## Three Classes Elect Officers in Moderate Balloting Thursday

Ottey, Ziegel, Wismer Voted Class Presidents; Collins, Campbell, Ballard Vice-Presidents for Following Year  
A. W. S. Favors Later Hours.

With a vote that started slowly yesterday morning and quickened satisfactorily in the afternoon, but which still did not compare favorably with marks of previous years, the junior, sophomore and freshman classes elected their officers for next year. The sophomores led in the balloting with over 300 votes cast, the freshmen followed with 280 and the juniors trailed with 200.

In A. W. S. balloting, 194 votes were cast in favor of later hours, with 6 for hours as at present. In the voting for reorganization of the A. W. S. council, 184 were in favor of the action, while 5 opposed it.

Thomas Ottey, Ardmore, Pennsylvania, won the senior presidency with 125 votes, leading his rival, Ed Larson, of Montague, by a majority of 42.

## State Student Is Kin to Hero

Gardner Eversole is Direct Descendant of Civil War Veteran.

CONCURRENT with memorial services held in the various states Wednesday to honor American soldiers, it was revealed that Gardner Staples Eversole, a member of M. S. C. 1934 graduating class, is a direct descendant of John Sumner Eversole, a Union soldier who died in the Civil War as a substitute for Abraham Lincoln.

This honor came to Staples in a very unusual way. When a list of 1934 graduates was being compiled, it was discovered that Gardner Staples Eversole, a member of M. S. Staples was asked if he would represent the President in the army as a recruit. By virtue of his office, Lincoln was not liable to the draft. Staples gladly consented and after obtaining his father's permission he was taken to the White House to meet the President and on October 1, 1964, was enrolled and mustered into service. He was assigned to Co. H, 2nd District of Columbia Volunteer Infantry and served until September 12, 1865, when he was honorably discharged. He died in 1934.

A few months ago a bronze tablet was placed on the new Main Street bridge in Stroudsburg, Pa. to honor his memory. The tablet contains a bust of Staples as a soldier.

## Michigan Gives Kobsmen Second Setback of Year In Winning Wednesday

Art Patchin Chalks Up Second Victory of Year Against Spartans in Allowing Four Hits; Theron Fager Scores Lone State Run by Poling Out Homer in Ninth Inning

Arthur Patchin pitched the Spartans into submission for the second time this season Wednesday afternoon to give Michigan Wolverines a 5 to 1 victory and a clean sweep of the annual series.

If Coach John Kobs' cohorts had any Memorial day celebration to stage it was completely frustrated by Patchin's artful right arm which limited the Spartans to four scattered hits. Theron Fager, veteran second baseman, gave the home rooters their only cause for jubilation and saved the Kobsmen from a whitewashing by exploding a home run into left center in the ninth with the bases untenanted. The defeat was doubly humiliating for it was first time in several years that Michigan has swept the series. The Spartans have usually managed to earn at least an even break or win two out of three.

### EXPERIMENTS ON USE OF ASPHALT CONCRETE

The college agricultural engineering department is working on an interesting experiment in the use of asphalt concrete.
