

# Charge Unqualified Students Employed In F. E. R. A. Project

**"Some Students Do Not Recognize Seriousness of An Affidavit,"  
States Emmons; Faculty Committee to Conduct Thorough  
Investigation in Correcting Present Evils.**

Latest developments in the granting of employment to needy students under the Federal Emergency Relief Administration which began last week, revealed that although all available jobs have been filled, several of the students have not been able to obtain the jobs.

Under the provisions of the grant, students must have been unable to attend college without the aid, and an affidavit to a notary public had to be signed to this effect when the application was presented.

In a statement yesterday afternoon, L. C. Enmons, professor of institutional administration, and chairman of the students do not recognize the committee on student loans.




# Notre Dame Cagers Beat Spartans at South Bend For Second Time, 28-19

Marquette Rated as Having Advantage Over Spartans by Their First Win Over State; Loyola Should be Easy Assignment if State Five is Not Too Weary.

MICHIGAN STATE'S basketball team was on the road today, headed for Madison, Wisconsin, after their smart defeat at the hands of the fast Notre Dame quintet last night in South Bend, Indiana. The score of the Irish tilt was 28 and 19, one of the stiffest reverses the Spartans have taken this year.

The Spartans are now on the last lap of their 1933-34 campaign with their present four-day road trip, meeting the Marquette university five Friday night, and winding up the year Saturday night playing the Loyola quintet of Chicago.

## LACK OF INTEREST SHOWN IN LEAGUE

Two Forfeits Mar Last Week's Play; Eng. and Lits Meet.

Marquette will be slightly surprised to take the journeying Spartans tomorrow night by virtue of their former victory here against State. Loyola should be easy unless the long road trip proves too tiring for the Spartans. Loyola was easily beaten by the VanAlstyne-men here earlier in the season.

Was Fourth Loss. The loss at South Bend was the fourth State five has suffered this year. The Irish won a thrilling overtime contest here during January 24 to 33.

Notre Dame's early first half drive proved to be the downfall of the Spartans. The Irish scored twice from the floor during the first six minutes of play. The Spartans were unable to get a shot in the first 17 minutes before Vanderhoof stepped in to score the first points. The score at the half was Notre Dame 13, State 3.

Marquette's State's rubber-announced at center was chased from the game in the last eight minutes. VanAlstyne, tall blond forward star led the State team in scoring.

It was the running tactics employed by Notre Dame that kept the Spartans from doing much damage in the Irish lead. The Spartans' defense men picked up the attack and Vanderhoof stepped in to score the first points. The score at the half was Notre Dame 13, State 3.

The game progressed much the same as did the contest between the Spartans in East Lansing a week ago when the Spartans won 27 and 19. The visiting Spartans were 5 from shooting missing a great number of shots and failing to convert any eight out of 21 free throw attempts.

State Leads at Half. The Spartans led 13 to 10 at the half. The Spartans put on a short attack in the second period to lead 19 to 10 at the 10 minute mark. The Spartans pulled away easily from the Irish, leading 28 to 19 at the end of the game.

# TANKMEN WIND UP SEASON SAT.

Iowa Last Fee of Unsuccessful Season; Succumb to Powerful Ohio State Team.

Closing an unsuccessful season, State tankmen will meet the University of Iowa on Saturday, Feb. 24. Iowa, with one of the strongest teams ever seen at the Ohio State college and boasting victories over the powerful University of Wisconsin and University of Illinois, should experience little difficulty in defeating the State team. The Iowa team boasts of such stars as Bushy, winner of third place in the Big Ten meet, and Groce, one of the fastest 440 men in the Big Ten.

State's poor season has been due to inexperienced men and a lack of material. Coach Daubert deserves great deal of credit for the work he has done with this year's team. The experience gained, however, makes the outlook for next year's team better.

Displaying strength in free style form but weakly in the rest of the event, State dropped the Ohio State meet last Saturday, 51-33. The meet was held at the Ohio State swimming pool. The Ohio State divers placed first and second with Peckham (State) third. In the 220 yard free style Trapp of State set a new record, swimming the distance in 2:40.2. Peckham (State) placed second in this event and Ewell and Faley (Ohio State) tied for third.

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## Tom Ottey Cracks Mile Record In Fourteenth Annual Track Carnival

High Jump and Relay Marks Fall Before Onslaught of 100 State Athletes; Many Spartan Tracksters Among Place-Winners; Pedlar Fails to Finish.

THREE old gymnasium records went by the boards last Saturday in the Fourteenth Annual Michigan State Indoor Track carnival under the assault of over 100 athletes from eight Michigan colleges. The new marks came in the two-mile run, one-mile relay, and high jump.

In one of the most brilliant performances of the athletic track show which occupied both the afternoon and evening, Thomas Ottey, Michigan State's blonde terror in the distance events, barned the boards to win the two-mile run and smash Clark Chamberlain's old mark set in 1931. Ottey lapped the field twice to turn in a beautiful 9:28.7, cracking Chamberlain's record of 9:43.

Ottey's smashing victory scored revenge on Herbert Pedlar, of Western State, winner of the event for the two previous years. Pedlar followed the fast-stepping Spartan star for part of the race but could not maintain the pace and failed to finish.

**Normal Breaks Record.** The mile relay mark fell before the onslaught of the Michigan Normal quartet, composed of Morris Walters, Harold Baker, Karl Kallier, and Merrill Hendler. The new mark set by the Normal team was 7:41.5. The former record was 7:44.5. Michigan State finished second in the event, after losing the lead to Normals in the first mile, who did a pretty bit of sprinting in the victory.

The other mark to fall by the wayside came in the high jump when Ed Kallier, Western States' stellar leaper, skidded over the bar at 6 feet 7 inches, smashing the old mark set by his teammate, Robert In 1931 of 6 feet 11 inches. Kallier kept his pole vault championship which he took last year, with a vault of 13 feet, falling over three inches short of a new record. That's Davis of Hillsdale retained his short pole in the standard vault, clearing 45 feet 11 inches, the short of his expected capacity.

No team event was kept during the meet, but the State performers did well.

## Bachman Likes Grid Changes

Three changes made in the 1934 intercollegiate football rules, code by the National Rules Committee in Atlanta, Ga., last week give promise of speeding up the offensive game next fall.

In answer to widespread criticism that the defensive machinery had become far too perfect to permit the spectacular, the rules committee decided to eliminate the rule which prohibited the offensive team from kicking the ball into the end zone for a touchdown.

Charles Bachman, head coach here at Michigan State, has been enthusiastic for this change since last fall. In fact, shortly after the football season Bachman began to suggest a revision in the rules that would enable the offensive side to keep the ball on an end zone pass. He urged it in speeches and interviews, and in letters to persons having influence with the rule committee. He indicated the support of other coaches and found them generally responsive.

Bachman himself a strong advocate of the overhauled game, had the following to state upon being asked his opinion on the recent action taken by the rules committee. "I've visited over the committee's action on this rule. It's bound to increase scoring. The same is true of the new rule of eliminating the five-yard penalty for two incomplete passes in the same series of downs. Personally I never saw any good reason why that penalty was placed in the books in the first place."

As L. J. Lindstrand, of the committee, was asked at the time by the fact that some small school in Ohio had thrown 35 passes in one game. "According to me, no reason that was an isolated case and did not affect the game in general. However, the penalty was adopted and enforced for eight years. Now we are back where we were in 1926 which is surely all right with me."

The Michigan State coach said that he expected the new rules to aid his team, "strongly, considerably, and that they would do a great deal to abolish those so-called good line stands by the defensive teams—something that has no purpose, except to tire the fans of the famed gridiron sport."

Coach Bachman can not see what benefit can be derived from the change in the pointing rule, whereby a team is allowed to hold the ball for the kicker. An expressed opinion was that the rule should be changed so that the team should kick the ball into the end zone for a touchdown, but he did not see the point.

Bachman expressed keen dissatisfaction with the idea of a proposed rule which required football players to wear numerals both on front and back of their jerseys. Such a move would be a serious one with the spectators, and they would be picking out their favorite performers. The rule would also be a great
