Shall We Get Acquainted

The almost phenomenal growth of Mich igan State has naturally produced growing pains. One of them overlooked because of the more tangible problems of housing. classroom space, and a larger staff, is the gradual disappearance of social relations between the faculty and the students.

Of course, some faculty members chap erone social affairs, but results of the recent Spartan Women's league questionnaire indicate just how unstimulating that relationship is. Even that group of faculty people who have a chance to discuss the weather with some fraternity pledge (who considers himself most unfortunate) is restricted. What is lacking are informal social gatherings, where students and faculty members could get together and talk, possibly over a cup of coffee.

Only those few students who now have pportunities to meet the faculty informally know what others are missing. The average student looks upon the average faculty person as someone not quite human He knows him only as one who, from the front of the classroom, spouts facts, more or less interesting, for fifty minutes two or three times a week, occasionally interrupting himself to ask questions

The instructor's view of his students is usually just as false. It is quite natural for faculty members to forget that in the class room they are always forcing students to play their game and to play if their way John Jones may seem a frightfully stupid person in an English literature class, because he can evince no knowledge of the 'heroic couplets" of Pope, However, had he a chance to discuss aeronautical engineerwith his instructor, he might prove himself not only normally intelligent, but better versed in some things than the fac
