offer marriage courses, in which more than 100,000 students are enrolled.

The lecture series will in no way attempt to supplant the courses in marriage already offered by the sociology department, the home economics department, and the zoology department. These courses are primarily valuable to students who specialize in those departments. Although they teach much which is worthwhile for all students, many persons do not have time to take these courses outside their fields of major interest.

The lecture series covers the essentials, and only the essentials, of marriage. For that reason alone it has a place, especially for those women who have found it impos sible to take any of the courses in family problems now offered

The only conspicuous shortcoming of the outline for the marriage series is that it offers no provision for a like education for men. It is certainly true that men are at least as important in marriage as women. Many men on the campus have objected to being left out of the plan. The omission is explainable, however. Since such a seriescan be most effective when given to an unmixed group, it is only natural that at its founding one or the other of the sexes had to be overlooked. Should the series prove effective, there can be no reason for not offering a similar program for men.

Insult to Intelligence


