Edna St. Vincent Millay Presents
First Number of
Artist's Course.

CHURCH IS FILLED

Poems Chosen From Both Recent Books and Selections of Former Years.

Speaking before one of the largest audiences ever to attend a student lecture here, Edna St. Vincent Millay, poetess of the college lecture series at the Peoples Church, Tuesday night, with an interpretation of a selection of her works that held the audience spellbound from start to finish.

Edna St. Vincent Millay, who is considered by many to be the foremost poetess of the world, clearly demonstrated to the audience that the dramatic quality of her feelings was as strong as her poetic power. The poems chosen for the evening were from the sublime to the humorous, and the interpretation was given with a naturalness and effectiveness that was rare.

Various Poems Selected. Poems were selected from "Second April," "A Few Days from Thistle," "The Harp Weaver," "Poems Selected for Children," and several poems from her recent book, "The Wanderer." The audience was particularly pleased with the "Harp Weaver," which was recited in a beautiful voice.

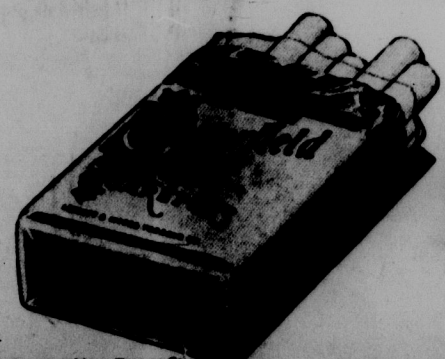

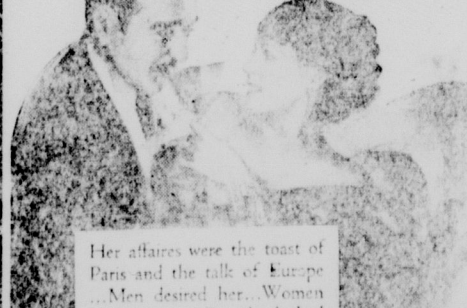

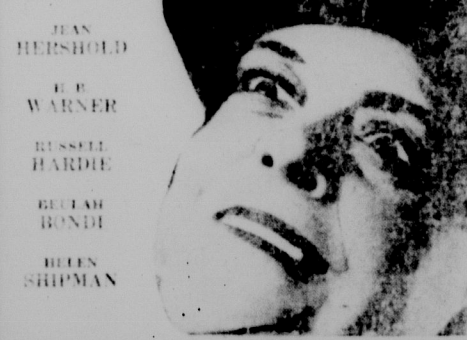

PROF. SPEAKS ON NAZI GOVERNMENT

Caswell Addresses Women's Group on German Situation.

In an address delivered to the Women's club, a women's organization, in Lansing Nov. 10, Prof. J. T. Caswell of the political science department here outlined the principles of the Nazi government. In contradiction to a poem read by one of the women which stated the conditions of the world now as getting better, Mr. Caswell said that the world was very ill and that it would be some time before conditions would be bettered. He reviewed the affairs of Germany since the World war up to present times, giving his ideas as to the probability of another war. In answer to questions asked by the women of the club, Mr. Caswell stated that the United States government is not like that of Germany. He said that for one thing, although the government here has had to take drastic steps, for existing conditions, they cannot begin to compare with those which Hitler has taken.
