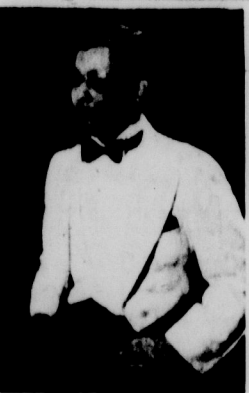

INITIAL FERA REPORT SHOWS VARIED WORK

Under present conditions, there is a falling off in the training of leadership. Whereas high school graduates have increased 40 per cent in the past few years, college enrollments have dropped 15 per cent in the same time.

A student in college requires only part time work in order to keep him going. That same student out of school would be in the field for a full time job, thus adding to present demands for relief.

Maximum Quota Is 10 Per Cent

President Roosevelt made a recommendation for college relief to the U. S. Congress early in January. On Feb. 2 Harry L. Hopkins, CWA administrator who handles all relief measures for President Roosevelt, made an announcement that between five and seven million dollars had been set aside to aid college men and women. These funds were to go to all colleges in the country. The maximum quota of students in each college was to be 10 per cent of the institution's total enrollment of Oct. 15.

It was ordered that the state relief committee should work with each college and grant money. As the Michigan Relief Commission was tremendously reduced, another department was added and Mr. Stew. art was made the head. Mr. Stewart has set up a committee on each campus of the 38 Michigan colleges.

involved. Because the time was short, the committee did not get the FERA was required to create new jobs.

Has Developed Rapidly

The FERA has developed rapidly in all the Michigan colleges from that time on. The March report has made Mr. Stewart feel very strongly that the college students' financial cares are either wholly or partially wiped out under this plan.

Of the 250 students at Michigan State who have FERA jobs, 30 are new students. Most of this group are students who were forced to drop out of school because of lack of funds and several are transfer students. Students who returned one term had to have a C average part to re-enter.

It was up to the local committee to call together students, send out information around the campus and examine each applicant personally. Each student had to establish a record that he was of good scholarship, standing and entirely required this aid or some other unforeseen help to remain in college. The government insisted that no student be taken off the payroll if he was allowed to drop out.

NORTHWESTERN NINE MEETS SPARTANS THIS AFTERNOON: KOBSMEN WHIP YPSI 5 TO 2

Kronbach, Hopkins or Berg to Be on Mound for Spartans; Timely Hitting Accounts for Green and White Victory Over Ypsilanti Saturday

A hard hitting Northwestern university baseball team was in East Lansing Tuesday afternoon determined to hand the Kobsmen their first defeat of the season. The Spartans will clash with the Wildcats at 4:10 o'clock.

The three-sophomore lineup, George Hopkins, Johnny Berg, and Allan Kronbach, who limited Hillsdale to three hits last Wednesday, were elected by Coach Kobs to do the pitching in the first of eight games scheduled with Western Conference teams.

The Spartans chalked up their second victory of the season by wrenching a 5 to 2 victory from Michigan Normal Saturday afternoon in a game played in weather more appropriate for football. Timely hitting and an airtight defense were contributing factors in the Spartan victory. The visitors out-hit State, 9 to 7, but the Spartans made better use of their bingles and batted the Ypsilanti boys in six departments of the game. Flashes of brilliant defensive work on the part of both teams marked the contest. The Ypsi defense was wobbly at times, contributing to eight errors but only one of the Kobsmen's mistakes resulted in a Spartan run.

Armed Parker, angular center fielder, resumed his pecking duties after playing the first game in the outfield. He proved pecking at the invaders for nearly eight innings but at this juncture he showed signs of weakening and Kobs seized him in favor of George Hopkins. The Green and White outplayed the Kobsmen, but Normal had the game right on second and third. Hopkins proved his worth in a pinch when he retired the side without further damage. Johnson lined in the winning run in the third.
