Vanderburg Names Head Of Carnival

Ward VanAtta to be in Charge of Annual Water Event.

Ward VanAtta, Northville, has been named to head the 1937 Water Carnival. It was disclosed by Vanderburg senior president yesterday. Further appointments have not as yet been made. VanAtta's first official move was to announce the essay contest, in which the winning theme for the carnival will be selected. As the prize of \$25 will be awarded the winner.

Want Music Theme

The desirability of a musical theme was stressed by both Vanderburg and VanAtta. The success of the carnival, based upon songs and song lyrics was emphasized and it was stated that the probability of a musical theme will be given first consideration.

Deadline for the contest, VanAtta states, is noon Monday, March 1. Any student is eligible to enter. It was stated. Consideration must be made for the fact that between thirty and fifty floats will be entered in the carnival, and that any theme must be far-reaching enough to provide each with a definite project.

11th Year Held

This will be the fourteenth year that the senior class has sponsored the annual carnival on the Red Pine Field. It has seen more floats attracted to the colorful event in the two night stand than in any other year. It is estimated that more than six thousand people attended.

Prizes will be awarded for the best presentation of themes by the individual floats. These prizes will be in the form of a cup, all campus fraternities and societies compete as well as the dormitories. Judging is done by faculty members.

In addition to the floats, many contests in canoe tilting and canoe racing, mixed and singles, are held.

State Grange Gives Program

Two Plays Presented by Students Monday.

Hop Tickets Are Sold Out On First Day

Quickest Sellout in History—Many Go Without Quarts.

One of the wildest scramble in party history at Michigan State occurred at the opening sale of tickets for the J-Hop yesterday, and in two hour flurries the party was a complete sell-out.

Selling only to juniors, the ticket competition was unable to withhold any tickets for other classes because of the huge crowd of juniors that clamored for them. It was nearly two hundred third-year men were unable to secure them and were turned away after the last one was gone.

The first sale was from 12 noon until 1 p. m. The second was from 2 p. m. until all were gone about 6:15. It was the quickest sell-out in the history of the party here at State.

Harry Speckman, chairman of favors, announced that the favors will be given out in the Union room 12 noon to 1 p. m. on Thursday and Friday. They are distinctly different that year from any offered at previous J-Hops. Programs will be given away at the same time. Both the favors and programs may be had by presenting the ticket, from which the club will be removed.

Original plans, completed last week with station WJR will be followed Friday night. The dancing will start at 8:00 and continue until 3:30, with the broadcast continuing from 11:00 until 1:00. The Grand March will be held from 12:30 to 1:00.

Unique decorations, as planned by Bob Lander, decorations chairman, will decorate the hall. The theme to be followed will be announced in the Friday issue of the News.

College Paint Shop Prepares For Rural Convention Rush

Five Thousand Signs Have Been Made to Give Directions. Explanations to Thousands of Farmer Visitors.

As Farmers' Week approaches and exhibits and posters appear in every building the college paint shop, where these signs are made, is one of the busiest places on campus. Corners are piled with signs of all kinds, and more are being made all the time.

This shop does all of the incidental painting on campus, and makes all signs. The black and gold ones which name all the buildings were made there, as well as the new wooden signs by the administration building, and the one which was stolen from the horticultural gardens last fall. A duplicate of this is now being made, and Mr. R. Heidrick, head of the paint shop says "this time we'll put a padlock on it."

The largest number of signs, however, are cardboard ones, and nearly 5000 have already been made since the first of the year, for Farmers' Week alone. Some will explain exhibits, some tell the pedigree of livestock, some advertise lectures or direct visitors. Most of the work is done by 30 N. Y. A. students under Mr. Heidrick's direction.

The biggest job this year has been making uniform backgrounds for the exhibits to be set up in the hallways of Demonstration hall. These will be black wood, divided into stalls, and can be collapsed and used again other years. They will save money for the college and will, for the paint shop, be that everyone is happy about them.

All in all, it's going to be quite a Farmers' Week, especially in the paint shop, after all the signs are finished and up on Monday, and before they have to be taken down on Saturday.

With the hope of quiet weather conditions, prevailing throughout the week, college officials today announced that over 9000 visitors were expected on campus for the 1937 Farmers' Week. This number for record would include all passing attendance marks, including the farm road established in 1935, when approximately 25000 agriculturists were registered.

Monday marked the arrival of the vanguard of the visitors and the day's proceedings were limited largely to state rather than local meetings.

With a diversified program lined up for the balance of the week, aimed to cover every phase of agricultural activity, educational as well as entertaining programs will be presented the farm visitor while in East Lansing.

Headed by Governor Frank Murphy, several noted speakers will appear on afternoon and evening programs. Exhibits and displays by numerous college departments will also be open during the demonstration period.

A highlight of the week will be Thursday evening's activities in Demonstration hall when Governor Frank Murphy will address the visitors.

On Wednesday evening, in the armory, the honorable Burr Linn, State Commissioner of Agriculture, will present the main address. On this same program, as an entertainment feature, a pulling contest will be staged between a team of oxen and college students mounted on horses.

For the interest of junior farmers attending the week's activities, Michigan State students will hold the Little International Livestock show Thursday afternoon at 1:30 in Demonstration hall. In this exhibition college livestock will be fitted and shown by Michigan State students.

Manager of the event will be George Wellington. Awards will be made to winning members in the contests.

For feminine visitors attending Farmers' Week, a homemakers' session will be held in the Home Economics building.

Here women members may learn the newest kinks in child care, styles and fashions, and best preparation.

A banquet will be held for this group at 6:30 tonight in the main dining room of the Union building. Toastmasters for the affair will be Edna V. Smith, state leader in extension work in home economics. The speaker will be Mildred Horton, state leader of extension work in home economics, Texas.

Exhibits for Farmers' Week, both educational and competitive, will be housed in Demonstration hall. The agricultural engineering displays will be housed in the new farm machinery hall, southwest of the power house. In the Home Economics building the home economics department will have exhibits of interest to women. A special poultry show will be housed in the gym annex across from the college gymnasium.

Chamberlain Scoffs At "Surface Tension"

"The Physics of Surfaces" was the subject of a lecture by Prof. C. W. Chamberlain of the physics department before the Physics Colloquium on Thursday.

In this lecture Prof. Chamberlain showed an idea he developed which proves that there is no such physical phenomena such as has been known as "surface tension."

He said that there is no special tension in a liquid which does not exist in the body of the liquid itself. He also said that a liquid surface is a region of energy and not a region of tension.

Professor Chamberlain illustrated the importance of this new conception by applying it to several physical and engineering problems.

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Make Ready For 30,000 Ag Visitors

Ideal Weather Conditions Point Toward Record Breaking Crowd.

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Alumni Are To Organize To Elect Officers in Each Senatorial District.

Glen O. Stewart, alumni secretary, is now spending three days a week in order to bring about a more closely knit alumni organization. Statistics show that more than sixty-five per cent of Michigan State graduates still live in Michigan, and consequently the alumni are being organized on the basis of the thirty-two senatorial districts in this state.

The alumni officers in each region are the district governing the lieutenant governor, and the secretary-treasurer. Their duties are to make legislative contact with senators and representatives of their locality. The district plan is all inclusive, considers both graduates and non-graduates, and invites the parents of undergraduates to the meetings.

Six other committees are appointed in each district: membership, meetings, scholarship, employment, new students, and good publicity. The alumni have become more Michigan State conscious in the last few years, as is indicated by the large attendance in district meetings.

Districts completed are Wayne county, district 6; Kalamazoo and St. Joseph counties, district 7; Berrien and Cass counties, district 23; Muskegon and Ottawa counties, and district 24; Midland and Isabella counties.

The next meeting will be held in Flint for district 13 (Genesee county) on February 11. A meeting for district 15 (Shiawassee, Clinton, and Eaton counties) will be held in Owosso on February 16.

This new plan for alumni organization is working out for better than any previous one. One of its most important functions is the direct contact of senators and representatives by organized alumni within their locality.

The Michigan Bell Telephone company will demonstrate the dial switch telephone and teletype system. The State Electrical Administrative board will cooperate with B. F. Benning, P. F. Brinen, A. Luchini, and R. B. Wilcox in presenting an exhibit on "Farm Electrification."

This exhibit will include an explanation of procedure necessary to obtain an extension of power lines, a display of wiring and an explanation of state electrical laws. The exhibits will be open from 10 a. m. to 6 p. m. daily.

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Three Classes Pick Candidates To Run At All-College Vote

Freshman, Sophomore and Junior Candidates for Union Board, Student Council and Fresh Posts Chosen at Meetings Monday.

Meeting of 5 o'clock yesterday, the three lower classes nominated candidates for the Union Board, Student Council, and for Freshman class officers. Attendance, which had exceptionally good at the time, was expected to be at the annual meeting.

Candidates nominated for the Union Board will appear on the ballot Thursday, February 11, at the all-college election.

Nine men were nominated to run for three Student Council posts from the junior class. Because this is the number required in the final election, these men will not appear on the ballot at the preliminary election. The men nominated were: Larry Hamilton, Roger B. Wilcox, Howard Swartz, Tony Smith, and Jimmy Hays and Harry Spelman.

Union board candidates from the sophomore class are Alan Brightman, Joe Lash, Dorothy Garlock, and Ruth Sharkey. Again, no preliminary vote will be required, as 120 persons will be chosen by the board, and four names will appear on the final ballot.

The sophomore class nominated eight men for two Student Council positions. The men nominated were: Rudy Mason, Clarence Dennis, Fred Arnold, John Board, Geoffrey George, Keith Mordock, Joe Bane, and Victor Spelman.

Union board candidates from the sophomore class are five in number: Magnolia Goun and Granger Stacks, Warren Shapton, Dan Granger, and Lucile Hallett comprise the student body. Of these, only two will be elected, and four will remain after the primaries.

An enthusiastic freshman class nominated four men for president, seven girls for vice-president, one man for treasurer, and four girls for secretary. They also picked four candidates for one Union board post, and nine students, male and female, for the Student Council jobs.

Phil Barstow, Roy Spies, Robert Barstow, and Al Hamilton are the candidates for class president. The first vote will be held in 1936 at the elections.

For vice-president, Ruth Thron, Jane Schmidt, Ann Jones, Ruth Eleanor Taylor, Marian Patch, Denny Mitchell, and Rita Kasper will run. Again, only two will survive the preliminaries.

The treasurer's office will be uncontested due to the ineligibility of two of the nominees. The post goes to Russell Fess.

One of four candidates will become secretary of the organization. Those running are: Barbara Sears, Betty Lord, Joanne Bradley, and Mary Grant. Two must lose out in the preliminaries.

Ed Conrad, Robert Page, Ed Lautenschlager, and George Cope will be the opponents in the fight for membership on the Union board. Only two will survive the first election.

Those running for Student Council membership are: Bob Field, Dick Nalston, Al White, George Gargett, Betty Lawrence, Stanley M. Roe, Hettie Bradley, Pauline Weir, and Dorothy Holcomb. Two names will appear on the final ballot.

Two constitutions, those of the Student Council and Board of Publications, will be presented for ratification at the primary elections, and will be voted upon by members of all classes—including seniors, who will not have any other questions before them.

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The Political Pot

Most of the student offices on this campus are nothing more than political jobs. There are a few positions that involve technical knowledge. These should go to those best trained for the work.

Among holders of jobs is the latter class are the managing editors and business man-

agers of the college publications. The selection of these people should be as far removed from campus politics as they can be. Experience gained at other schools and colleges has proved that the best means of severing political machinations from the journalistic offices is to turn the naming of the staff heads over to a group similar to our own Board of Publications.

An analysis of the situation makes this a rather logical solution. The students and faculty members who make up Boards of Publication are clearly in the best positions to observe the work of the various candidates for the jobs on the two staffs.

Why then should not these people be given the right to name the editors and business managers?

One argument in opposition contends that by doing so the right of the student body to choose its editors is removed. Possibly a student's right to vote on editors is removed but in the long run the student's even more basic right to have the most capable man in charge is protected.

At present the four top posts on the publications are the objects of much political maneuvering on the part of fraternities and other groups. Each year there is little left but the formal vote after the bids have done their figuring and trading.

That any group of people should be entitled to an election involving technical jobs is unfortunate. Undoubtedly ability plays no part in the selection of a bloc's candidate; nevertheless, the issue is decided.

Another argument is that the appointive system will result in democratic self-perpetuation of officers on the publications. In other words it is claimed that personal friends of the current heads would tend to be favored in the selection of new heads.

We must note that possibility would be as dangerous as the present election system. When it is remembered that there are four faculty members on the Board and two non-publication students, it is clear that there will be sufficient check on any blatant favoritism.

Again we run into the claim that the State News is paid for by the student body. The sum total per year paid is \$1.15. At the same time each student pays \$1.15 per year toward the athletic and entertainment fund, but has almost no voice whatever in the direction of policies in these activities.

The proposed constitution has not been hastily prepared to meet any current situation. Rather it has been drafted following a long study of the systems used at colleges throughout the country. The plan as submitted for the approval of all students seems to be the best possible one. It is distinctly an improvement over the old electoral method.

State May Play Fewer Games Next Year, Says Van Alstyne

Coach calls Present Set-up Too Tough a Grind for Cagers; Team Rests for Game With Wisconsin Next Saturday.

What no game before Saturday? asked Michigan State's basketball players as they bumped into Coach Ben VanAlstyne yesterday.

The schedule doesn't call for the Spartans seeing action until Saturday night when they tackle University of Wisconsin at Madison, but the boys just wanted to make sure.

During the last month the team hasn't had much time to do anything but think, play and sleep basketball. They played 10 games in 27 days, which is more than several pro teams around the country play in a similar number of days, and certainly more than any college quintet.

According to Coach VanAlstyne, State's failure to win on the court this season (the team has won only five times in 12 starts) is due to the difficult schedule.

First Breathing Spell

This is the first breathing spell for the team since January 1, smiled Van yesterday. "During the time which has elapsed since then we have had little or no time for practice."

The team on two occasions played three games in one week. We haven't had any time to engage in serious practices between games. Most of the workouts have been short and confined more or less to the players who didn't see action in a game.

Van points out State's schedule is two weeks shorter than at most other schools. "The season can't be prolonged, otherwise the Spartans would not have a place in which to practice or play."

Will Cut Schedule

Unless college officials give in, something which they seem set on not doing, and allow Van to keep the basketball floor in demonstration hall two weeks more next year, State's cagers probably won't play more than 13 games next season.

"I'm not going to kill the players any more," added VanAlstyne. "Either we get more time, or else we'll cut down on the schedule."

This week's rest undoubtedly will do the State cagers considerable good, especially after the showing as they lost to Hope College, 25-21, last Friday night. It was a good thing there weren't more fans around to see the game.

The Spartans were down and out. They didn't seem to care whether they won, lost or tied. Uppermost in their minds was to get the game over.

At that, State at one time during the game did hold an 8-point lead. Hope won out in a see-saw final period in which the score changed hands no less than five times.

A basket by Bill Poppink, ace scorer in the M. I. A. A. put Hope ahead with two minutes to go and State never caught up. They were too tired.

Leonard Osterink at present tops the race for individual scoring honors with 88 points. Ron Garlock, champion point maker last season, is in second place with 77 points, while Howard Kraft trails in third spot with 61.

Bremer And Merdler Set New Records

Frey, Woodstra and Greer Each Capture Two Wins in Track Battle.

If some of the present freshmen in school were only sophomores, Michigan State's track team this year would rank with the best in the country.

Since they aren't, however, Athletic Director Ralph H. Young and his four assistants will have to stand by and hope for the best with the material available.

Judging by the results of the annual Freshman-Sophomore dual meet last week, the yearling squad is the best in Spartan history. All of this, despite the fact, the sophs captured the event, 53½-41½.

Sixty-four men competed for honors, 40 of whom were making their bow in the familiar green shirt, symbolic of Michigan State college.

12 Score Points

Twelve freshmen tallied one or more points. There were 14 sophomores who broke into the scoring column.

Individual honors went to Harvey Woodstra, who, although a freshman, has caused the Spartans considerable trouble in the past. Woodstra was a member of the Grand Rapids Junior College team for two years and at one time held the State Intercollegiate hurdle championship.

Woodstra showed his heels to all of the frosh and soph hurdles by winning both events with a little to spare. He also tied Rudy Woodstra in the 51 seconds yard dash.

Tosses Ball 45 Feet

Two meet records went by the boards. Ernest Bremer set the first with a toss of 45 feet 10½ inches in the 45 foot put while Henry Merdler leaped 5 feet 11½ inches in the high jump for the second. Both are sophomores.

Getting back to the starting freshmen, considering it was their first major test as collegians, the comparative novices were impressive.

The yearlings won four first places and tied for a fifth. Woodstra and Dick Frey, the sensational distance stars, divided the victories. Woodstra in the hurdles, and Frey in both the half mile and mile.

In a sensational race, the frosh gained a tie with the sophomores in the 440-yard relay. Each team was clocked in 51 seconds.

Has to Step

Wilbur Greer, now a sophomore, also came through with flying colors by scoring a double in the 40 and 220-yard dashes. In the former race, Greer had to step to edge out freshman Rudy Flake and David Schlager, a couple of future point winners.

Willard Eager, brother of Theron Eager, an ex-baseball star here, caught the eye of the coaches in the half mile and mile runs. He trailed Frey and Harry Butler in the 880-yard run, but gained a second in the longer race.

Then, too, there is Darwin Dudley, a swell quarter-mile.

A second glance at the results at this point reveals State won't have such a bad team this season, considering there are a score of veteran juniors and seniors around headed by Captain Carl Mueller.

Just to recall a few, they include: Bob Adcock, Kenny Waite, the cross-country champion; Art Green, Harold Sparks, Johnny Pingel, Art Jenkins, Bill Smith, Clare McDermott, Ernest McLaughlin, Gerald Bos, George Grantham and Loda Habila.

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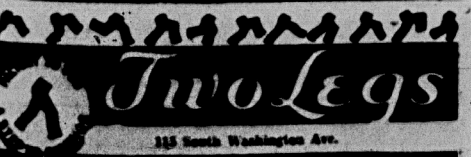

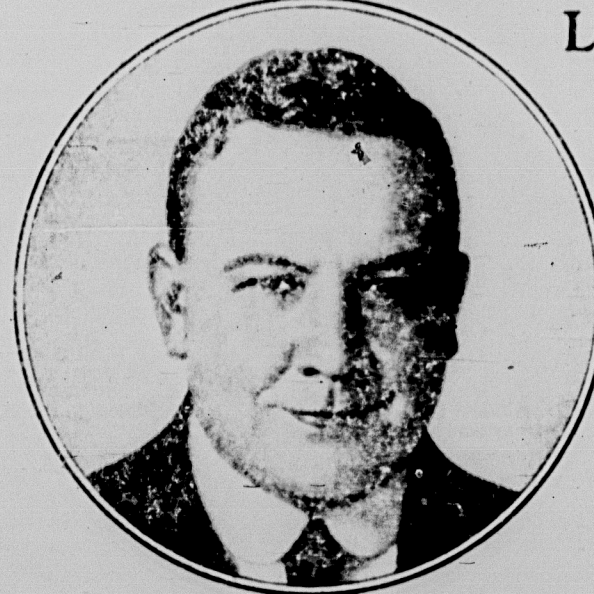
Coach Joe Begala's squad has not met a reversal since 1934 when a strong Spartan team from M. S. C. did the trick.
