

Frosh Gridders Defeat Detroit Yearlings 13 to 6

STEVE SEBO DASHES FOR TWO TOUCHDOWNS TO BEAT TITANS: FROSH TAKE TO AERIAL GAME

Detroit's Lone Marker Comes On Intercepted Pass; Yearling Victory Marks First Win Over Detroit Frosh In Several Years.

Michigan State's fighting Frosh gridders completely outplayed the University of Detroit yearlings at Patterson stadium last night before a large crowd, and as a result were victorious in a hard fought engagement, 13 to 6. Last night's decisive victory atoned for the defeat suffered by the State Frosh last year.

The game was a wide open affair with passes filling the air from the opening whistle. However, the sensational open-field running of shifty Steve Sebo was the highlight of the game. State received the kickoff and McMahon returned the pike to his own twenty yard line. On the first play from scrimmage Sebo streaked out towards his own right tackle, got by the line of scrimmage, cut back sharply to his left, shook off three would-be tacklers, and raced 80 yards for a touchdown. Sebo place-kicked the extra point. State again received the kickoff, and the shivering and expectant crowd almost got another thrill when Lehhardt, a rangy pile-driving halfback, formerly of Cass Tech high, took the ball while in high gear and was finally downed by Detroit's safety man at mid-field.

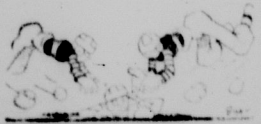
A few minutes later Detroit's aggressive fullback, Bill Witzork, intercepted a flat pass tossed with reckless abandon by a State back, and cantered forty yards down the sidelines to score Detroit's lone marker. Moore's attempted kick from place was blocked.

The second quarter was almost as wild as the first. State had several opportunities to score during this period but fumbled the punch when close to the end zone line. The first punting of Moore, Detroit's sterling half, saved his team numerous times during the fray. He continually out-batted State's backs. The half ended with the ball on State's forty yard line and the score, State 7, Detroit 6.

With the opening of the third quarter Coach Kuhn started his original lineup. State again received and Sattler fumbled the pike back to State's 25-yard strip. On the first play from scrimmage McMahon, the pepper, quarter back, Lowell heaped a lateral to Sebo who wiggled, twisted, and outstepped his way 75 yards through the entire Red and White team to score standing up. Sebo's try for the extra point was wide. The remainder of the quarter was a see-saw battle between the punters and with both coaches substituting frequently.

George Packowski, a rugged end from Grand Rapids, played a great defensive game. Packowski was the fifth man in Detroit's backfield last night and caused the opponents plenty of trouble. He stopped all Detroit's hopes of being up the count in the last quarter. Detroit frosh filled the game with passes in a vain attempt to score.

Sebo, Packowski, Zindel Katz and Lehhardt starred for State and the whole team showed promise of rounding into one of the best yearling outfits to be seen here in years.

QUOIT TOSSERS SPRING UPSETS

Perry and Carp Overwhelm Their Opponents in First Round.

The All-entire horsehoe tourney met with the final date for the first round falling on October 22, under full way with sixteen quito-tossers entered. Only three matches have been played to date, and all three have been lopsided. Jack Perry, captain of the Red yearling team, whipped his opponent, Alvin Aldrich, 11-2. The top from the Lambda Chi Alpha looked good in his appointed opponent, Alvin Perry. Perry is going to be a potent factor in the tournament this year. R. B. Carp beat J. M. Hughes by a 21-10 round. Carp and Perry so far appear as the two most powerful contestants in the race for the trophy.

John Deffen, coach of C. C. Johnson, from the field of contest, is a 21-14. The number of the year in previous years is considered under the elimination method in which one defeat in a match means expulsion from the contest. Each contestant is responsible for the arrangement of his match with his opponent. With but a few days remaining before the final date for the first round and five matches scheduled to take place in these few days things are expected to be exciting at the horsehoe courts in back of the gymnasium.

Bob Rosa, Frosh Net Star, May Rank With Weitz, Norris

Another tennis star bids fair to take his place along side of Stanley Weitz and Rex Norris in the Spartan net firmament in the person of Robert Rosa, freshman from Schenectady, New York.

Rosa, whose brother was a graduate from Michigan State seven years ago, comes to East Lansing with a remarkable record of net triumphs. Not only did Bob win the captaincy of his high school team for three years in a row but went through those three years undefeated both in singles and doubles.

He showed his aptness for the game the very first year by winning the singles championship of his junior high school seven years ago. Bob never had the benefits of professional coaching but has made an endeavor to see every ranking player in the county and to make a close study of the players' form, footwork and strategy.

Was Championship Winner

Rosa's tennis career is just one tournament triumph after another. He beat the county junior tennis championship for two years in a row, the county senior championship for two years, the interschool sectional championship two years, and the past season teamed with Jack Connel, a freshman at Colgate to annex the Vermont doubles crown.

In the singles of the Vermont tournament Rosa gained the final round only to succumb to Stanora of Boston in a bitterly fought match that went the maximum five sets. For the past two years Rosa has reached the quarter-final round in the New York state open championship and in both instances fell before the polished strokes of Bill Doug, national ranking junior and brother of John Doug, former national champion.

Likes Cage Game Too

The future star does not confine his athletic ability to tennis alone. He is keenly interested in basketball and will be seen on a basketball court on the freshmen five. When asked if he had seen Stanley Weitz and Rex Norris in action he replied, "I've seen Weitz play a few practice sets and he looks mighty good to me but I haven't seen Norris yet. They tell me he is just about as good."

Nothing the subject abruptly to basketball he continued, "The style of basketball played in the mid-west is vastly different than that played in the east. These games which are started at 8:15 each night are played on the open space in front of Wells and are being officiated by Allen Kronback, a member of the Delta Sigma Phi.

Touch football differs from regular football in several respects, such as:

1. No tackling or blocking is allowed.
2. Players may be in any position at the time the ball is put in play by scrimmage except that no player shall be ahead of his line of scrimmage. There being a 10 yard penalty for offense.
3. Seven men constitute a team.
4. Any man except the passer may receive the pass.
5. 20 yards must be made in four downs.
6. Length of game shall be six minutes quarters with one minute between quarters and five minutes between halves.
7. Four times out during the game.
8. In case of a tie game the team making the most first downs shall be declared the winner. The score being the number of first downs made by the two teams.
9. Touching the man with the ball declares the ball dead.

Tuesday's game between Ward C and E went to a draw. The score was 6-6 at the end and neither team was able to secure a first down.
