

Georgia O'Keefe's "Autumn Leaves" with two more votes than Reginald Marsh's "High Valley" was announced the winning print at the Beta Alpha Sigma open house Wednesday night. These pictures were the favorites of those who visited the exhibit of 24 prints by living American artists on display in the Union Annex the past four weeks.

"Autumn Leaves" is a striking composition in vivid color. Georgia O'Keefe is quoted as saying of her work, "I painted the autumn leaves as I saw them". Apparently others have liked the way she "saw them".

The print which received second place is more conventionally realistic. Reginald Marsh received his inspiration for "High Valley" when he saw a colored girl walking home from church dressed in her best dress of long clinging yellow.

Besides this exhibit, members of Beta Alpha Sigma, local art and landscape history, displayed samples of student work. Prominent among these were designs in water color. There were also some very interesting pieces of work by the commercial art classes, including articles made in the wood-working courses.
