

NOTRE DAME 5 TO PLAY STATE HERE SATURDAY

Irish Have Won 19 Games Without Suffering a Reverse

WIN OVER CHOCTAWS

Mississippi Downed in Contest Tuesday Night, 35 to 25.

Coach Ben VanAlstene's Michigan State croqueters will be aiming at their fourth victory of the 1934 basketball season Saturday night when the University of Notre Dame invades the Spartan court.

State added the third notch in its belt last Tuesday night by downing Mississippi, 35 to 25. The game featured the home team in a dominating performance and was played before a large crowd.

According to advance reports, Notre Dame brings a powerhouse team to East Lansing this week-end. Beginning early last year the Irish began piling up a record of victories which has now taken them to ten straight wins. They will be seeking their eleventh.

Leading the Spartan club will be the same men who appeared here last year and displayed his abilities so well. That man is Ed Moore, Kansas, All-American center. Will

NEW WINTER TERM BOOK NEEDED FOR IRISH TILT

A special bulletin from the college athletic department this afternoon stated that all students must call for their winter term student books by Saturday. The new 1934 books must be presented to the athletic department by the Notre Dame croqueters, basketball, and football teams by 10 o'clock Saturday evening in the administration hall.

All students are to use the new entrance to the stadium for basketball games. Adult admissions must be secured at the east end.

There are four other veterans from last year's fine showing, including the three Krasas, and one new bright star who will be a factor in the coming season.

State will probably start Vander-Nesse and VanFossen at forwards, Buysse at center and Herrick and either Riedman or Brock at guards, using virtually the same line-up as in previous games.

Against Mississippi, indeed, the Spartans showed an early lead and held command to it throughout the entire game. State led at the half time 15 to 10.

At times the Spartans had difficulty passing the ball, but they did this better in close to close shots. The Choctaws were troubled by State's man-to-man defense and did not get very far in offense, though scoring times they took in 10 points.

Anderson, two-handed forward of Mississippi, led both teams in scoring with five field goals and two foul shots for twenty points. He was also outstanding in his team's defense and offense.

Buysse and Herrick, at State, divided scoring honors among the Spartans. Each garnered eight points.

The State croqueters met and turned back Syracuse, Marquette, Illinois Wesleyan and Ohio State. It was generally conceded that the Spartan team reached its peak in 1933 when it triumphed in the basketball playoffs.

Two scoreless ties were chalked up against Carnegie Tech and Kansas State, both powerful teams.

Twice during the year, the Spartans were embarrassed by the Choctaws, who were the most powerful of the country's newcomers. The first time occurred when James Chrysler resigned his position as head football coach at the Spartan institution to coach at Portland University.

The search for his successor occupied a period of nearly a month during which time many of the leading coaches in the nation were under consideration. The search finally narrowed down to one man—Charles Bachman of Florida University. Formerly a coach at Kansas State, his record had been brilliant, and his welcome to the State campus was a warm one.

State's grapplers, after a spirited inter-team meet held last December 14, 15 and 16, open their season with a meet against the University of Michigan here January 20. The remainder of the schedule follows: Sat. Jan. 27, Ohio State at Columbus; Sat. Feb. 10, Cornell college here; Thurs. Feb. 15, Penn State at State; Fri. Feb. 16, Kent State at State; Sat. Feb. 17, University of Michigan at State; Sat. Feb. 24, University of Chicago here; Sat. Feb. 25, follow this with entries in the Michigan A. A. U. Wrestling Tournament and the National Collegiate Wrestling Tournament.

In the All College wrestling meet held December 15, both varsity letter men came through with victories. It was also linked as a possible candidate for a position in the Western conference. Michigan State was a contender for a berth when the rumor broke that Northwestern University and the University of Chicago would merge, leaving a vacancy in the Big Ten. The rumor, however, became less of a probability when it was announced unofficially that neither Chicago nor Northwestern would withdraw from athletics despite a merger.

All in all, the year 1933 was a bright one for Michigan State. The Spartans continued to climb in the athletic world with the greatest of prospects for the coming year.

BUYSSE LEADING CAGE SCORERS

Michigan State's leading scorer, Buysse, continued to lead the Spartan basketball squad in the individual scoring records this week after scoring eight points against Mississippi college Tuesday night. He now totals 25 points for the five games.
