STUDENTS PROTEST LEGISLATIVE INQUIRY

Ace Brigade's Band To Play At Senior Ball

PROMINENT BAND TO MAKE SENIOR PROM OUTSTANDING FOURTH YEAR SOCIAL EVENT

Promise of Broadcasting Orchestra to Play for Formal Given by Class of '33 at Lansing Ballroom Arouses Much Interest in Party to Be Held March 3.

ACE BRIGADE: The Ace Brigade and its 14 Virginians were announced as the Senior Ball orchestra by William Vondette, senior class president, this noon.

Assurance Wednesday that one of three nationally known and popular dance orchestras will play at the Senior Prom, March 3, stimulated interest on the campus in that prominent formal party. Ace Brigade, Cab Calloway, and Duke Ellington are the directors under consideration, one of which will bring his band to Lansing for the benefit of M. S. C. dancers. Any one of these orchestras will easily be the best ever brought here for the Senior Prom.

Announcement that the party is to be held in Lansing, either at the Masonic temple or at the ballroom of the Hotel Olds, establishes a precedent for senior formal. Until this year the prom has always been held on the campus, but to the care of the large crowd gathered and to give the dance guests the most entertainment possible, a large downtown ballroom will be secured.

Arrangements for the party are now in progress. In order to bring a nationally known broadcasting orchestra here at a price which will make the dance available to most students, no favor except cash advance program favors will be given, it was announced recently. Arrangements of decorations and other features will be made soon.

Interest in the Senior Prom is as high as it is the last formal to be given by the fourth year students. With a prominent orchestra and a Lansing ballroom, the party this year promises to be by far the most outstanding formal ever given at M. S. C. Ace Brigade is expected to play for the Sophomore Class at Purdue, and Cab Calloway and Duke Ellington need no introduction to radio listeners.

Final arrangements for the annual Frosh Frolic to be held in the ballroom of the Union buildings Saturday, Feb. 18, have been completed by the committee. Music for the affair will be furnished by Billy Miller and his Melodians, a Del DeBenedictis-Ray Correll attraction from Detroit.

OFFICIALS TALK WITH BACHMAN; RECORD IS GOOD

Previous Positions at Northwestern, Kansas State, and University of Florida.

ACTION DELAYED

Follows Rockne Coaching System; Favorably Impressed in Visit Here.

Charles W. Bachman, head coach of the University of Florida for the past five seasons, paid Michigan State college campus a brief visit Monday and Tuesday to interview Spartan athletic officials concerning his candidacy for the vacant football coaching position.

Bachman is the second man to be invited to East Lansing as a possibility to fill Jim Crowley's job. Coach Wynne Auburn, Ala., was the first man interviewed, but since his appearance here he has been considered out of the picture as a candidate. He is generally understood to be renewing his contract at Alabama Polytechnic at a larger salary.

It was unofficially stated late this afternoon that Charles W. Bachman will be Michigan State's next grid coach. College officials, while not committing themselves, have expressed the opinion that the former Florida coach is the most logical candidate for the grid job. Official announcement of the coach chosen for State will undoubtedly come with the meeting of the State Board of Agriculture February 16.

East Lansing Monday afternoon at 3 p.m. leaving here Tuesday afternoon for Detroit. He spent his time in meeting with the college personnel committee, the athletic council, and President Robert S. Shaw. While here he also inspected the campus and athletic facilities.

We are convinced that Bachman is a high-powered man, commented Ralph H. Young, director of athletics. He is also known to have made a favorable impression with the college officials he met. It is unlikely that any public action will be taken in securing Bachman or any other candidate until the state board meets a week from today.

Bachman expressed pleasure with the state athletic equipment and facilities and with the departmental men whom he met. He was tendered a dinner at the Union building on Monday evening by the athletic council.

FORESTERS HOLD ANNUAL MEETING

Saginaw Man Elected to Head Michigan Association Here Last Week.

The annual meeting of the Michigan Association of Municipal, County and Public Utility Foresters was held Feb. 3. New officers were chosen: President, Frederick Pierce, residence forester, state highway department, Saginaw; vice president, L. C. Palmer, forester with the Kent county road commission, Grand Rapids; secretary, Karl Dressel, M. S. C. forestry department. The executive committee was also chosen and is composed of P. A. Herbert, M. S. C.; J. M. Bennett, forester with the Wayne county road commission; and Phelps Vogelbein, forester for the state highway department in Lansing.

There were 100 persons present, 75 of whom are graduates of this college and now actively engaged in municipal forestry work. The club is one of the largest of its kind in the United States. At their meeting they had talks on the Japanese Beetle, Tree Diseases, State Parks, and other things. They also planned a meeting for next summer in Ann Arbor as guests of E. A. Twenty Thousand Enjoy Farmers' Week Program

Many Students Assist in Making Event One of Most Successful.

Climaxed by a completely filled demonstration hall Thursday evening for the final evening performance, Farmers' Week closed with an estimated attendance of twenty thousand visitors on the campus during the past week. Such a gathering is well recognized as one of the largest agricultural meetings in the country.

Thursday's evening program was very similar to that of the preceding night, but that did not prevent many farmers from attending both meetings. All seats and temporary bleachers were crowded for the final session which was in charge of R. W. Tenney, director of short courses. A concert by the college band, directed by Leonard Falcone, opened the program, followed by a parade of livestock. Entertainment was provided by the lumberjack orchestra and clog dancer from Oratio county, community singing, the high school chorus, exhibitions by physical education students, and a chicken catching contest. The main speaker of the session was Samuel T. Metzger, state commissioner of agriculture, who was introduced by President R. S. Shaw.

The final event of the Thursday night program was the lightweight horse pulling contest. This was won by the Fowler Brothers' team from Reading by pulling a 2,100 pound load the required distance of 27 1/2 feet. The Michigan State Prison team from Jackson was second, followed by Clair McLean's team from St. Louis.

Winners in the rural drama contest held in the State theater Friday afternoon were: first, West Bloomfield Players of Oakland county, directed by Edward Olson; second, Maple River Players of Clinton county, directed by Gustaf Hillyer; third, Speaker Township.

Players from Sandiac county, directed by Mrs. U. S. Kipp.

The shooting contest, which is becoming an annual affair, was won by E. E. Cook of Lansing with a total of 50 points. Second place went to H. L. Norton of Sheppard with 48 points, and C. Holder of Laingsburg scored 31 points for third place.

Fred Killeen, associate director of the music institute and Mrs. Robert Graham of the music department acted as judges at the Grand singing contest which was attended by over two hundred persons. Winners were: Portland, first; Silver Creek Grange of Plainfield, second; and Hudson Center Grange, third.

Students of the college played a large part in the entertainment and instructions offered. The rural folk in the programs, both the club, the band, physical education students, and military students were prominent. Students also had charge of the Little International Livestock Fitting and Showing exhibition Thursday and the Student Grange presented plays and drill work for the visitors.

In the exhibits, various departments cooperated with the students in putting on demonstrations. These included: agricultural engineering, poultry, forestry, dairy, landscape architecture, farm management, sociology, farm and home, veterinary, anatomy, soils, farm crops, chemistry, botany, and home economics. The engineering division also showed the laboratories of the various departments under normal operating conditions with students performing experiments.

Special programs were held for the women who attend the week's activities, their headquarters being in the Home Economics building. Prominent women speakers were gathered here from the nation and spoke on pertinent subjects to the women. Speakers included: Mrs. W. Smith, state leader in extension work in home economics.

RESOLUTION STATES FAITH OF COUNCIL IN OFFICIALS; ELECTION LAWS REVIEWED

Confidence in Administration is Key-note of Official Statement From Student Council; Rules for College Polling Are Submitted at Last Night's Meeting.

First official action of any student organization in regard to the pending legislative investigation of college affairs was taken by the Student Council in this week's meeting. When a formal resolution was drawn up and accepted by that body expressing "confidence in the integrity and ability of the governing officers at this school."

Coming as it does, the unanimous decision of a group representing the entire student body of Michigan State college, this resolution has for its purpose the discounting of all notions that students at this college are in sympathy with any further movements toward secession of the institution's officials.

Discussion of this matter at Wednesday's meeting of the governing body revealed opinions of its various members to the effect that students in general are no longer interested in an investigation which they feel reflects the personal attitudes of a few dissatisfied politicians and former college officials. Students in general are reported to be fed up on such publicity for Michigan State and would be perfectly content to let the grand jury's decision rest as final.

The Student Council has thus far withheld its official opinion on the entire line of the investigation question, but with a prospect of further unfavorable publicity now imminent it was felt that some official statement should be taken by the student body through its governing body.

Further business, conducted at this week's council meeting consisted of a discussion centering around the new set of student election rules which were submitted for official sanction. These include all details of procedure in the nomination, elimination, and final election of student officers. A final vote on their adoption was deferred by the Council until next week's meeting.

NAME WINNERS OF WOOD CONTEST

Farmers Identify Samples Taken From Common Farm Woodlands.

Winners of the wood identification contest held Farmers' Week were announced Tuesday by the forestry department. Edward Ward of Freeport taking first prize, a Kelly double-bitted axe, with a score of 96.3 per cent. The contest was to give the common names of numbered hand specimens of Michigan's woodland trees. Forty samples were to be named, each averaging five inches in length with the bark intact. The samples were in the forestry exhibit at Demonstration hall.

Students and faculty members were ineligible for prizes, but honorable mention went to David J. Beaudet, graduate student in forestry, and Gerrit F. Bath, junior in forestry. A Kelly single-bitted axe went to Charles Anderson of Freeport as second highest, while a woman, Mrs. Lloyd Weyant, Lansing, won the third award, a sheathed Kelly camp axe.

More than 125 contestants entered, and it was the consensus of opinion among them that the contest had the quality of a good game and the value of being educational. Wood sections used in the exhibit are now available at the department for any persons to check over.

BARITONE HAS BIG RECEPTION

Large Audience Hears Heinrich Schlusnus at First Concert of Term.

Appearing before a near-capacity crowd which filled a room in the Union buildings, Heinrich Schlusnus, baritone, presented the first winter term concert on the college concert course Tuesday night.

Enthusiastic applause which followed Schlusnus' first group of Schubert songs grew in length and volume until after the final group of songs continued a full five minutes. The singer gave four encores, the following the program and the others scattered one after the third group and one after the third.

German composers were favored in the program, which contained five numbers by Franz Schubert, two by Hugo Wolf and three by Richard Strauss. Adaptations of three of Schubert's songs, "Come Away, Death," "O Mistress Mine," "How Flow Thou Winter Wind" followed. The printed program was concluded by works by two Italians, Verdi and Gioacchino.

Most enthusiastically received by the audience were "Der Erlkönig" and "Wanderers Nachtlied," Schubert; "Geduld, Strauss;" and "Recitative and Aria from the Masked Ball," Verdi, and "Recitative and Aria from Andrea Chenier," Gioacchino.

An English translation of "Der Erlkönig" was sung by Fred Patton, American baritone, at the last concert recital, and the rendition of the song by Herr Schlusnus offered opportunity for comparison between the two voices.

Herr Schlusnus is a comparatively young man, and is known in Europe for his range of opera roles. His accompaniment was Franz Rupp, to whom portions of the applause were evidently addressed.

"Truth About Blazes"

Perhaps the only real attack that can be directed at "The Truth About Blazes" is in the direction of pure mechanics. The outstanding performance of the entire meet was the running of Bob Elliott in the two mile run. Herrick, the favorite to win the race, took the lead closely followed by Small, the State two mile champion. For three quarters of a mile it appeared to be a race between these two men. Shortly after his point, Small faded and Herrick again held the lead. By this time Hammer, State sophomore, had moved up and challenged the leader. He took the lead and held it for several laps but could not stave off Herrick's bid. Elliott, who had been unning thirty rods in the rear, unpossessed his sprint at this point and moved up to take the lead. Herrick and Elliott battled shoulder to shoulder for several laps, and as they went into the last lap, Elliott exhibited a great brand of stamina, took the lead and pulled away from his pursuer from Ohio to win in 10:19. Herrick and Hammer finished 2nd and 3rd in that order. Elliott has been training twice daily under Coach Brown and his performance Saturday showed the results of his work.
