Beal Gardens Have But Small Summer Crowd This Year

Summer Students Do Not Know About Wide Plant Varieties.

Beloved in song and legend by State students for the last 60 years, Beal Botanic gardens have not been attracting as many students this summer as is usual, according to H. L. Chapman, superintendent of the gardens.

"The Beal gardens annually attract about forty thousand outof-town visitors," said Mr. Chapman, who believes that many summer session students have not visited the gardens because they have not known about

As all regular students know the Beal gardens were started by the late Dr. W. J. Beal, who originally planned for them to contain only plants native to Michigan, Later, plants from other states and countries were added and at present there are about 3,000 species and varieties of plants from all over the world

The collection of plants to be found in the pool is particularly interesting; as it contains not only native water lilies but also a specimen of the sacred pink lotus from India, and an Egyptian papyrus plant, which is so delicate it cannot be taken out of the greenhouse until the beginning of July.

Of special interest to the noc turnal visitor is a red tropical hily which blooms only at night.

Library Collection Contains Many Volumes

At an Antwerp press in the year 1578 a collection of the letters of St. Jerome was bound in a volume Today in 1938, 360 years later, the M. S. C. library houses this treasure.

And yet this is but one of the rare collections of books to which State lays claim, says. Jackson E. Towne, Michigan State college librarian. Of the entire collection one-half are famous books on ornithology, the works of Audubon and Wilson being outstanding.

Towne says: "I am kept busy filing, collecting, classifying, judging, and designating literature for historical collections, rare-book rooms, and 101 other destinations.

The addition of a 1,768 page translation of Webster's dictionary into Chinese which was given to the college recently by a former Chinese student, T. M. Wang greatly increased the value of the collection.

Dr. Huddleson **Demonstrates His Fever Cure**

Doctors Find Brucellin Left Last Year is Nearly Perfect.

Dr. I. F. Huddleson, Michigan State college bacteriology research professor who left for the island of Malta June 22, arrived July 4 to find 30 undulant fever victims. The supply of "brucellin," the only known cure for the disease was nearly exhausted.

Island doctors had found the medicine which Doctor Huddleson left last year nearly perfect, according to a letter received by the bacteriology department.

Huddleson is on his fifth visit to the island to study the disease. He is working in cooperation with English governmental authorities to demonstrate the effectiveness of his diagnostic methods and his curative substance "brucellin." upon the Malta fever prevalent in the island

Before he returns to this country he will attend the thirteenth International Veterinary congress n Vienna, where he will deliver paper for Dean Ward Giltner. head of the Michigan State college bacteriological department.


