COLLEGE GETS ROAD TESTERS

Machines Acquired to Determine Efficiency of Road Surfaces.

Michigan State college now boasts one of the most complete road testing laboratories in the United States. The list of apparatus is a machine known as a Treadometer, designed by Mr. R. H. G. of this college to test different combinations of road surfaces and to determine the efficiency of each. The Treadometer is a circular track on which a car is driven. KANSAS STATE

Having disposed of Syracuse, one of the strongest teams in the east, by dint of a spectacular last half drive, the Spartans hope to extend their fame beyond the Mississippi in tackling the powerful Kansas State eleven this Saturday.

Kansas State—Strong Kansas State, which defeated the University of Kansas 6-0, is not a team to be underestimated by local grid fans. It is to be remembered that it was the University of Kansas which fielded the first football team in the country. Coach, Dr. McMillin, former All-American quarterback at Centre when that institution was at the apex of its grid fame, has developed a highly effective pass offense and defense as may be evidenced in the Kansas State-Kansas game. Allowing only three out of 16 attempted passes to be completed, the Kansas State team completed eight out of 13 passes for substantial gains. Kansas State has a passing play that bears a close resemblance to the scoring play so effectively utilized by the Chicago Bears. The forward passer receives a lateral and fades back to shoot off a long pass to an end or fullback field down the field. Although this play is confusing to the defense, the chances of an opponent's intercepting the pass and making a close field ahead of him for a touchdown.

Kansas State's cover offense is similar to that employed by Syracuse which so effectively demolished the Spartans in the first half of that game. The Kansas Aggies have the men who can be used in the backfield. The play is to be a running attack, a man skilled in blocking is placed on the end. If the play is to be a passing attack, a back, usually back in place on the end to receive the pass.

Have Heavy Backfield.

This is no novel experience for the professor since he has traveled extensively since he left his native land in Scandinavia.
