At the close of registration this afternoon more than 4,000 students had paid their fees. This, with tomorrow's ad-ditions, will easily pass last year's record enrollment of 4.005.

Of the total, over 1,800 are new students. This number may yet be increased as 2,147 have been admitted, although some will not come to college this year.
