

C. H. Nickle Discusses Stage Decorations Before Women's Club

Speech Professor Shows Advance In Methods

Miss Anne Kuehl's Physical Education Students Show Evolution of the Dance From Primitive to Present Day Form

C. H. Nickle of the speech department discussed the art of stage decoration before members of the East Lansing Women's club Monday afternoon.

Professor Nickle, who talked on stage decoration, spoke of the relationship between

the dance and the drama, and traced the development of stage decoration from the early theater to modern times. "In early dramas, about 500 B. C.," he said, "there were no stage decorations and one person acted the parts of several characters, changing his costume with each impersonation."

In early Greek and Roman theaters, costumes still formed the only stage decoration. Painting scenes came into use in the 16th century, but orthodox sets were used which had little or no connection with the play and by which the actors were submerged." In conclusion he said, "Stage decoration should aid and not hinder the action."
