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## Kobs Announces State Baseball Schedule

## Spartan Coach Lists 24 Game Schedule for 1936 Spring Season

**Diamond Team to Face Several of Nation's Strongest Nines During Season.**

**HOME OPENER APRIL 18 AGAINST U. OF TOLEDO**

**Spring Training Trip Starts March 30; To Make Tour of Carolinas for Seven Games.**

The eyes of John Kobs and his Spartan baseball machine were definitely pointed toward the spring diamond season today when the State meeting announced the 1936 schedule for his nine, one of the hardest schedules in the history of production.

A total of 24 games will be played this year and some of the best teams in the south, mid-west and east will be met. The season will open at home April 18 with Toledo university, a newcomer to the Spartan schedule. The spring training trip will begin March 30, when Clemson college is met in Clemson, South Carolina.

Besides Toledo, other newcomers to the schedule are Ohio University, Colgate and Cornell. The other teams were all met last year. Ohio State University will make its first appearance on the Spartan campaign when they come here for a double-header May 22 and 23.

The University of Wisconsin will come here early in the campaign for another double-header. The Spartans met the Badgers in a similar engagement last year and succeeded in taking both games from Bobby Foser's outfit. The University of Michigan will be met in a home-and-home series on successive days, beginning May 29.

Another double-header is scheduled with the University of Iowa on College Field, June 3 and 4. The Hawkeyes split with Spartans last year. Notre Dame Western State Teachers College and Michigan Normal will be met in home-and-home series.

The Spartans are holding their workouts daily in Demonstration Hall, and Kobs is experimenting with his different positions. Milt Lehnhardt, regular center-fielder last spring, has been working at the first-base post lately. This doesn't mean that the junior slugger will hold down that position, because Lehnhardt can cover a lot of ground in the outfield.

Glenn, peppy little second-baseman, seems to be a fixture at second. He will probably be the necessary plug to fill the gap left vacant when Theron Fager played his last game in 1935. Weimer, Hartling, Sebo, Campbell and others are working out at the infield posts. Just what the regular lineup will be is entirely uncertain.

The pitching staff has been working out for several weeks, and started throwing curves for the first time in recent drills. George "Dede" Hill, last year's star sophomore, appears to be in good shape for the strenuous campaign, as do Lefty Walters, Max Hinkle, Ed Broome, Dorian Wilkinson and the rest of the mound staff. Wilkinson has just appeared in the daily drills, having been engaged in the court practices up to last week.

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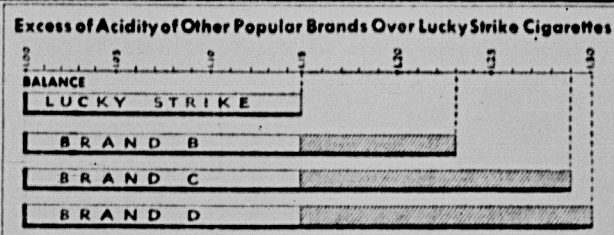
