are burnt away.

The fever heat is produced directly within the body as the fever of an ill person. The heater proper is a vacuum tube oscillator and full wave rectifier that supplies full voltages for the oscillator. Both temperatures, therefore, have been

APPROVE RULES SUBMITTED BY HOUSEHOLDERS

Administrative Group Accepts Rooming House Code With Changes.

REGULATIONS LISTED

No Major Changes Made In Regulations for Student Conduct.

The administrative group of the college last Thursday afternoon approved of the rules and regulations which were submitted by the Householders Association of East Lansing. The faculty group took exception to some of the rules but no substantial changes were made.

Contrary to some campus rumors the rules and regulations do not contain anything that radically differs with those now in effect. A copy of them is printed in the News today.

The Householders Association held a meeting last Thursday afternoon in the Ag Hall at which time several important matters concerning housing to be discussed. A petition was drawn up and has been presented to college officials requesting that all housing houses be inspected by the college authorities. The association also passed a ruling compelling all members to charge not less than \$2 for 10 meals and not less than \$4 for 15 meals. Mrs. A. G. McKee, president of the organization, presided at the meeting.

The first of the year will be held Thursday, May 19, in the main lecture room of Old Hall. The meeting will be open to town and city residents.

Below are reprinted the Rules and Regulations and information concerning rooming houses for the year. They are contained in the faculty administrative group last week.

Students are required to register in houses approved by the Michigan State college.

Students will not be allowed to room in a house except temporarily during the summer in houses approved by the Michigan State college.

Famed Alumnus Is Dead in East

Dr. James W. Looney, 70, Wants Extensively on Forestry Subjects.

Dr. James W. Looney, 70, died at his home in East Lansing, Michigan, on May 10, 1932, after a long illness. He was a well-known forestry expert and a member of the Michigan Forestry Association.

Dr. Looney was one of the prominent graduates of Michigan State college. After receiving a degree of bachelor of science in 1895, he was appointed in the same department and held that position until 1901.

Between the years of 1901 and 1902 he was dean of forestry at Yale but at the outbreak of the war he returned to Michigan and became a professor in the forestry department.

Passing of Army Appropriations Bill Would Mean End of Military Functions on Campus, Shaw Sends Telegram to Congressmen Urging Its Defeat

The army appropriations bill, which was reported back to the house of representatives recently from the appropriations committee, would mean the practical abandonment of the R. O. T. C. work at Michigan State college if it is passed in its present form.

The bill, introduced by Representative Shaw, and approved by the military department, would cut off the 14 senators and representatives from Michigan and this congressional "tribunal" urging them to do everything in their power to defeat the measure.

The provisions which affect the R. O. T. C. units directly would reduce the number of regular army officers from 12,000 to the present number of 1,000. All summer camps for 1932 and money for the summer camps would be available only for 1933 and money for the summer camps would be available only for 1934.

SPARTANS TO PLAY HILLSDALE NINE HERE TODAY; NOTRE DAME COMING FOR GAME SATURDAY

Northwestern Game Cancelled and Practices Curtailed On Account of Rain; Griffin's Injuries May Keep Him Out of Game With Notre Dame.

With rain causing the cancellation of the Northwestern university baseball game and the postponement until this afternoon of the Hillsdale college encounter, the Michigan State baseball team got a much needed rest this week, after suffering a 7 to 3 trimming at the hands of Michigan State Normal here last Saturday.

The Kolsman were forced to lay off entirely yesterday and only light workouts were held Monday and Tuesday, because of the inundation of Old College field. The heavy rains which fell intermittently throughout the first three days of the week have left the diamond under water in several places.

Hope that the grounds would be in shape for the game this afternoon was held by Coach John Kobs as he anxiously waited to see if his team has gotten back to batting punch after a slump against Ypsilanti. The Spartan bat were checked effectively by the curves of "Lefty" Michaels, star of the Huron pitching staff, who allowed only five hits during the afternoon.

Preparation for the game with the University of Notre Dame were being made today. Injuries which have put Charles Griffin out of the game for several days have caused Kobs no little worry as he is pointing his team for the Rambler struggle. Griffin was counted upon as the sure starter against the Irish, but his incapacity may cause a change in Kobs' lineup. In event that Griffin is unable to start, Berwyn Pennington may get the call to work against the south-south-south of the Irish.

Today's game is not considered an especially tough though Coach Kobs will not take chances and will start his strongest lineup. The pitching assignment is a toss-up. Pete Prose who did some good relief work after he replaced McCaslin Saturday is the most probable starter, with McCaslin and Pennington held in reserve. If the game proves easy it is not at all unlikely that all three pitchers may get a fling against Hillsdale.

Hostilities with Notre Dame which were suspended last year because of inclement weather will be resumed Saturday at Old College field at 4 o'clock. The rivalry between the two teams which has grown into almost a tradition, like the Michigan football game, has in the past caused both teams to play superior baseball with the result that many of the games have been won and lost by the narrowest of margins.

The track team will probably be no exception. The Spartans are on edge for the Irish and if the services of Griffin are available they have an even chance of taking the Ramblers. The Notre Dame squad is considered one of the best in years, and one of the finest teams that the west has produced this year. A victory over them would be a prize of no little merit.

The struggle between Griffin and Prose, both left handers, and both the stars on their respective pitching staffs, have become almost as traditional as the games between the two teams. In the past Griffin has been able to secure wins over the Notre Dame team but only after the closest of battles. The game Saturday will see the continuation of the struggle, assuming all injuries that either way be in condition to start.

Coach Kobs has not definitely decided upon starting Prose in the other today on Saturday's game. He will not know until the last moment just when he will start Prose, with such as Mahoney, Francis, Powell, Meier, Krieger and others are also in the starting line-up. The second and third base positions are occupied by Kobs, Krieger and Prose, with the pitcher for today the pitcher will probably be Prose.

RECORDS FALL AS TRACKMEN DEFEAT IRISH

Thielads Set Four New Records; Wind Prevents More.

MEET PROVES UPSET

Cliff Liberty Wins High Point Honors With Nine Counts.

A fleet-footed Michigan State track team knocked the Irish out of the meet Saturday afternoon. The final score in the match that wavered back and forth with neither team very far in the lead was Michigan State 62, Notre Dame 65.

It was one of the most exciting and best performed meets that have ever been held on Spartan soil. The onlookers were constantly on their toes as they watched the relentless Notre Dame band that has proven so formidable to the Spartans in the past and even beyond the limits of previous performances. The dope was that Notre Dame would win easily with a comfortable margin of 20 or 30 points. But Coach Young's squad could not see it that way, and outdid themselves to conquer the Irish.

Three meet records and a variety record fell, and Alex Wilson of State, Dams equaled the stadium record for the 440 with the last time of 43.9. Only due to the fact that a strong wind from the south

swept through the stadium, Cliff Liberty was deprived of a new 220 low hurdle record when he turned in the time of 23.8. Darling of the visitors high jumped 6 ft. 1 1/2 in for a meet record, and Warren reeled the 880 in 1:58 for a new meet and varsity record.

Ken Lafayette ran the fastest race of his career when he checked off the 100 yard dash in 6.9. In the mile relay, Wilson anchored man for Notre Dame, crossed the final mark just one yard ahead of Ken Monty Holcomb tied with three of the visitors at 12 feet in the pole vault.

Liberty crossed behind Bath in the 120 yard hurdles for a second place and then won the 220 low hurdles with Bath on his heels. Small did some fast legging over the two mile circuit to defeat Howes who had been having things his own way until Saturday.

Liberty was first in high point honors, amassing nine points to his credit, while Bath, Lafayette, and Egan of Notre Dame tied for second place with eight points each. Wilson of Notre Dame was next with 7 1/2 points. Nineteen men scored points for each team.
