



Masonites Organize Local Government

Another "boys' town" is the new men's dormitory, familiarly called Mason hall. A self-governing unit, it has its own officers, general council and precinct leaders who guide the affairs of state of some 430 men.

The organization set-up is easily outlined into (1) division of the dorm into nine precincts, (2) senior divisional heads, (3) official supervision, and (4) a general council. And over all as a sort of kind, fatherly spirit, is Curtis Beachum, house father.

Though the lowest on the scale of rank, the counselors, all seniors, are mighty important men. They are the ones in closest contact with the boys; they are the advisers they exercise a considerable influence—in one direction or another. These "models" were hand-picked for special duty. They are Jim Davis, Jack Tanner, Bill Hasselback, Bob Busenberg, Harold Hoffmeyer, Dave Traflet, Bernard Kahl, Murray Cohen, Charles Gibbs and Clyde Dial.

Officers of the dormitory are Bernard Kahl, president and counselor-at-large; Bob Busenberg, vice president, and Murray Cohen, secretary-treasurer. They are assisted in their duties by the general council which is made up by the nine precincts and two men elected at large from each precinct.

The officers and general council meet once a week, with Mr. Beachum sitting in. Precinct meetings are not on a regular schedule as yet but will be. Since the group is so large that all cannot meet together at once, these divisions must meet separately and all business is conducted through the precincts.

The office and council work on the various problems of new rule's needed, complaints and matters of discipline that are referred to them and directly decide matters of policy in regard to the dorm. And so far there have been no complaints. The boys enjoy working out their own problems and seem to think that no one could be fairer than their fellow-men.

It's an interesting experiment.



He was wounded several times, cited for "gallantry in action" and decorated with the Distinguished Service Cross in 1918.

HOPES TO BAE WAE
Maverick is the author of a proposed "unwritten" constitution, which he hopes would forever bar the door to compromise. He proposes that present frontiers should forever remain the same and that no American nation shall ever ally itself with another one. He also proposes that all American nations will defend one another against all other nations, and that all countries in this hemisphere should abstain from all world conflicts, and that the United States will defend all American nations who defend one another against all other nations.

He is a graduate of the Virginia Military Institute and the University of Texas.
