Laud Paintings at Cotton Club

Murals of M. S. C. Art Instructor Receives Favorable Publicity.

J. A. Person of the art department has received much favorable publicity as a result of the murals which he painted this summer at the Cotton club in Lansing. Some authorities have pronounced them among the best of their kind in the United States. The management of the restaurant reports that patrons have evinced great interest in the wall decorations and in their creator.

Working four weeks, with a corps of assistants, Mr. Person has succeeded in bringing to the vicinity of East Lansing atmosphere seldom equaled in some of the larger cities. The murals are said to be not only perfect in conception but entirely consistent with the plan of the club as well.

The area decorated consists of 2000 square feet. Over 100 different colors and shades were required. The walls being 11 feet high, a scaffold of ladders and planks was used. The designs, which had been drawn out to scale, were transferred to the wall in charcoal. Each space in the design was numbered according to the color it should have. Cans of paint were numbered correspondingly so that the proper color could be applied by the assistants without the constant attention of Mr. Person.

Also in this way colors could be repeated in a plan which adds much to the quiet beauty of the murals. Miss Lucile Allen, a former State student, acted as main assistant to Mr. Person.

The theme of the paintings is southern plantation life. This consists of two phases, the hunt and the cotton picking. On the right of the entrance and along the west end of the restaurant are seen the negroes in the fields. White cotton, the varied colors of the clothes of the workers, the sunny sky and the background of hills cooperate to create a picture of melodic beauty. The home, uninterrupted wall on the south side shows the fox hunt in full swing. Along the fields and against a background of hilly country ride the pink-coated men, pursuing the hounds. One's eye is naturally impelled toward the end of the restaurant where the orchestra platform represents a mansion veranda. The whole picture, the colonial door and windows, and the red brick and spreading trees make the illusion realistic.

Tables and draperies blend with the walls, making for an atmosphere of great charm.

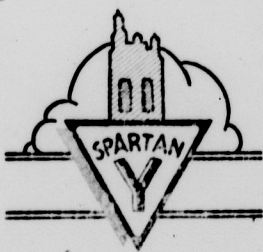

WOLVERINES DEFEAT SPARTANS, 20 TO 6

HEAVY ILLINOIS WESLEYAN TEAM MEETS STATE HERE SATURDAY; McNUTT SHIFTED TO HALFBACK

Michigan Scores Three Touchdowns With Opening Drive in First Quarter; State Scores on 35-yard Pass in Final Period After March From Own 14-yard Line.

Back from the wars in Ann Arbor where they fell victim to an early game drive by the Michigan Wolverines to lose 20 to 6, the eyes of Coach Charles Bachman and his Spartan gridder turn toward Illinois Wesleyan, their next opponent who invades East Lansing next Saturday afternoon.

Illinois Wesleyan, bringing a heavy line of veteran material, is expected to provide a good deal of opposition to the Spartans, though State is favored to repeat their victory of last season over the same team.

The Spartans put on a great exhibition of football last Saturday for the benefit of some 25,000 spectators in the spacious Michigan bowl, outplaying the highly advertised Wolverines, coached by Harry Kinkadee, through the last three periods. A fast opening drive on the part of the University eleven which scored three touchdowns in the first canto proved to be too great an obstacle to overcome.

Probably the highlight of the game was the touchdown march conducted by State's reserve backfield men late in the third period which netted them the first touchdown the Spartans had scored on Michigan since 1918. Taking the ball on their own 14-yard line, State opened with a passing attack that upped even Michigan's own aerial endeavors. Kurt Warmen, who distinguished himself with some great passing and kicking during the tilt, began a long march when he flipped a long pass to Chuck Muth, the Spartan field general who was taking regular Al Kirsch's job. Muth, after juggling the ball around his shoulders, finally gained control of it and ran to midfield before he was downed.

Dick Colina, another reserve halfback who only tilts the scales at about 145 pounds, then assumed the role of line cracker to sail right through the middle of the Wolverine stronghold, their heavy, experienced line, for a nice sprint to Michigan's 85-yard line. The third period ended with this run and as the teams exchanged goals, most of the Wolverines figured that this thrust was only an idle gesture.

Score On Pass

But they were wrong, for in the first play of the final period a big "60" went up on the scoreboard for State and the bewildered Kinkadees were somewhat shaken. The touchdown play came on a long pass from Muth to Warmen. Warmen took the ball on the run, outran Captain Stan Fay, and slid across the final line and made of the sidelines for the marker. The try for point was squelched on a bad pass from center.

Michigan Game SIDELIGHTS

Who said State couldn't take it? Well, he took it but when he looked at Michigan's 100-0 American record he was a bit more cautious.

Captain Bernard McNutt saw a little more service this year than last during his annual march with Michigan. The Michigan game seems to be a link to Black Magic from center.

Michigan, using a huddle system, was starting plays at approximately 10 seconds. The Spartans, in contrast, were taking 20 seconds to make a play. Three touchdowns in short order. Three minutes went over for the first one and the third, while Heston scored the second. The State eleven was outplayed after the beautiful kicking of Johnny Rogers, whose kicks are of boundless variety. The State eleven had the ball in several bad holes. The dashes of Herb Everhardus, fleet Wolverine back who also largely responsible for the team markers.

According to the statistics, State could the Michigan machine in making first downs. The Spartans are credited with nine first downs while the Wolverines made but five Michigan outplayed State by running, but failed to complete one pass during the game while the Spartans scored considerable yardage by the aerial route.

McNutt Shifted

In meeting Illinois Wesleyan Coach Bachman will probably use much the same lineup that was successful against Michigan. But Black Mac McNutt, State's captain, has been shifted however to right halfback though the Spartan method has been given to assurance that he will be called over some of the other line up members back.

Jim McCrory, big colored fullback who bent, cracked and broke through the stout Wolverine line last Saturday, should start at fullback. Because Al Kirsch's leg is still bothering him somewhat, he will probably be in the game with Warmen from the bench, letting Chuck Muth handle the signals. Kirsch is thought to be saved for the string of major contests looming up on the schedule.

As the Banks, State will probably present Ed Klewicki, who played a "game" of a game last Saturday, and Buddy Zarza. Al Jackson, tall colored end, may also get in. Art Heston and Bud Wagner or Gordon Reeves will hold down the tackle berths, assisted on either side by Teriak and Lay at the guards. Both of these men performed in spectacular fashion against Michigan and have proved a real power in the State forward line.

Big heavy Frank Butler, who was a very interesting afterthought for Coach Bachman, Michigan's power man who is mentioned as an All-American candidate, should be at center. Avery Paxon, who assisted Butler Saturday and is now rated as a scrapping good center, will probably also get in.

Illinois Wesleyan will arrive in town after three o'clock for Saturday's game, which will be the second on the home schedule, starting at 2 o'clock.
