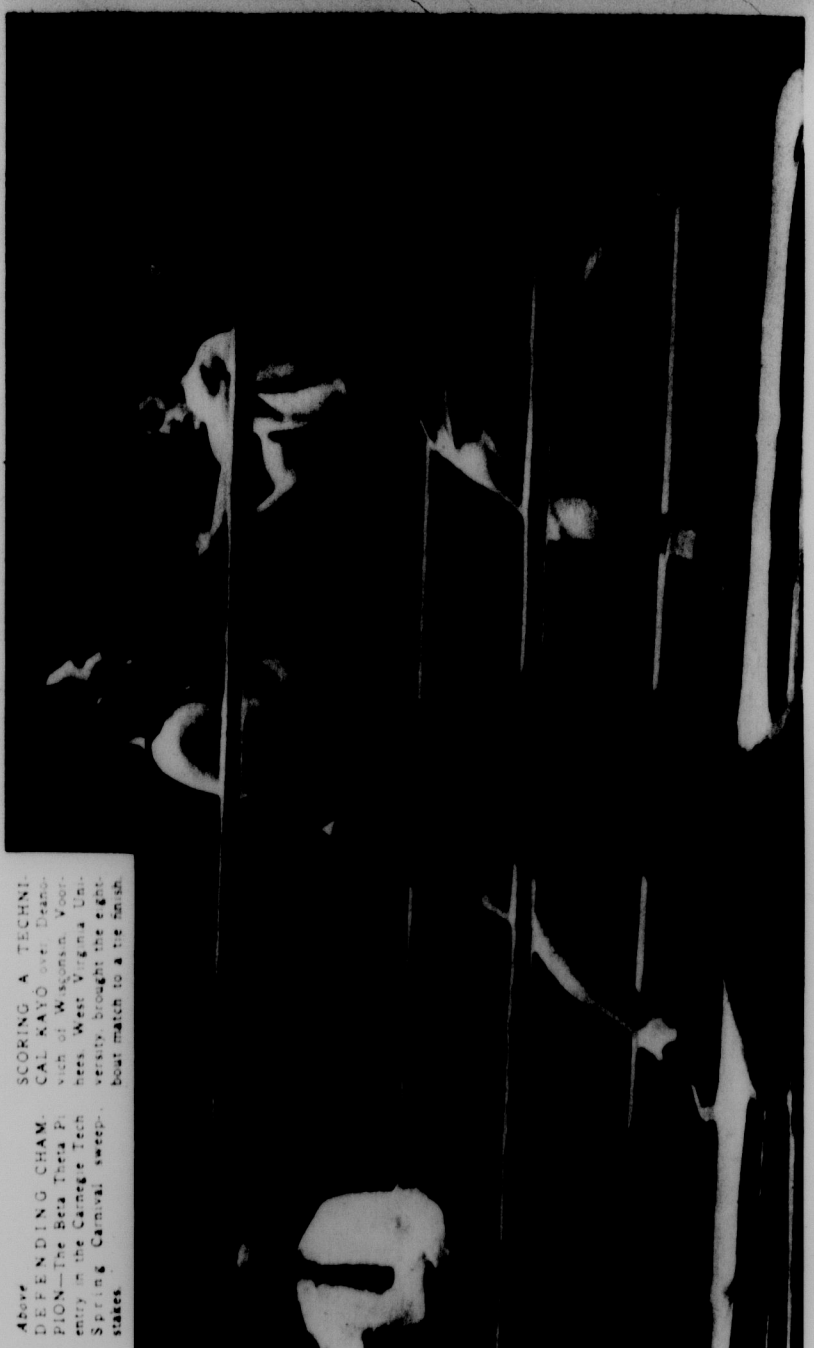


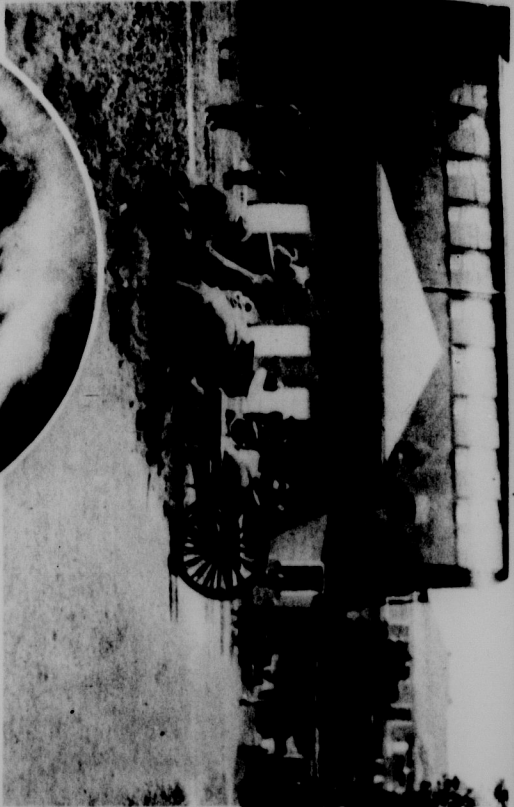

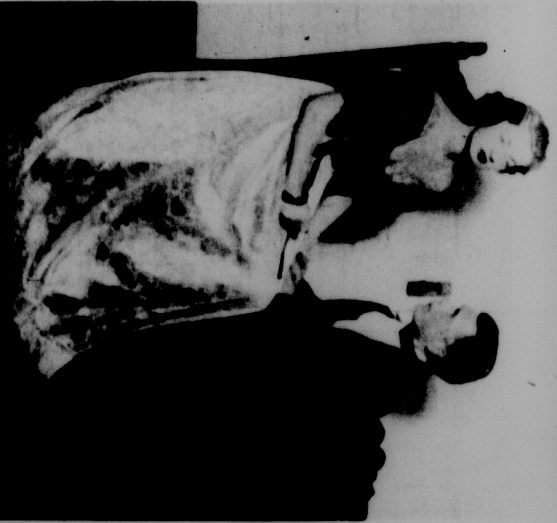
AIMING FOR A BULLSEYE—Members of the Phi Kappa Tau fraternity at Pennsylvania State College do a little practice on the Bullseye target.

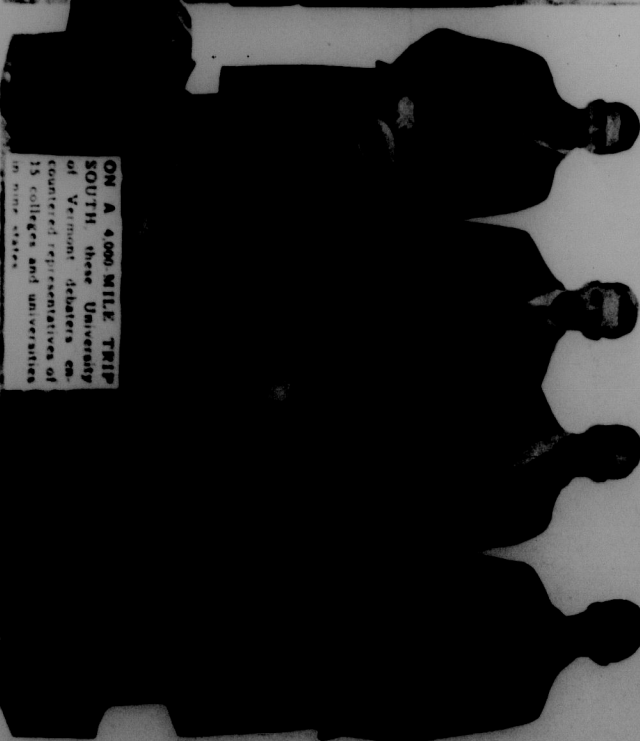
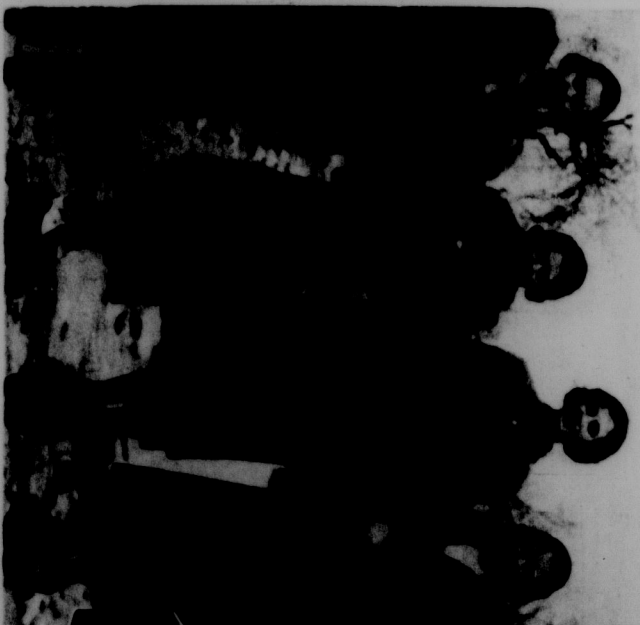

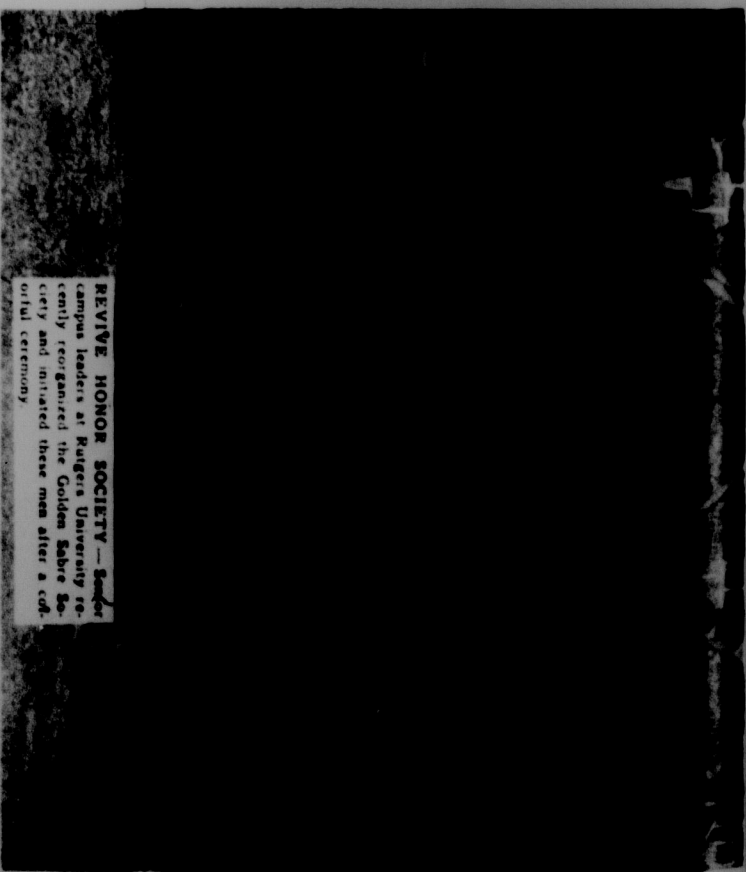

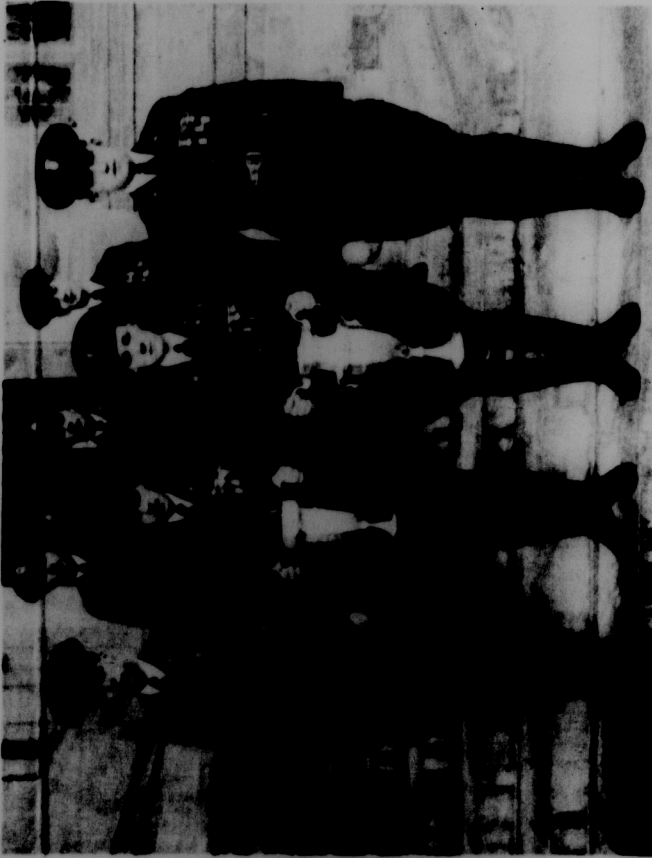

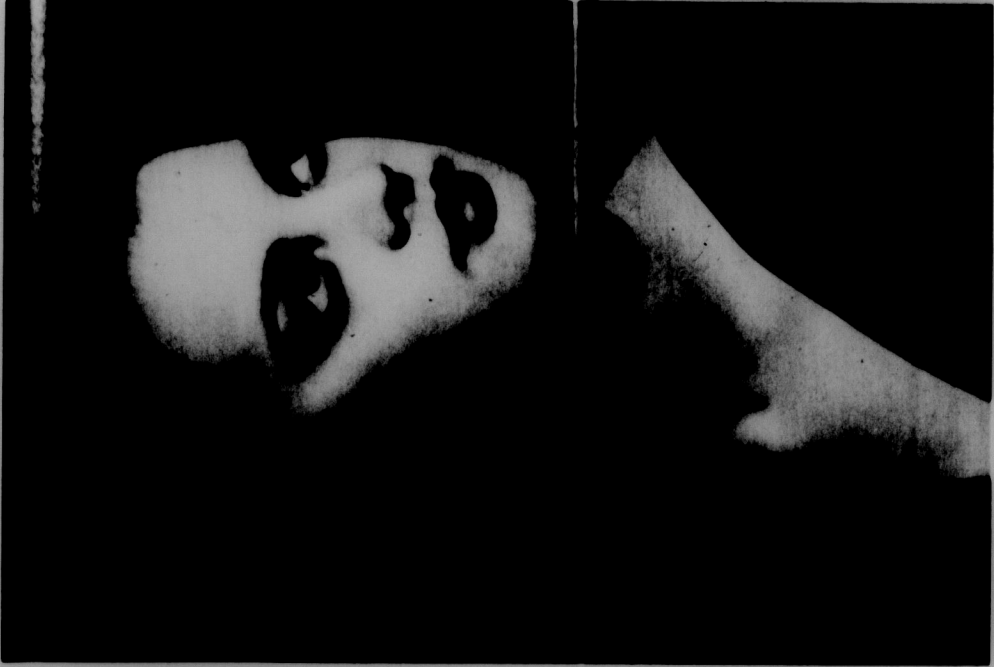

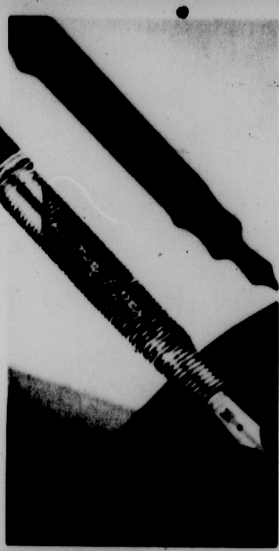

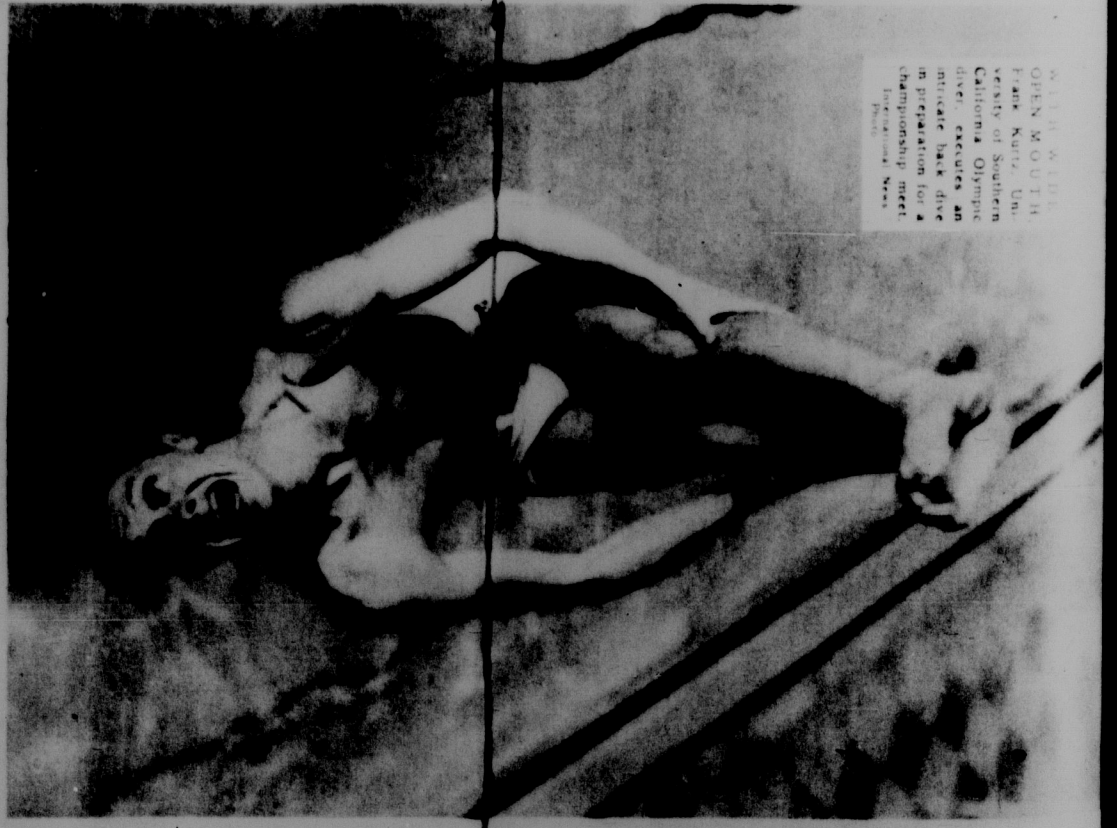
