Michigan State's basketball team, 10 strong, will be shooting for new conquests this weekend as the Spartans perform in a two-night stand in Cleveland.

Tonight will see the State quintet opposing Case university, a team which has been improving with each succeeding game.

Flushed by a 49-48 victory over Kalamazoo college in Demarest Hall Wednesday night, the Spartans were in a good frame of mind when they departed yesterday afternoon. The win enabled State to draw abreast with the 30th mark with two triumphs and a pair of setbacks in four starts.

Six of the Spartans making the trip were members of State's undefeated freshman five last year. The first year men are Ben Danforth, Bill Carpenter, Lee Callahan, Tom O'Donohue, Jim Nelson and Peter Dill Ponte. The rest of the squad consists of Howard Kraft, Donald Conklin, Al Rita and Duran Wilsonson all veterans.

In defeating Kalamazoo, State turned in the best game of the season. The team came through with 10 field goals in 35 trials, a considerably good record.

Kraft was the big gun in the State attack with six baskets and four throw for 11 points. Garlock after running into considerable trouble in previous games, also hit the mark with accuracy, registering first goals for 10 points.

For Kalamazoo, Lipshitz, a single forward, was the star. He accounted for 12 of his team's points with six field goals, four of which came in the first eight minutes of play.
