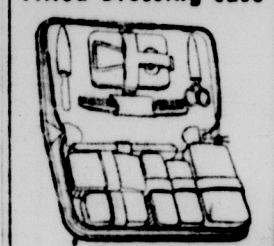

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Ionian School Head Speaks At Club Meet

A. A. Rather Traces Development of High Schools.

A descriptive picture of "What is Happening in Secondary Education" was given before the State College club at its regular luncheon meeting Wednesday noon by A. A. Rather, superintendent of school at Ionia. The speaker was introduced by his brother, H. C. Rather of the MSC farm crops department.

The high school today, defined Mr. Rather, is a social institution organized to provide for adolescent youth a way to prepare for college, for the commercial world, or for a vocation. The speaker pointed out how in many instances today, his own school included, educators are trying to fit a modern program to an old plant.

High schools have grown considerably since their formation in 1870. At that time, there were 80,000 students, while two years ago high school enrollment totaled 6,000,000 students. The increased number of students with different backgrounds presents a challenge to modern education, the speaker declared.

Dealing with families as well as with young people, as modern secondary education does, hampers the freedom of educators in doing new things. The program of today's high schools is to give students a chance to do as well as to think, thus training them to meet their problems in life by combining with best thought a program of activity.
